coach Gary Dillingham. The two-day state tourney at the Onondaga County War Memorial had official scorers along with personnel punching up in-dividual scores for the contestants and observers.
As Dillingham recalls,

the Meldrim-Keenan duel stood 6-4 Meldrim after the second period. but should have read 7-4.
"Keenan got an scape and takedown in the period. Dick got an escape because they were both upright at the end of the period. The official signalled the one-point but it was never

recorded." Meldrim led 12-10, according to score charts, with five-seconds left in regulation when Keenan pulled an escape and picked up one-point riding time for the tie score which was really a 13-12 Meldrim win. Keenan won in overtime, 2-1, then lost in the quarters to the eventual fourth place finisher who was beaten by the 119-runnerup.

Brentwood's Dave Larrache won the class. By the time the scoring error was detected — about two hours after Meldrim had competed "he had already gone out and eaten and was overweight," his coach said.

"It's hard to speculate how far Dick could have gone. I didn't think he wrestled well against Keenan. He might have come back and made a better showing the next day," said Dillingham.
