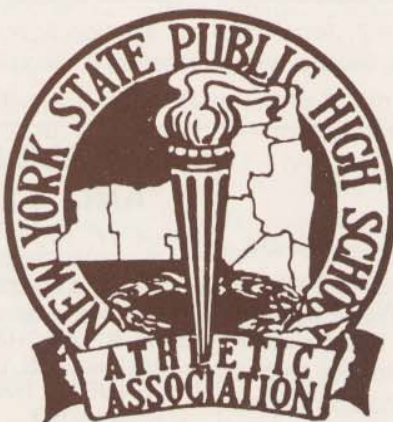

CHAIRMAN BOB WOODRUFF

Wrestling has been the fastest-growing scholastic sport in New York State during the past decade, and one of the leaders in making our sport so popular has been well-known former coach at Van Hornesville, Bob Woodruff.

Since 1954, Bob has also served as the New York State Wrestling Chairman, and it has been during his years at the helm that wrestling has mushroomed in popularity.

Woodruff has had many memories concerning the growth of New York State wrestling. Here, in his own words, Bob recalls some highlights of his 40-year career.

"I was graduated from Springfield College in 1932 with a B.S. degree, and I started in Van Hornesville (now Owen D. Young Central) in 1932-33. I was only part-time in the first year and combined it with graduate work at St. Lawrence University, receiving an M.A. in Education in 1933. I have done post-graduate work at Syracuse, both in physical education and administration.

"I never competed in wrestling while in college (I was on the boxing team) but while at St. Lawrence got interested in wrestling in the sports classes. I followed the team, coached by Roy Clagston, and he also sponsored the St. Lawrence Invitational Tournament for high schools.

Since there was no gym in Van Hornesville (we finally got one in 1955) wrestling was a logical sport to start, which we did in 1933-34. We had no mat and practiced on church pew cushions which I cadged from a local church. We wrestled Little Falls a couple of times that year, with them furnishing the mat.

"The next year we bought a 12 by 12 mat which we used for several years and had our home meets in what must have been the most luxurious wrestling surroundings in the country, with hanging chandeliers, drapes, curtains etc.

"In our earlier matches in order to keep the wrestlers from hitting the floor the crowd would move their chairs up to the edge of the mat and when the boys went off the people would push them back on, many times with wrestling continuing. We later bought some surrounding mats and a rubber cover, bringing us up to 20 by 20.

"Most of my coaching experience was gained from Billy Sheridan, the legendary Lehigh coach, at summer clinics: It was at one of these in the middle or late 1930s that I met Sprig Gardner and began a life-long friendship with this man who did so much for high school wrestling in New York State.

"Other coaches in those days who have contributed to the sport over the years included Clyde Cole at Oxford, Bob Carr at Watertown (both were later in the State Department of Physical Education), John Oliver at Canton, Frank Giltner and Kurt Beyer at Norwich, and the late Wilbur Crisp, who was my old high school coach.

"There were not many high school teams in the '30s and we competed with college freshmen team (St. Lawrence and Syracuse) and the Ithaca YMCA. Incidentally, Coach Jim Miller of Cornell wrestled against us as a member of the Ithaca "Y" team, and I believe that Kirk Douglas, the movie star, also wrestled against us while at St. Lawrence.

REFLECTS BACK

"I never kept track of my overall won-lost record, but we had mostly winning seasons, perhaps because we had no basketball team and were also fortunate to have a group of strong farm boys.

"In the 1930s, St. Lawrence hosted an invitational tournament, a forerunner to our sectional and state tournaments. We were second in 1936 and won the championship in 1937 at the end of an undefeated season. Sprig Gardner, brought Mephram to the 1938 and 1939 tournaments, and of course won them, as Long Island wrestling and Mempham started their years of domination.

"We also won a combined Section 3-4 Tournament in Norwich in 1944.

"In those days upstate wrestling was concentrated in Northern New York (Watertown, Gouverneur, Canton, Ogdensburg, Potsdam, Malone) and Central New York (Norwich, Sherburne, Oxford, Whitesboro, Little Falls, Richfield Springs, Van Hornesville).

"Ithaca had no high school team there then, but Bill Layton, who was coaching the Ithaca "Y" would bring several of the good boys on his squad to the St. Lawrence tournament and had several individual champions. I remember Bill driving up to one tournament on a motorcycle in a howling blizzard (He recovered.)

