The 1978 Livingston - Wyoming County Wrestling Tournament was held February 18 at the Avon Middle School. There were 13 schools participating and the York Knights captured the team trophy with 160 points.

TEACHERS FORECLOSE

Don Pearl, a freshman, beat Jim Maid BB and beat Jeff Marshall from Livonia by double overtime with a referee's decision. Jim Mazurowski from York defeated Don. Don placed fourth when he lost to Tom Costello from Avon.

Tim Banzel, a junior, pinned Ken Radley from LeRoy but lost to Ken McKenrick from BB.

Scott Cruickshank, a sophomore, beat Jeff Schuler from BB; decided over Tim Mastin from Dansville; pinned Rod White from Mount Morris in the semi finals; and beat Tim Argenta from York to become champion of the 138# weight class. Congratulations Scott!

Jeff Brisbane, a sophomore, pinned Anthony LaBlanc from Mount Morris; decided over Paul Mancuso from LeRoy; pinned Bill Goodenow from Warsaw and lost by one point in the finals to Dave Janiro from Caledonia. Jeff received a second place red ribbon.

Kyle Leonard, a freshman, lost to Rod Warner from Dansville in the first round.

Pete Farr, a sophomore, lost to Bill Condon from ER in the semi-finals. (There were only 5 contestants in this class). Pete defeated Randy Jones from Dansville in the Consolation to take third place.

Bob Smith, a sophomore, won by a forfeit when his opponent was injured in a previous round. In the finals Bob pinned Dale Marsh from Keshequa and became champion of the 215 pound weight class. Congratulations Bob!

There were eight East Rochester wrestlers who participated in the tournament; six of them became Champions. John Walczak, one of the champs, stated that his coach calls for one hour of practice before school and two and half hours after school. They run or lift everyday. They must run on their own time, too. On the day of a match, they run 25 laps with 10 sprints. These boys are in condition and have been coached well to have captured six first place trophies and two second place ribbons.

Wrestling is a thinking sport as well as a very physical one. It is a one on one situation to demonstrate skills, stamina, sportsmanship, endurance, and strength. Wrestling is a very old sport that dates back to the picture writing on the walls of caves in 776 BC. -- M. Regan

kindergarten or first grade, there's a better than even chance that there are others in your class with the same first name.

