## IS WORLD CHAMPION

Cuba Boy Only American to Capture a First-Wrestler at Olym-

pic Games. news that came by cable last Seturday that "Ed" Ackerly had won the contest in the feather-weight class of the wrestlers in the Olympic games was naturally received with great enthusfasm in Cuba and elsewhere where his prowess is well known. His victory was especially notable from the fact that he was the only American to or in the wrestling vision, and also because in the final struggle he defeated in a decisive fashion the only grappler who had ever in a match obtained a decision over him. This was Gerson of Pennsylvania, who

last year in the meeting between Cornell and the University of Pennsylvania, after a gruelling struggle in which neeither contestant secured a fall, was given the decision on points, a decision which was considered of doubtful justice. In the trial bouts at Antwerp, Ackerly defeated Dialetes of Greece and Kaiser of Switzerland and Gerson was successful over Makinson of England and Barathou of France. Ackerly therefore is surely entitled to the highest championship honors in the branch of athletic work he has especialy devoted kimself to from his earliest college days. The recognition of his high merit came to him in a distinguished manner when he received last Monday the prize he had won from the hands of Albert, the gallant king of the Belgians. It was feared that his injured 6 ankle would be a serious handicap in his bouts abroad but with careful traint ing and judicious treatment he was enabled to appear in the arena, as the result showed, in excellent physical N condition. Plans are being considered 3 here to celebrate in some fitting fashion the success he has so honorably 8 and effectively earned. D