"I became principal in 1942 and continued to coach until 1945 when Jack Williams, now of Cicero High, succeeded me, followed by Charles Schalk.

"I became active in Section Three as wrestling chairman and as a section officer in the early 1950s and directed several Section Three tournaments with the assistance of Ed Weed, Bill Fariel and others.

"In 1955 Sprig Gardner, who was the first chairman of the State Wrestling Committee, resigned and, I think, conducted a one-man election designating me as his successor.

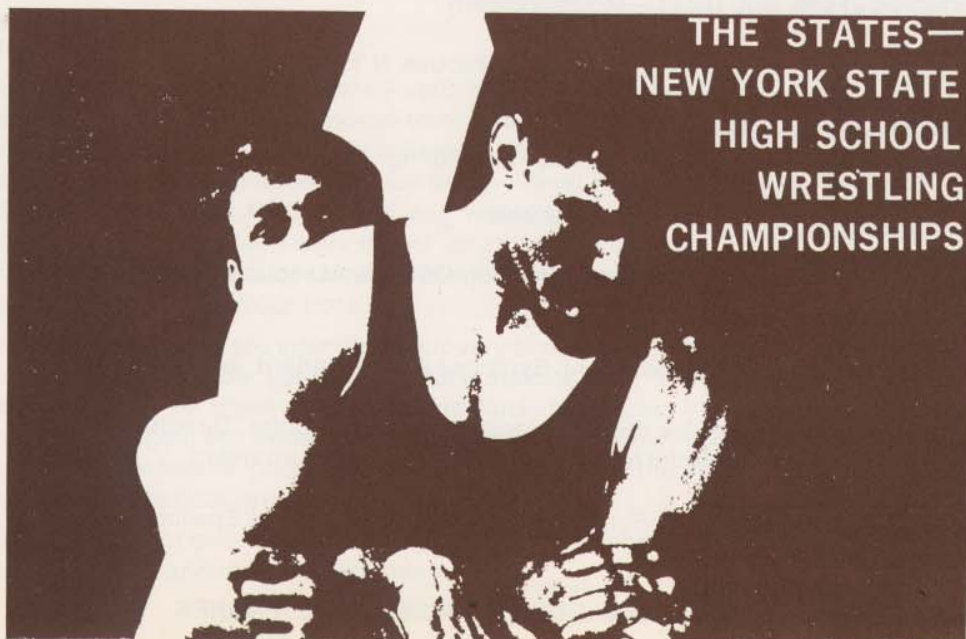
"At that time only about 55 schools in the state sponsored wrestling. Today we have over 500.

"In 1963 we held our first Intersectional tournament at Cornell under the able direction of Jim Howard (now of Oswego State). This has now grown until all 11 sections of the State Athletic Association are participating with interest and attendance at an all-time high. This annual event is now being directed by Reed Hawke, Section Three chairman and host.

"I served for several years as a member of the Executive and Central Committees of the State Athletic Association, representing Section Three, and was appointed to the NCAA National Rules Committee in 1968, serving until 1971.

"In June I will have rounded out 40 years of school service and plan to retire at the end of the school year. It has been a privilege to have had a part in the development and progress of high school wrestling."

This, then, is the man who has achieved so much, and contributed so much of his time and energy to the sport of wrestling. For all he has done, we, the friends of wrestling in New York State, salute Bob Woodruff during the occasion of the 10th annual Intersectional Tournament at the Onondaga County War Memorial.

