CANTON, March 9.—Entries from ten high schools will take part in the first annual interscholastic Wrestling Tournament sponsored by St. Lawrence University, which will be held in the Brewer Field House this Saturday, March 10, according to M. B. Banks, the meet manager.

8-Hour Day Desired By City Police

Bill Sponsored by State Police Conference Now in Legislature

A special meeting of the St. Lawrence County Police Protective Association was held last evening in the rooms of the Association in the city hall. The main topic of discussion was the petitions which members of the association are circulating in Canton, Potsdam, Gouverneur, Massena and Ogdensburg favoring Senate and House bills providing for an eight hour working day for the policemen of the state. Very good progress was reported and many signatures have been obtained to date.

The meeting also adopted resolutions in regard to the passage of the Seaway Treaty by the Senate, which are printed below.

Following the meeting a delegation from the Association visited Officer Demo at the Hepburn Hospital where he is receiving treatment.

The undersigned citizens of St. Lawrence County being interested in promoting the efforts of the police of our various communities in preventing crime and prosecuting those who violate the law, do hereby request your support of Senate Bill introduced by Mr. Wicks, February 22, 1934, print No. 1001, introducing No. 912 and Assembly Bill introduced by Mr. Condon, February 22, 1934 print No. 1252 and introductory No. 1182, which provides that there shall be granted an eight hour day to every policeman in this State. This bill would give to your constituents the same privileges as have been granted to police of first and second class cities since the year 1911. In this period when the police throughout the rural communities as well as in the larger cities are called upon very frequently to perform duties which all for strength and courage, we believe it only proper that this bill be passed, for it will enable the guardians of the law to meet the conditions which arise by helping to conserve the health and strength of these men.

It is in accord with the spirit of the times for it provides an eight hour day for these men who have not been enjoying the privileges which their fellow workers not only in industrial work but in the same line of work in other communities of the State are enjoying. We are

NEW YORK, March 9.—Nearly \$100,000 worth of exempt jobs have been filled by the administration of Mayor F. H. LaGuardia since February 1, perusal of the City Record reveals today.

Few of the appointments were announced when they were made; most of them have come to light only through their publication in

the City Record. All the appointments were made in the regular way with the certification of the Budget Director. The jobs are "just necessary jobs," according to Mayor LaGuardia. "The great majority of them have been filled at reduced salaries," he says, "and that's all there is to it."

ROOSEVELT SPIRIT URGED

LONDON, March 9.—Great Britain is "now being overshadowed by nations with resolute leaders," said Lord Trent, British industrialist, addressing the American Chamber of Commerce yesterday.

"What the nation is looking for," he said, "is not a Napoleon but team leaders, men who possess the drive of reforming zeal."

Referring to the President of the United States Lord Trent continued, "I hope it is unnecessary for us to have a Roosevelt if for no other reason than it would be extremely difficult to discover him." Putting his own question, "Does Great Britain need a Roosevelt?" he answered with a "qualified yes."

The Roosevelt spirit applied to the British Cabinet "would act as a vitalizing tonic to the whole nation, and, indeed, to the whole world."

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
