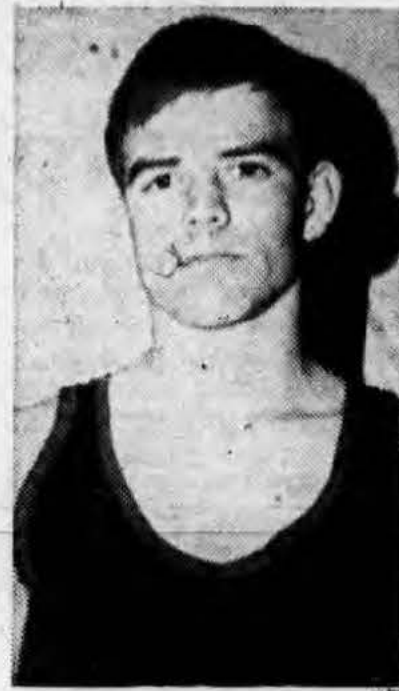




Advance to State Tourney —

Achilles, Gustin, Hadsell Win Section 5 Mat Titles

Geneva's Steve Achilles and Gary Gustin and Dick Hadsell of Canandaigua earned the right to compete in the first state wrestling tournament involving representatives from Section 5.

The trio scored Section 5 victories Saturday, winning in the Class A tournament at Brockport State College and then beating their Class B champion counterparts.

Achilles won the 133 pound title by beating Rick Pace of Corning West, 4-0, for the Class A shield and then defeated Victor's Penn Sheldon, Class B champion, 4-0, in the championship bout.

Gustin, Canandaigua's 95 pound champion, defeated Tim McEwan of Webster for the Class A shield, 4-0, and then turned back John Gerhardt of Attica, 4-0, for the Section 5 title.

Hadsell, 127 pounder from Canandaigua, defeated Phil Serafine of Webster, 3-2, for the Class A title, and then defeated Victor's Marty Brake, 7-4, for the sectional crown.

Bob Bradshaw of Canandaigua, won the Class A title at 154 pounds when he defeated Ben Brockway of Corning West, 5-1, but he lost a tough referee's decision in overtime to Ron Pobjowski of Arcade. The two had battled to a 6-6 tie in regulation and were scoreless in overtime. Pobjowski came close to scoring a reversal which probably accounted for his gaining the referee's decision.

Gustin is scheduled to wrestle in the state meet for the first time on Friday while Hadsell and Achilles aren't due to report for the first time until Saturday.

Tom Cook of Canandaigua finished third in the overall results when he lost to Jim Nowak of Eastridge in the Class A finals, 9-4.

Bruce Trumbull of Canandaigua wound up fourth in the tournament, losing the Class A final to Gary Harvey of Corning West, 5-1.

Fred Pearce of Waterloo took a third in the overall tournament, losing to Jim Tortorici of East Rochester in the Class A finals, 7-1.

In other Class A results, Al Calabro of Mynderse was fifth at 103 pounds; John Miller of Canandaigua was seventh at 112 pounds; Ralph Byrne of Mynderse was fifth at 138 pounds; heavyweight Al Tiberio of Canandaigua was sixth, and unlimited wrestler Jim Hunt of Canandaigua was fifth.

Brake and Sheldon of Victor won sectional shields by copping Class B championships only to lose in the sectional finals.

Chip Romano of Odessa-Montour lost in the Class B final at 138 pounds to Bill Dempsey of Geneseo, 8-2, and Jim Kenny of Phelps lost in the Class B final to Bob Hildebrandt of York.

Both Romano and Kenny lost in the consolation Section 5 match to finish fourth in the tournament.

Other Class B results found Frank Hendershot of Phelps finishing sixth at 95 pounds while Frank Borra of Odessa-Montour failed to make weight at 103 pounds.

Bill Nolder of Phelps finished at 112 pounds and Ben Babcock of Trumansburg was sixth at 120 pounds.

Jim Heffron of Phelps wound up eighth at 154 pounds and Dick Beniamino of Phelps was sixth at 165 pounds. Gary VanDerzee of Trumansburg was eighth at 180 pounds.

Canandaigua won the Class A team championship with 58 points, far outstripping runner-up Corning East, which was second with 20 points.

Mynderse took third with 15 points, followed by East High,

Bonnies Close to Unbeaten Season

By THE ASSOCIATED PRESS St. Bonaventure's basketball team is a step closer to its first undefeated season in 30 years after sweeping past Niagara University, 97-84, at Buffalo Sunday.

The last time the Bonnies completed a basketball season without a loss was in 1937-38, when their record was 9-0.

So far this season, the Olean quintet has posted 21 victories and is the nation's fourth-ranked college team.

Looking ahead, St. Bonaventure winds up its regular schedule March 5 against Fairfield, Conn., and then goes into the NCAA tournament, where its first-round opponent will be Boston College.

Bob Lanier paced the Bonnies in the Niagara game with 30 points. Niagara's Calvin Mur-

phy, the nation's second-highest scorer, was held to 24 points.

Wins Daytona 500 — 'We'll Learn to Handle Speeds,' Says Yarborough

(AP) — "We'll learn how to handle these speeds," predicted Cale Yarborough, after winning his second straight major race on the banked asphalt track at Dayton International Speedway where high velocity qualifying turned into low key racing for the second year in a row.

It was obvious from the 58 caution laps that the nation's best stock car drivers didn't have things under control in Sunday's \$200,000 Daytona 500. The record crowd of 94,800 saw the survivors regroup behind the caution car 11 times and parade at slow speed for more than one-fourth of the race as a series of accidents eliminated all but 22 of the 50 starters.

The crowd's compensation for patience was a sensational finish in which Yarborough passed his Mercury Cyclone teammate, Lee Roy Yarborough (no relation) of Columbia, S.C., three laps from home and took the checkered flag less than one second in front.

Bobby Allison of Hueytown, Ala., and David Pearson of Spartanburg, S.C., made it a

great day for Ford-Mercury when they finished third and fourth in a pair of Ford Torinos.

The next four places went to Paul Goldsmith of Munster, Ind., and Darel Dieringer of Charlotte in Plymouths, Al Unser of Albuquerque, N.M., in a Dodge and Richard Petty of Randleman, N.C., in a Plymouth.

Tiny Lund of Cross, S.C., was ninth in a Mercury and Andy Hampton of Louisville, Ky., 10th in a Dodge.