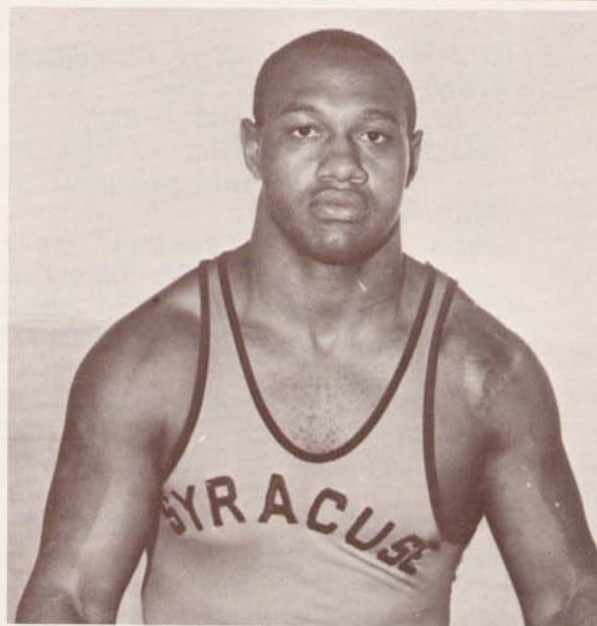



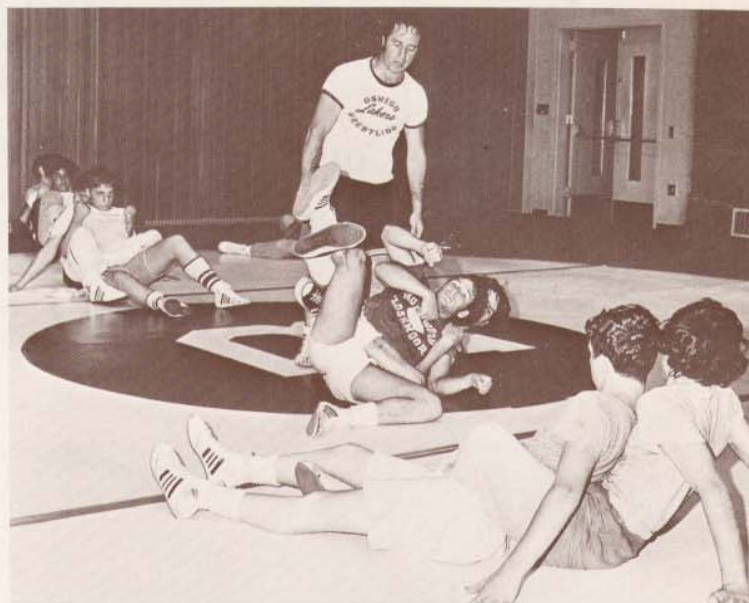

Mighty Brentwood was Best in 1970-71

Thanks mainly to powerful Brentwood High, Section 11 (Suffolk County, L.I.) muscled to a first-place finish, with 82 points, here at last year's Ninth Annual Intersectional Wrestling Tournament.

Brentwood, coached by Joe Campo, last March advanced a six-man delegation into the semifinals—an Intersectional first—and finished with three firsts, a second, a third and a fourth.

Campo's mighty team had three champions in Ivan Gonzales at 112, David Larrache at 119 and Bob Antonacci at 126. This feat tied an Intersectional record for most champions from one school. Mephram of Section Eight crowned champions Bill DeSario (112), Tom Gleason (145) and Jack Paz (180) at the 1964 Intersectionals.

Section 11 finished ahead of defending champion Section Three, with 72 points, and Section Eight, with 59 points, a year ago.

This was the first sectional title for the Long Island Suffolk delegation. Through nine state meets, Section Eight has won the team title five times (1963-64-66-67-68), Section Four (Southern Tier) has won it twice (1965 and 1969), while Sections 11 and Three has accounted for the other two titles.

A number of other noteworthy events took place here in March of 1971, and are worth recalling.

Named as the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" by the voting press was Elmira Free Academy's John Cuyler, a senior who won the 145-pound championship. Cuyler finished with 51 straight victories over two years, as he had won the Intersectional 138-pound title the previous year here.

At heavyweight, the winner was big Jim Rosecrans from West Genesee High in Syracuse. Jim's victory enabled Section Three to take heavyweight honors a third consecutive year, having had champions in 1970 (Mike Phillips of Cooperstown) and 1969 (Bill McCauley of Skaneateles).

Section Three's Charlie Franks of Tully, who is 21-0, will try to make it four straight at heavyweight this weekend.

Another outstanding wrestler last year was the state runnerup at 112 pounds, 15-year-old Dan Hunt of West Genesee. His effort was little short of sensational, because he was only a freshman at the time, competing in his first year of varsity wrestling. Hunt lost to Brentwood's Gonzales, 5-2, in the championship match.

Hunt returns this year, undefeated, as a 16-year-old sophomore in the 119-pound class, and he is well worth watching.

