Attican Heavyweight Champion

Wes Audsley, lone champion from the Genesee region, topped off his undefeated record (23-0) taking honors at the section V finals Saturday at the Rochester War Memorial.

The Attican heavyweight won a one point decision over Mike Compton of Marion, 3-2, to carry home the heavyweight championship title.

Five other area wrestlers contended for the section V championships. Ron Karn of Byron-Bergen was eliminated in the semi-finals by Spencerport's Shane Graham. Pembroke's 98 pound grappler, Mark McVay was defeated by an extremely tough Spencerport wrestler, Wayne Johnson. Attica's Allen Metz was defeated in the preliminaries. Batavian Don Gugel and fellow grappler, Casey Palmer were also eliminated.

Le Roy, whose team cleaned up in county play, lost a slate of possible wins; Dan Shaughnessy was pinned by Genesee's Eric Redman, and Ed Spink was lopped in semi-final contention.

The sectional finals offered tough competition and area wrestlers are commended on

their performances. A note that many were suffering from the barrage of flu-like illnesses should be made. Byron-Bergen's Ron Karn was visibly suffering as he was outperformed on the mats. Pembroke's midweight county
