



LOCKPORT IS HOST TEAM

Section VI AAA Mat Action Here Tonight

Lockport Senior High School will be the scene of the Section VI Class AAA Wrestling Championships beginning tonight and continuing tomorrow.

The first round of action between the 14 schools will begin at 6 tonight with the semi-finals at 1:30 tomorrow and the finals immediately following consolation matches tomorrow night.

Approximately 130 boys will compete in 13 weight classes. One hundred and twenty individual matches will be held with the winners advancing to the Inter-Class Sectionals Feb. 26.

Lockport, coached by Bob Ames, has three matmen seeded in the event. Dana Rising is seeded in the 115-pound bracket, Dan DiPastena at 168, and Ron Mott, a prime contender at 183.

"We got some good draws," said Ames this morning. "Some of our boys stand a good chance to make the semi-finals and finals."

Six champions return from last year. They are:

98 — Greg St. Onge, Niagara Falls, (Also inter-sectional champ).

106 — Mel Cunningham, Niagara Falls, (Intersectional champ as a freshman took fourth in state as frosh).

130 — Glen Gentzek, Tonawanda.

141 — Dennis Brown, Williamsville (Outstanding wrestler of 1965).

157 — Bob Rust, Kenmore East.

183 — Neil Bateman, Maryvale. (Three time sectional champ) and (Intersectional champ 1965).

Williamsville will have the most seeded men with nine. Am-

herst, coached by the famous Norm Foster who coached Croquis to 129 straight wins (they now have 141) has three, the same as Lockport. Frontier, Hamburg, Kenmore West, Kenmore East has seven, Maryvale six, Niagara Falls six, West Seneca six, Tonawanda four, Jamestown four, North Tonawanda two and LaSalle one.

Here's some general information for spectators:

High school wrestling is a clean, scientific sport, in which no striking, kicking, gouging, butting, strangling, or anything that endangers life or limb is allowed. Each meet consists of thirteen individual matches starting at 98 pounds and progressing by weight through the unlimited class for boys over 235 pounds. Each boy is matched with an opponent in his own weight class.

Each match consists of three periods, two minutes in length. The first period is started with the wrestlers on their feet, the second and third periods are started with the boys on the mat in the referees position.

The winner of the match is determined by the number of individual points scored in the six minutes, or by one wrestler securing a pin or fall anytime during the match.

In tournament wrestling, a boy must win to continue on into the next round.
