of Canisteo and vicinity made the instructive tour of inspection, Each of the 89 historical documents aboard the train proved a source of valuable instruction. These priceless documents show

the foundations and trace the growth of liberty in the Empire State and they have been assembled for a display in a "classroom on wheels" which, wherever it has gone, has brought a deepened awareness of the State's rich heritage. many of the documents Since aboard the train are irreplaceable,

elaborate security measures have been taken to insure their safe-keeping. A basic, precautionary feature is the all-steel welded construction of the entire train, and the heavy steel sheeting of the three exhibit cars specially constructed for the train tour. A fire-extinguishing system employing carbon-dioxide was cus-tom-built and installed in the ex-

hibit cars. This system is entirely automatic and is activated by means of a temperature-pressure device. Tested protection for the documents has been obtained by the extensive usage of a new type of lucite plastic, manufactured to meet Freedom train specifications as suggested by document experts of the National Archives in Washington and the New York State Library. Every one of the valuable docu-

plastic sheets, which are firmly anchored by silver-headed bolts inside specially designed steel cases. These cases are covered with shatterproof glass sheets and are imbedded into steel plate walls with security screws. Eich plastic "envelope" protect-
