High school wrestling is a clean, scientific sport, in which no striking, kicking, gouging, butting, strangling, or anything that endangers life or limb is

allowed. Each meet consists of of thirteen individual mat .-

es starting at 98 pounds and

progressing by weight through the unlimited class for boys over 235 pounds. Each boy is matched with an opponent in his own weight class.

Each match consists of three periods, two minutes in length. The first period is started with the wrestlers on their feet, the second and third periods a e started with the boys on the mat

in the referees position. The winner of the match is determined by the number of individual points scored in the six minutes, or by one wrestler securing a pin or fall anytime

during the match. In tournament wrestling, a boy must win to continue on into the next round.
