

GHS Wrestlers, Swimmers Win 8 Section 5 Shields

Three Matmen Unbeaten; Duck Wins 2 Titles

ROCHESTER—Seven Geneva High School wrestlers and swimmers today are sporting eight Section 5 shields after having won championships in finals here, Saturday.

In wrestling, Phil Choffin, Bob Pollino, Dave Morocco and Nelson Principe came off with titles while in swimming, Bill Duck took two and Bill Brown and Bryan Payson gained one each.

All four wrestling winners gained their victories via decisions as Choffin ground out a 7-3 win, Pollino scored an 8-2 decision, Dave Morocco romped to an 11-0 victory and Principe came off with a 6-2 win.

Principe's victory should go down in medical as well as wrestling history. The 145 pound grappler, one of three Genevians who went through the entire season without a loss, has a plastic valve in his heart. Pollino and Morocco were also unbeaten.

As a freshman, Principe had only one match. Then operations and the recovery period kept him out of action for the next two seasons. He spent 14 hours on the operating table while the valve was being inserted in his heart.

At that time, it looked extremely doubtful that Principe would ever be able to take to the mat. But the operation was a complete success and Saturday Principe experienced the thrill of a lifetime, winning the Section 5 championship shield.

So impressive was the grappler that he has been accepted at Rochester Institute of Technology where his coach was more than a little impressed.

Geneva coach Elmer Leach reported that Choffin and Morocco, both juniors, have been elected co-captains for next season, succeeding Pollino.

Geneva's four shield winners gave the Panthers unofficial claim to the mythical Section 5 team title. Rochester schools took three crowns, Corning Free Academy had three and Webster had two.

Geneva's fifth entry in the finals, Bill Brooks, came close to winning a shield, but lost on a 2-6 overtime decision.

Arnie Nicklin, in the consolation round, won a third place in the section by pinning his foe in the second period.

For Morocco and Pollino, victory was vindication for losses in the finals last season. Brooks, for the second straight year, has reached the finals only to lose.

Morocco drew raves from the Rochester West coach who considers the Genevian the best wrestler he's seen in 12 years.

RIT may have a decided Geneva look in future years. Pollino also has submitted his application to the Rochester school.

A disqualification cost Geneva the Section 5 swim title and dropped them to third place in the standings. Irondequoit scored 79 points to take the crown followed by Canandaigua with 71 and Geneva with 62. Hornell was fourth with 56 points.

In the medley relay, a false start was called against Geneva's second man. Geneva went on to win the event which would have meant an additional 14 points for the Panthers. It would have reduced Irondequoit's total by four points making Geneva the winner, 76-75.

The Genevians set two records in new events in the sectional. Bill Duck set the standard in the 400 yard free style event with a 5:23.5 clocking. Bryan Payson set the mark in the breaststroke with a 1:18.1 timing.

Duck also captured the 200 yard free style, winning in 2:21.7 while Bill Brown scored a shield victory in the fancy diving with a 54.00 point total.

As in wrestling, Geneva's four individual swimming championships led the field. Irondequoit had three and Canandaigua and Hornell had one each.

Duck shared double victory honors with Webster Francis of Irondequoit who won the 50 yard free style and the individual medley relay events.

Other winners were Livingston of Irondequoit in the butterfly; Mills of Hornell in the backstroke; Walker of Canandaigua in the 100 yard freestyle; Irondequoit in the medley relay and Canandaigua in the freestyle relay.

Movies Convince Scout; Mendez Signs Pro Pact

If the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League have a good passer and their line can open up any kind of a hole, they'll have a man with them this fall who can catch the pass or get through the hole.

Garry Mendez, one of the finest halfbacks ever to come out of Hobart College, has signed a \$7,500 contract with the Alouettes for the 1958 grid campaign.

Mendez, who reports to Montreal July 1, confided today that "I'm pretty scared." He had felt an initial burst of confidence after signing with the Alouettes, but "when I started to read who they have playing with them, I got a little nervous."

The slender senior's apprehension is offset, however, by the glowing praise heaped on by his coach, Eddie Tryon. During the past season, Tryon described Mendez in the following manner:

"He is as good a halfback as we've ever had and he improves with every game. He's gained ground for us this year that we had no right to expect. He's done it with sheer drive. He's learned to run in the right spots and he's vicious on defense. If he breaks away, he'll go all the way."

Tryon was instrumental in arranging the deal between Mendez and the Montreal club. He is a close friend of the team's assistant coach, Jimmy Dunn, since both played under Dick Harlow, but at different schools. Tryon was tutored by Harlow at Colgate, while Dunn did his playing at Western Maryland.

