Charlotte Team Takes Class A Group Crown

Four Rochester grapplers gained Section 5 championships in the Marshall High School gymnasium last night.

Two Madison High pupils, Julius Marrese and Tony Sili-pini, captured the 120-pound and heavyweight titles, respec-tively. Ronnie Perkins of Char-lotte annexed the 127-pound toga, and West High's Bob Nolan won the 154-pound final.

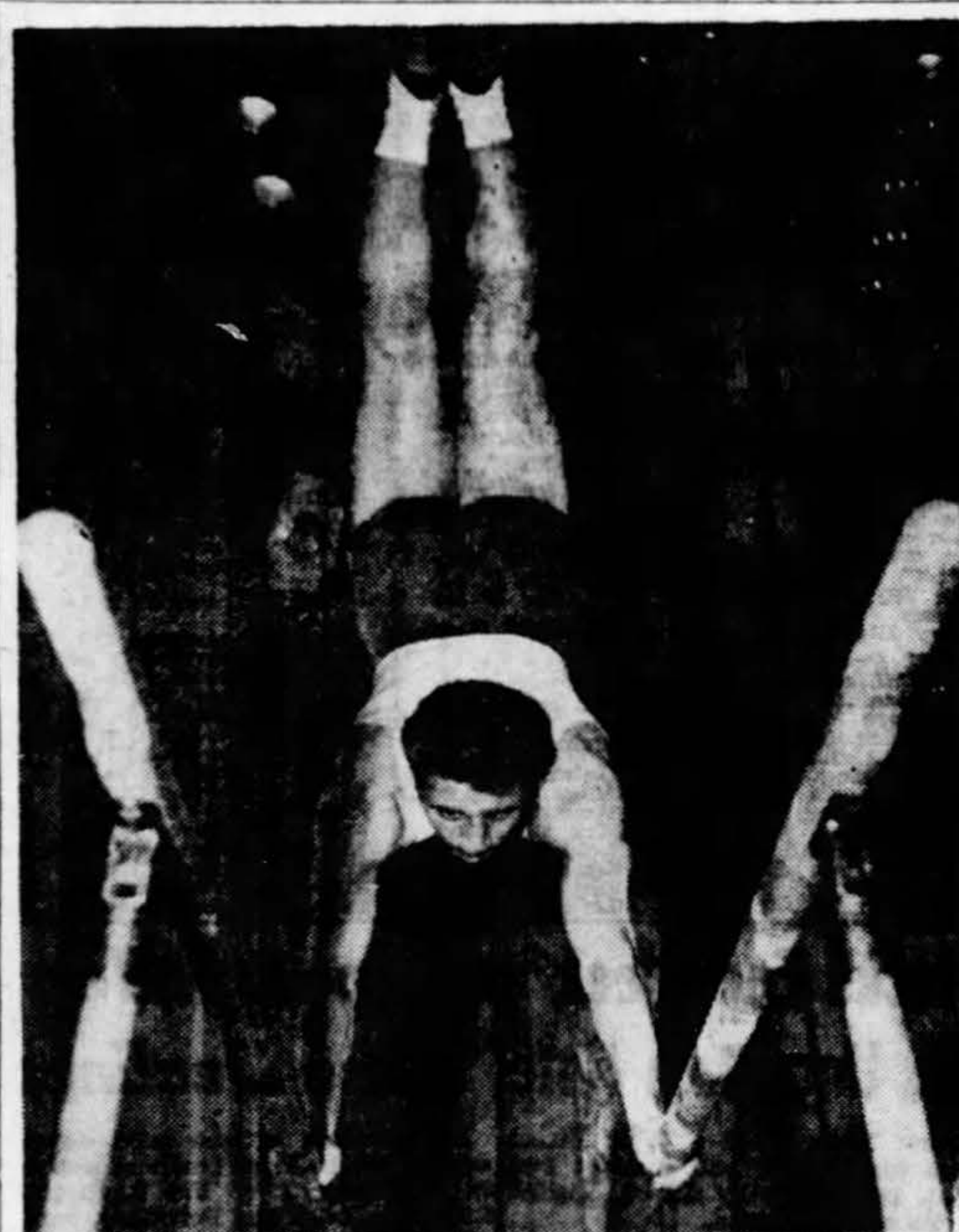