Two wrestlers return who won championships last year—Joe Goldsmith of Ramapo (Section Nine) and Brentwood's Bob Antonacci. Goldsmith won at 105 last year, and is returning at 112 pounds this time. Antonacci will shoot for a second straight 126-pound crown.

The 250-pound class champion in 1971 was Mount Vernon's Bob Hill, who had finished second the previous year.

Another outstanding champion was 167-pound Kurt Blank of Irondequoit (Section Five) who was also a repeater at the Intersectionals.

Later in the spring, EFA's Cuyler and Irondequoit's Blank were both named as All-Americans by Scholastic Wrestling News magazine. Cuyler finished his scholastic career with a record of 80-3, while Blank had a two-year varsity record of 56-2.

Mount Vernon's Hill was an honorable mention choice by the editors of Scholastic Wrestling News. All in all, it was an exciting state tourney last year, and this 1972 event promises to be another great one.

Can Long Island be Beaten?

In the previous nine New York State Intersectional Wrestling Tournaments, athletes from Long Island's Sections Eight and 11 have provided the team champion on six occasions, including last year, when Section 11 triumphed with 82 points.

Long Island has always been a hotbed of wrestling in this state, and the upstate teams have had great difficulty outscoring the muscular squads from both Nassau County (Section Eight) plus Suffolk County (11).

This year should be no exception as both Long Island teams come to the War Memorial with highly-touted grapplers. The Suffolk delegation includes four more matmen from Brentwood, the team which furnished three state champions at the War Memorial last year.

This weekend, the sections that rate the best chance of edging out Long Island's best in the battle for team honors are the only upstate sections that have ever interrupted the Long Island dominance—Section Three (Central New York) and Section Four (Binghamton-Ithaca-Elmira region).

Section Three has seen a tremendous surge of interest in wrestling the past three years, and the gold-garbed CNY team placed first in 1970, second to Section 11 last year. The host team again looks very strong, and could surprise the perennial Long Island favorites.

Section Four won the state title in both 1965 and 1969, but slumped badly last year, finishing ninth. This year, that team looks much-improved and may surprise some opponents this weekend.

All eleven New York State sections are again represented here, and Syracuse wrestling supporters bid welcome to all of our fellow mat followers.

This tenth annual tourney should be action-packed since only the champions from all over the state have qualified for this event. Their individual records are tremendous. At 126 pounds, for instance, the entire field shows only six losses, with competitors in that class sporting the following records: 22-0, 23-0, 25-1, 26-2-1, 19-0, 20-3, 12-0, 17-0, 18-0, 20-0, and 26-0-1.

That 126-pound field includes defending state champion Bob Antonacci of Brentwood, 26-0-1.

Although mighty Brentwood is considered to be at the top of New York State in this sport, it should be noted that coach Stan Riggs' Peru High team of Section Seven has earned 115 straight dual meet wins over nine years, and that streak is believed to be the nation's longest.

A pair of Section Six teams, Niagara-Wheatfield and Portville, also both own long win streaks, and those two both have qualified athletes here in the state finals today.

Again this year, no pre-meet seedings have been issued, and as pairings for this event were drawn from a hat. This practice is the fairest possible, although it does mean, of course, that two of the best wrestlers in a particular weight class could meet in the first round.

One example of that inevitable event this year may occur at 105 pounds, where Bob Sloand of Niagara-Wheatfield tangles with Glenn Reed of Valley Stream South in the first match. Those two are rumored to be among the state's very best.

To the outstanding wrestler today will go a trophy, awarded by the New York State Sports Writers' Association for the third straight year. The previous award winners, as voted by the working press, were heavyweight champion Mike Phillip of Cooperstown (Section Three) in 1970 plus John Cuyler of Elmira Free Academy (Section Four) last March.

A special note of congratulations today should be extended to our own Section Three wrestling chairman, Reed Hawke of Jamesville-DeWitt. An able organizer who has supervised all the state tournaments in Syracuse in recent years, Hawke has been chosen as the next New York State Wrestling Chairman, and will begin those duties next year.

Today, to all teams and wrestlers, we in Syracuse extend our congratulations for having earned a trip to the New York State Intersectional Tournament. Good luck, and we hope you enjoy your state finals, win or lose.