"I showed him some (motion) pictures of Garry, and that was it," Tryon commented today. The Montreal club, Tryon advised, managed to get into the league playoffs last season, but was defeated in the finals.

With an early July start in sight, Mendez intends to "vacation" after graduation in June until his departure for Canada. After the season ends, "I'd like to go into police work — with a probation agency," he revealed. He is a sociology major at Hobart.

The Canadian season begins in August and runs through a 14-game schedule. The early start, according to Mendez, enables the league to complete its slate before the bitter cold weather sets in.

He added that no promise had been made by Montreal concerning a job during the season. The team practices at night, beginning at 5 p. m., and many players are able to hold down daytime jobs throughout the season.

During his four-year career at Hobart, Mendez averaged 5.5 yards per try in 227 carries. His total rushing yardage was 1,227. While at Hobart, he scored 22 touchdowns and one PAT for a total of 133 points. In that time, he also picked up 464 yards at the receiving end of 30 passes, seven for scores.

His best season was 1956, when he gained an average of 7.5 yards per carry, and snared 11 passes for 168 yards. He also chipped in with seven touchdowns.

Mendez statistics for 1957 included: Rushing, 377 yards in 86 carries, 4.4 yard average; punting, 23.18 yard average for 18 punts; scoring, seven touchdowns for 42 points; pass reception, 11 caught.

Mendez was thrown for a loss just one time last season, that for only one yard. He was named to the Little All-America honorable mention list last season.

Manganero, Wright Pace Tribe To 63-55 Victory Over Hilton

LYONS—Having beaten the Monroe County champion, the Waterloo Indians are not looking for an easier time of it when they take on the second place Monroe five Saturday afternoon at the Rochester War Memorial.

The Indians escaped with a 63-55 decision over the Hilton Crimson Cadets, Saturday night, and now face Pittsford, which thumped Clyde Saturday night in another Section 5 Class A contest.

"I understand Pittsford is pretty tough," Waterloo Coach Ed Boudreau commented after his ball game before he knew the Knights had tripped Clyde. Boudreau added that Hilton Coach Ron Eckler had said "We were lucky to beat them for the title."

Boudreau was pleased with the play of his club against Hilton. "I thought the boys played a good game," he commented several times. And it took a good game to stave off a strong second half rally that nearly had the Indians on the ropes.

In the opening minutes of the third period, the Indians built a commanding 35-22 lead but with less than three minutes remaining in the quarter, Hilton had chopped the margin to three points at 37-34.

With 4:15 left in the game, the Cadets had cut another Indian lead of eight points back down to three again at 51-48. But then Joe Manganero, who with Jim Wright had sparked the Tribe all evening, cut loose again to put the contest out of reach. In the final four minutes, Manganero scored eight of his game high total of 25.

Hilton, displaying uncanny accuracy from the foul line, held the lead only once in the game, at 6-5, hitting one basket and four of five charity shots. Then Wright hit on a jump shot, Jim DeCicco scored from inside and after Bill Boothby had made two more free throws, Manganero scored on a jump and Wright drove in for two more points. At the quarter, Waterloo led, 17-12.

WAYLAND — Naples Big Green made a shambles of a Hammondsport man-to-man defense in the first five minutes and went on to gain the first rung in the ladder toward successful defense of their Class C Section 5 championship with a 55-38 victory.

The Big Green had taken a 16-6 lead at the end of the first five minutes when Hammondsport called time out and switched to a zone defense. That slowed the Naples five down and the score stood at 16-8 at the end of the period.

Hammondsport never seriously threatened after that, getting no closer than five points in the third quarter, but the Big Green was not able to put the game out of reach until the last five minutes of the final period.

The Big Green now faces Bolivar, Allegany champ which scored a 68-57 decision over Kendall in a quarterfinal game last Friday. The two clubs will square off at 7 p. m. Wednesday at the Rochester War Memorial.

John Adams, Naples' leading scorer, paced the Big Green against Hammondsport, racking up 15 points, Jim Reed, 6-4 center, added 10 as coach John Clark used every player on the team in the game.

Although Hilton threatened several times, Waterloo dominated the game from the outset in every department except the free throw line. DiCicco and Butch Millman staked out an early claim on rebounds and maintained it most of the time.

Wright, who racked up 14 points for number two scoring honors, turned in the best defensive game of the night with frequent interceptions. Pete French, 5-6 playmaker for the Tribe, also broke up several Hilton plays.