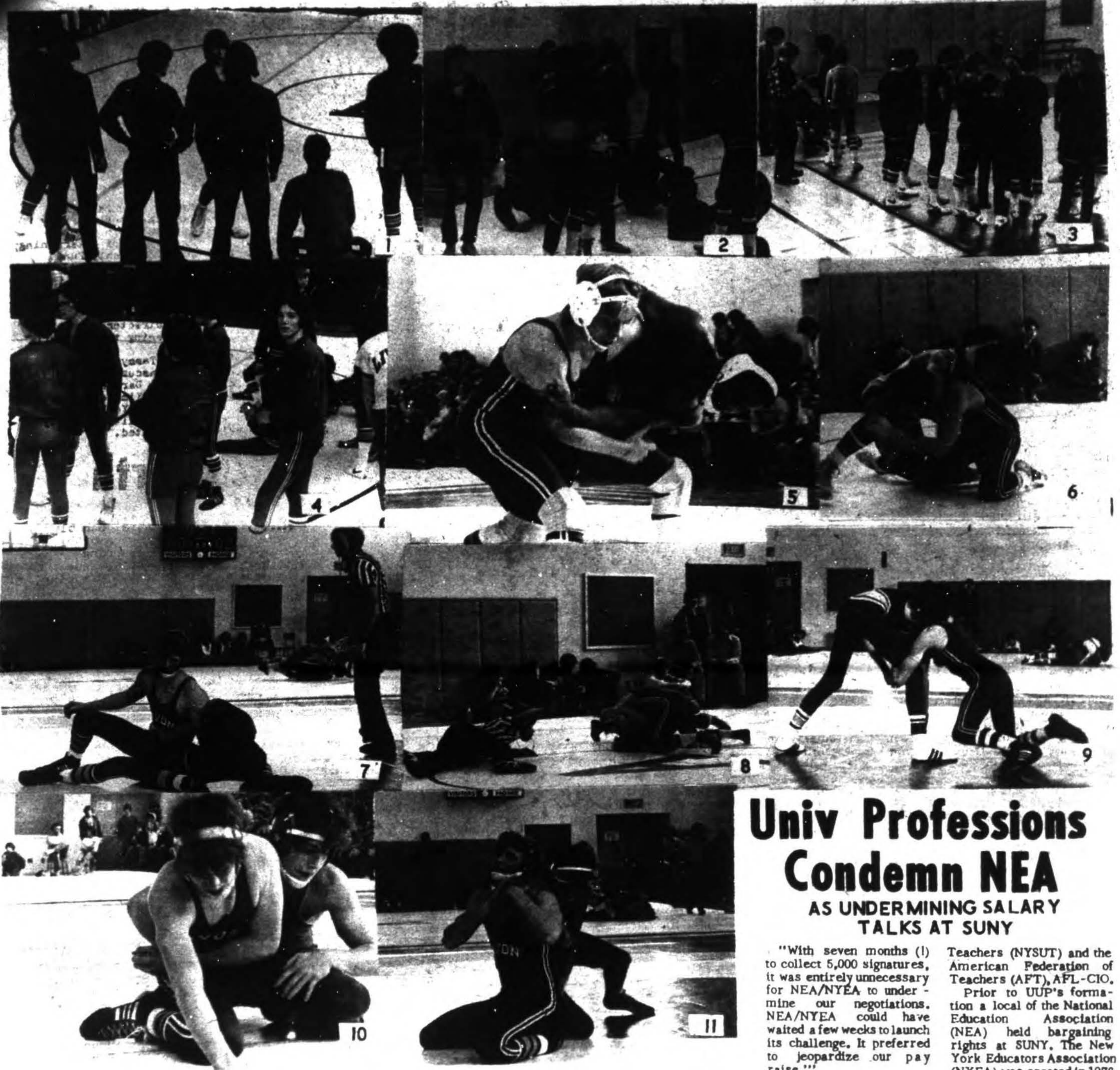
Jennifer and Michael, as in the last five years, once again lead the list of most popular names given to 130,000 children born to upstate New York parents during 1977.

The State Health Department's Office of Biostatistics, as it has done for the last several years, released a "top ten" list of the most frequently chosen first names, compiled during the routine computer processing of 1977 birth records.

Boys' names have remained fairly consistent over the past five years with the names Jason and Brian, second and third in 1977, replacing Scott and Steven of five years ago.

Girls' names on the other hand show a much greater change. Sarah and Jessica, third and fifth respectively last year, have not appeared in the top ten of recent years. Univ Professions Condemn NEA AS UNDERMINING SALARY TALKS AT SUNY

"With seven months (1) to collect 5,000 signatures, it was entirely unnecessary for NEA/NYEA to undermine our negotiations. NEA/NYEA could have waited a few weeks to launch its challenge. It preferred to jeopardize our pay raise."

That charge is part of what United University Professions (UUP) President Sam Wakshull told all 18,000 members of the State University of New York's academic and professional staff in a letter mailed Feb. 21.

UUP, which has just topped 7,000 members, has been the collective bargaining agent at SUNY since 1973. It is affiliated with the New York State United

STATE ACTS ON EYEGLASS COMPLAINTS

The State Board of Regents has asked the legislature for \$132,000 to hire seven full-time investigators to handle thousands of complaints from consumers that their eyeglasses were improperly prescribed, did not fit properly or were overpriced.

Teachers (NYSUT) and the American Federation of Teachers (AFT), AFL-CIO.

Prior to UUP's formation a local of the National Education Association (NEA) held bargaining rights at SUNY. The New York Educators Association (NYEA) was created in 1978 following NYSUT's withdrawal from NEA.

In his letter to the SUNY faculty and staff UUP's Wakshull cites three reasons the State and SUNY's central administration "would prefer NEA/NYEA to UUP as (the) collective bargaining agent" for SUNY's academics and professionals. Among them is NEA's poor performance in negotiating the first SUNY contract in 1971; others are NEA/NYEA's political impotence and its failure to build a local at SUNY or to attract members from institutions of higher education.

Wakshull also accuses NEA/NYEA of having violated State rules which limit proselytizing on "work sites" to a 90-day period immediately preceding the month in which a challenging union must file cards asking for an election.
