## Post-season races are building in area high school sports circles

With less than two weeks remaining to be played in the regular season, area high school basketball players, swimmers and wrestlers are busily prepping for extensive grueling post-season

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Swimming wrestling begin post-season competition first, with league cham-pionship action taking place the weekend on Feb. 20-21. Basketball follows with prequarterfinal round games beginning Feb. 26 quarterfinals next day.

With wrestling S swimming placing their emphasis on the in-dividual, basketball's post-season journey takes the form of a long and somewhat com plicated system match-ups pitting the top match-ups pitting than teams from no less than leagues. Niagara Frontier League, which ranks third in size with 11 schools fielding teams, will send seven entries

into the draw.

Of those seven, they are broken down into four classes. Kenmore East, Kenmore West, North Tonawanda and Lockport comprise the large-school or A-1
division while smaller
schools such as Tonawanda, LaSalle, Niagara Falls, Niagara-Wheatfield and Lewiston-Porter represent the classification. Grand Island is the NFL's lone B-1 and is assured a place in the lottery as is Vocational, the Trott league's only B-2 school. There are no C or D entries in the NFL.

As it stands right now. Kenmore East and Kenmore West have locked up the NFL's A-1 berths. All that remains to be seen is which quintet winds up with the best record to determine the No. 1 and No. 2 seeds, which in turn has a bearing on who they play. The NFL No. 1 is slated to play the No. 4 team from the Erie County Interscholastic Conference while the No. 2 NFL squad pairs up

In A-2, three area schools can advance to

the playoffs. Defending co-champion LaSalle appears to have secured the No. 1 seeding and will play the third best team from Buffalo's Yale Cup while the NFL No. 2 will the top-ranked Buffalo school with both games on Feb. 27. Niagara Falls at 10-2 is currently the NFL No. 2 with Niagara-Wheatfield (8-5) and Tonawanda (6-6) battling for the third seed, which will open with a pre-quarterfinal contest Feb. 26 against the ECIC No. 3 team.

Only Grand Island and Trott have an "easy" path to follow. Grand Island will host the ECIC No. 4 Feb. 26 in B-1 while Trott will play Grover Cleveland of Buffalo Feb. 26 at LaSalle High School in B-2 action.

From there, the winners advance to the semi-finals starting March 3 with finals in the five classes following on March 7. The champions from A-1 and A-2 will then meet to determine Section VI's A titlist with B-1 and B-2 winners doing the same. C and D will also pla-ff all to determine the three schools which will face the top three teams from Section V (Rochester area) for the Far West championships March 13-14. Those winners will then advance to the "Super 16" State playoffs March 28 in Glens Falls.
Wrestling begins with

the NFL tourney Feb. 20-21 at Tonawanda High School. Each of the 10 NFL teams will send one entry from each of 14 weight classes for more than 140 wrestlers vying for a championship. The top four in each class will be seeded by the coaches with the remaining entries filled in against the seeds by a draw. The NFL will then

send two wrestlers per class plus seven wild cards, selected by the coaches, to the Seccoaches, to the Sectionals Feb. 27-28 at Sweet Home High School. There, the 35 NFL wrestlers will go up against top opponents from the ECIC, Niagara-Orleans, Tri-County, Southern Tier and C h a u t a u q u a -Cattaraugus leagues to determine the 14 in-dividuals that will carry Section VI's hopes to the state tournament March

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This also marks the first year private and Catholic schools will be included in the Section VI tourney, making both the sectional and state tournaments more representative of the entire wrestling picture in New Yok State.

Swimming also gets its

share of the post-season hoopla, beginning with the ECIC and NFL championships (at Niagara-Wheatfield) Feb. 20-21. Originally both were to be con-ducted Feb. 26-27-28, but were moved back one week to allow some to allow some schools to participate in the Eastern High School Championships in New

Entries are determined by selected cut-off times for each event.

From there, the top two in each individual event (NFL only) plus the top relay advance to the relay advance to the sectionals March 5-7 at Buffalo State College. The ECIC, by virtue of its 26 teams, gets more entries while the Niagara-Orleans and

But, wrestling, basketball and swim-ming aren't the only sports that will be in playoffs in late February and early March. Girls basketball, ice hockey, bowling, indoor track, gymnastics, skiing and rifle will also be involved in various playoffs to determine the "best' in


## Falls is victor
