

Scholastic Grapplers to Clash Tonight for Titles; Tech, East High Dominates

City interscholastic wrestling champions in nine classes ranging from 105 pounds to 175 and over will be decided this evening at the Tech High School gymnasium in the finals of the annual mat tournament. Shop School, team champions in the Interscholastic League, will show nine of the 18 finalists and will have men in eight of the nine title bouts. The unlimited class crown will be contested by two Techmen, Elias and Victor Hall.

East High may gain the major share of the individual honors by winning the five matches in which its men are entered. Four of the encounters will be between East and Tech representatives, biggest rivals for high school wrestling laurels. West High will have two championship aspirants in Ross Brooks, 118-126-pound division and Jimmy Galt, 126-135. Captain Laxford Anderson, 147-160, is the only man who survived the two days of preliminary rounds early this week.

Brother will fight brother in the race for the 160-175-pound group laurels when Jerry DePrez, of Tech, and Gene DePrez of West clash. Each administered the other's only defeat this season in their two tilts and is primed to win today's deciding tussle. Jerry lost out in the finals last year, but will be faced by a determined battler tonight in his attempt to take the crown. Jerry taught his younger brother the fundamentals of the mat game, but Gene has come along fast and surprised many of gaining a time-advantage decision over Jerry in their second fray. Jerry threw Gene after a hard struggle in the first Tech-West meet to give the Shepmen a close victory.

One Defending Champion

Mentor Hobart Hoff will present a quartet of men who went to the finish round last time in Urbanik, Frank Spronsa, Frank Reddy, and Jerry DePrez. Captain Spronsa has won all his 130-135 tussles this year. He beat Galt, his adversary this evening, twice on time edge. Anderson, who drew with Reddy and won the decision in their second bout, will oppose the Tech grappler in the 147-160.

Two men who have never met will hook up in the 135-147 tilt. Mike Cella, of Tech, has been the regular choice of Coach Hoff. Gene DiPietro, Eastsider, contested in the 126-135-pound section in the first East-Tech meet and won his match when shoved into the 160-175-pound division to fill a gap in the second Oriental-Shop match.

Ross Brooks, of West, will tackle Ralph Serafina, Eastsider in the 118-126-pound bout. Brooks threw Serafina and gained the decision in their encounter.
