## IOWA'S MATMEN FACE BIG TASK

Rivalry Will Be Keen, Taylor Believes.

Grand Rapids, Mich., July 3.—Iowa and other middlewestern athletes here to compete for places on the American Olympic wrestling team in the final try-outs, which are to be held during the next three days, are going to find the honor places difficult to attain, for almost 200 amateur grapplers hailing from every corner of the United States are seeking the berths.

According to C. W. Streit of Birmingham, Ala., manager of the American Olympic wrestling team, and George Pinneo of Grand Rapids, the coach of the team, there has never been a time when so many classy wrestlers sought the National A. A. U. titles which are at stake along with the places on the team. The Multnomah Athletic club of Portland, Ore., has sent a complete team; five wrestlers from Baltimore, Md., are here; Lehigh university has sent a team of five; the Erie, Pa. Boys club is represented with five men; E. C. Gallagher of the Oklahoma Aggies has twenty men here; Coach Hugo Otopalik of Ames and Dick Barker of Cornell are in charge of several boys and Mike Howard of Iowa has two. This is indicative of the entry list.

### Champions on Hand.

All but one of last year's National A. A. U. champions are here to defend their titles and to challenge the right of all other rivals to places on the team. In addition, Charles W. Strack of the Oklahoma Aggies, who won the 191 pound title in 1924 and still holds it, since no competition has been held in that division in the last three years, will defend it, and Harry Steele, formerly of Ohio State university, who won the Olympic heavyweight championship four years ago, is among those who will oppose Roger Flanders of Stillwater, Okla., the present National A. A. U. heavyweight titlenoider.

Leroy Pfeffer, former Iowa university grappler, who won the 112-pound title a year ago, is the only champion who will not defend his honors. Two other Iowans, however, Lyle Morford of Clarion and Gordon Rosenberg of Iowa Falls, are among the six entered in this class.

### Holding Seeks Honors.

Arthur Holding of Ames, last year's 123-pound champion, will compete in the meet but will not try for honors in that weight as he has grown heavier and is entered here in the 134-pound class. There are thirty-seven entries in the former weight, however, among them being Harold De Marsh of the Oklahoma Aggies, Ralph Lupton of Northwestern university, who lives at Toledo, Ia., and who formerly wrestled under Cornell college colors; George Campbell, Laverne Lake and Matthew Hesser of Oklahoma Aggies; Richard Cole, Ames; Bobby Pearce of Cushing, Okla., and Theodore Hesmer, Illinois university, whose home is at Marshalltown.

In the 134-pound class, Allie Morrison of Marshalltown, Ia., who won the Big Ten lightweight title while representing the University of Illinois, will defend his

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## TILDEN, HUNTER WIN AT DOUBLES

Victory Puts Americans in Semifinals.

Wimbledon, England, July 3 (U.P.)—With all singles play suspended, the all-England tennis championships were given over to doubles play today, the United States Davis cup doubles team of William T. Tilden, II, and Francis T. Hunter reaching the semifinals after the unexpected loss of the first set of their match with the English Davis cup players, G. R. O. Crolerees and C. G. Eames. The scores were 4-6, 6-1, 6-3, 6-2.

The versatile French also placed a team in the doubles semifinals when Henri Cochet and Jacques Brugnon defeated the Dutch-Siamese team of H. Timer and H. C. Fisher, 6-3, 6-4, 9-7.

Jean Borotra and Rene Lacoste, however, were eliminated from the doubles competition when the Australian team of Gerald Patterson and J. B. Hawkes defeated them, 6-3, 5-7, 6-4, 9-7, and entered the last eight. Patterson and Hawkes will play the Argentine team of Boyd and Robson next for the right to meet Tilden and Hunter in one semifinal.

### Lott, Hennessey Lead.

The young United States Davis cup team of George Lott and John Hennessey was prevented from entering the semifinals when rain halted the match with R. O. Cummings and E. F. Moon of Australia with Lott and Hennessey leading, 6-1, 6-1. The match will be completed tomorrow, with the winner to meet Cochet and Brugnon in the other doubles semifinal.

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title, which he has held for two successive years. Among the thirty-two others whom he must oppose are Arthur Holding of Ames, Dallas O'Neal and J. B. Moore of Oklahoma Aggies, Tom Cox of Kansas university and Verne Schmidt of Reinbeck, Ia., former Ames star.

Among the contenders in this class is Chester Newton, who was runnerup to Robin Reed of the Oregon Aggies in the 1921 Olympic games.

That year each country could enter two contestants in each weight. This year, however, each team may enter only one man in the Olympic. Two men in each weight will be taken across, one serving as an alternate.

Ralph Prunty of Bondurant, Ia., former Ames athlete who was victorious in the 145-pound division a year ago, is only one of thirty-one men competing at that weight. Among his rivals are Arlie Tomlinson, Frank Brown, Clarence Berryman and Melvin Clodfelter of Oklahoma Aggies and Walter Young of Stillwater, Okla.

## Beers Will Wrestle.

In the 160-pound class, Fandley Collins, the champion, will compete with James Blair of Ames, Lloyd Appleton of Cornell college, Leslie Beers of Iowa university and Louis Orr of Iowa State Teachers college. There are twenty-nine contenders in this class and most of them of championship caliber.

Twenty-two will strive for the 170-pound honors, including George Rule of Oklahoma Aggies, the national champion; Jack Ricks, his teammate, and Ralph Hammond, Texas university star.

The meet here is being held under the auspices of Furniture City post, American Legion of Grand Rapids. A raised platform with sloping sides and no ropes, conforming to the Olympic rules, has been erected in a local park in the open. All wrestling will be done in the sun or rain as the case may be.

Matches will be of nine minutes duration with two extra three-minute periods if it is impossible to pick a winner in the regulation time.

The weights this year vary a little from those at last year's National A. A. U. meet, the change having been made to conform to Olympic weights.

According to the program, wrestling will begin at 1:30 o'clock each afternoon and bouts will be held continuously from that time until midnight. There will be no matches tomorrow, however, in the 112-pound class and possibly in the 191-pound and heavyweight classes.

Wrestlers with the exception of the heavyweights, will be compelled to weigh in every morning.
