The long-awaited trip to Pioneer High School came off Saturday as Baldwinsville's wrestling Bees traveled to Arcade and whipped the green-clad hosts, 46-21. The Bees did it in grand style, winning seven of the 13 bouts contested by pins, and drawing two others.

In an unusual fashion, the Buffalo-area schools run both junior varsity and varsity duals at the same time on two mats. side by side. While the Big Red Bees were at it on one mat, the JV Bees were working up a 53-5 licking of Pioneer's Panthers on the other mat.

In an exhibition match-up of upstate New York's better 91pounders, Lee Friend of Pioneer wound up pinning the Bees' Jerry Haselmayer in 5:49. Confusion over the status of that match led to a minus-6 on the Bees' scoreboard and Pioneer jumped out to a lead 98-pounder Mike Allen seemed to have a take down and victory at 98 lbs. but a horn on the other mat sounded and the ref stopped the match and started Mike over. At the final buzzer, Allen was tied at 2-7

At 105, Carl Kristeller applied one of his patented cradles and put Pioneer's man out of commission at 1.21

Dave Zimba wrestled well in losing at 112 lbs. Dave wrestled the sectional runner-up from last year and lost, 9-3. George LePorte nailed down his man at 119, and put the Bees out in front for the first time, 14-11. Bill Neufang followed with a tie of Pioneer's Tom Bennett, a Section 6 champion last year. Neulang appeared to have the edge and only needed a spinning move to get the needed points.

At 132, John Pickard dropped a major decision, 11-2, and then Barry Albert (138) came right back with a repeat of Kristeller's pin with his own in 1-21. Albert used a neat counter cradle and surprised everyone

Pioneer's 145-pounder and pinned him at 3:34. Then Doug Hirsh dropped a major decision at 155. Hirsh appeared to be coming back in the last period but he went overboard trying to throw his man to the mat and was, in turn, scored on to lose the major.

At 167, Don Shaver looked exceptionally good as he dominated his opponent and finally pinned him in 4:04. Mike Conners upped his win streak to 15 as he pinned Pioneer's 177pounder in 2:43. Then Bee heavyweight Ed Krupka looked like himself once again, when he wrestled well throughout the match and finally pinned his man str 5 46

The Bees were scheduled for Proneer on Jan. 21 but were snowed out. At that time, Pioneer had 68 wins in a row but then lost it the following Wednesday, 36-17, to Depew of Buffalo.
