



# A Spartan, 2 Warriors set for state meet

Three Star area wrestlers will be among the state's elite this weekend when they take part in the New York Intersectional Wrestling tournament in the Onondaga County War Memorial auditorium in Syracuse.

Jim Wilson of Sidney at 132 pounds, Gary Winnick of Sidney at 167 and Tim DeMulder at 112 from Unatego will represent this area as part of the Section 4

team going into the tournament.

Judging from the records of the individual combatants, this tournament should continue the tradition of excellence already established by athletes in the state meet.

All three area wrestlers will be in action Friday for opening round competition and all three have drawn formidable opponents.

At 112, Spartan sophomore

DeMulder, who missed last season's tournament because of injury, will take his 21-1 record to the mat against Bob LaBate, a 21-0 wrestler from Lakeland High in Section 1. DeMulder's only loss of the season was to Charley Seifert of Sherburne in holiday tourney action.

Wilson, in the 132 pound division, will meet a formidable Section 3 opponent in Rich Alger from Norwich. Alger comes into

the tournament with a 25-1 season mark compared with Wilson's 24-1. There's little doubt that Wilson has been wrestling all season in stiffer competition than has Alger.

Winnick will take a 20-3-1 record against Paul Bruns from West Babylon in Section 11. One would be foolish to scoff at Bruns' comparative record as he wrestles in one of the state's toughest sections which includes

schools like Brentwood which has five wrestlers in the state meet and is a strong candidate for the mythical team title.

Peru Central from Section 7 has one of the strongest teams in the state meet, going in unbeaten in 104 straight dual meet wins. Peru has seven athletes in the state extravaganza. Elmira Free Academy has a 55 meet unbeaten streak going and Portville (Section 6) is unbeaten in its last 67 meets.
