

Giants to Pay Hubbell \$18,000 This Season

RICHFIELDS TO PLAY AT WINTER PARK SUNDAY

Giant Ace Gets Raise Of \$6,000

NEW YORK, Jan. 18.—Although a great many industries still are trying to find out the worth of their workmen in this uncertain age, the New York National League baseball club wasted no time determining the value of the services of Carl Hubbell.

Hubbell yesterday became the highest paid pitcher in the long history of the Giants. When his 1934 contract, subscribed to with handsome flourishes, was received by James Tierney, secretary of the world's champions, it was learned definitely that he will receive not a cent less than \$18,000 for acting as a nuisance to batters next summer.

Last year this left-handed Oklahoman who won 23 games, lost 12 and then was the arch-tormentor of the Washington Senators in the Series was paid \$12,000.

In the more than 50 years that giant teams have been performing in New York, there has been a long list of illustrious pitchers: Christy Mathewson, Phil Douglas, Fred Toney, Art Nehf, Bugs Raymond and sturdy others but none of those bowlers ever enjoyed enough applause from his profession to drive behind four-in-hands or possess two cars.

Seldom before, though, did a pitcher ever deserve such a large increase. Hubbell almost single-handedly carried the burden of winning the National League title for the Giants last season. He allowed no more than 1.66 runs per nine-inning game, the lowest average since Grover Cleveland Alexander of the Phillies led the National League pitchers with 1.55 back in 1916.

Carl also pitched the most innings, 309, won the most games and pitched the most shutouts, 10. Furthermore, the tall southpaw established a new league record for consecutive scoreless innings, 46. From July 13 to Aug. 1 he didn't allow a single base runner to advance beyond third base.
