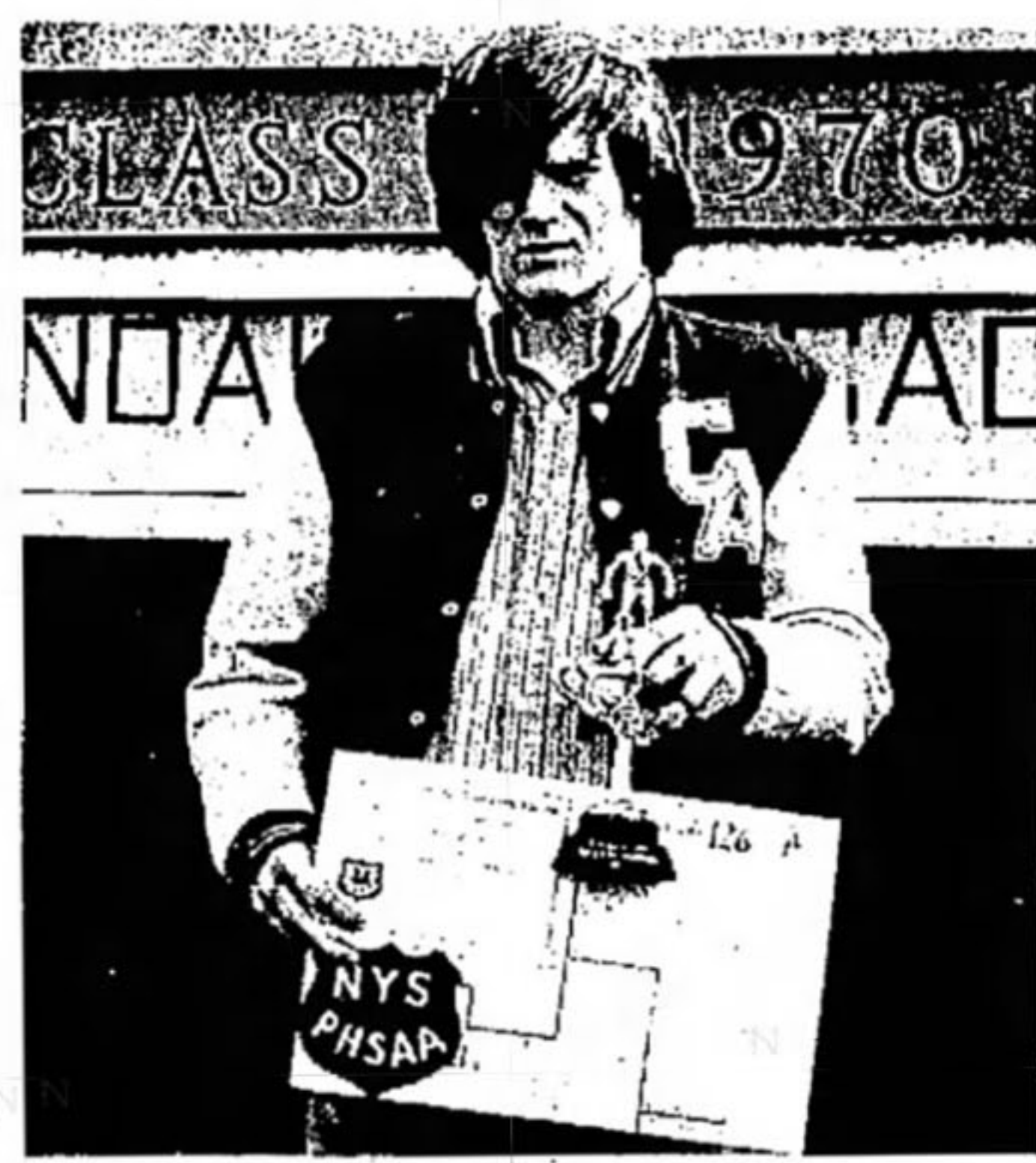


Ahonen, Jones, Krug Win Section 5 Titles



The A schools outwrestled the B schools 12-4 in the overall contest but Caledonia-Mumford had the lions' share with three of the four wrestlers going to the States this weekend.

Tom Buckley at 98, Robin Scott at 108 and Tim Nothnagle at 145 will represent Section 5 for the Red Raiders. On the way to his 155 A-B crown Brad Ahonen of Victor decided Steve Dillman of Honeoye 14-0 at Bath Friday night to reach the semi-finals.

In the semis at Rochester's War Memorial Saturday, Ahonen started his string of pins that could have resulted in his MVP award. He pinned Matt Robinson of Perry in 2:30 and won his Section 5 B crown with a 3:35 pin over Steve Hall of LeRoy.

Big Win

The A-B match against Tim Duffy of East Rochester was a classic in wrestling skills.

Duffy shot for a takedown and Ahonen countered beautifully. Duffy shot another takedown and again Ahonen countered well.

When Duffy shot the third takedown Ahonen used an elevator, threw a figure four on the head and it was all over that quick as the Victor lad had a pin with one second left on the clock. A big win for a real fine wrestler.

Dennis Jones started his string of wins to the Class A and A-B crown with an 8-1 decision over Walt Wu of McQuaid.

Jones then had his toughest match of the weekend with John Brongo of Spencerport. Brongo and Jones were all tied up 4-4 after two periods. Brongo had a takedown and Jones a reversal in the first period and both men a reversal in the second period. Jones had a comment to make about the match at this point.

"I had been getting wrapped, raked in the eyes to this point and I got mad. I know this isn't good but it irked me."

It paid off for Jones as he got three nearfalls in the third period to wrap up Brongo 11-4 to make the finals.

This was a breeze as he was leading 13-4 when he pinned Gary Shutter of Corning-West for the A crown.

Shutter probably will never know unless he reads this column that he fell victim of Jones' wrath perpetrated by an unusual event.

After winning the A crown Jones left to eat and when he returned to suit up for the evening's A-B finals found his shield stolen.

"I was so mad I could cry and I guess it reflected against Tom

Flint of Warsaw. I was ready to beat anybody after losing my equipment."

Coach Canough got Jones another Section 5 shield and if anyone sees a CA uniform with 126 pounds on it gracing someone, will please report it to John Wilcox, Principal of Canandaigua Academy. No rewards are offered — just sentiment.

Mark Krug of Victor is the Section 5 B champion at 122 pounds. He pinned Dave Mehlenbacher of Belmont in the opener at 1:59.

Then he came back with another pin at 3:44 over Andy Lipson of Genesee in the semis and beat Carl Davidson of Dundee 3-2 in overtime for the crown. Davidson had a first period takedown but Krug came back with a three point nearfall in the second period to win the title 3-2.

Chuck Bour of Charlotte decided Krug in the A-B wrestleoffs for the overall crown.

Inexperience

Inexperience may have cost CA's Jimmy White a Section 5 championship. Coach Canough feels that, "Jimmy is only a sophomore. He made a few mistakes but I feel his inexperience was the difference. He could have won the crown but he did a great job and will be around for a couple of years to make his presence felt."

White, winner of his first round lost a 3-2 decision to Chuck Bour who went on to win the A-B crown. White then won the consolation round over Dave Snyder of Bath 7-2.

Bill Bartosch, CA's entry in the 177 pound class got by his first opponent Jim Fleming of Brockport 7-6 and then beat Jay Swift of Penfield 7-3 and lost to Rich McPhee of Rush-Henrietta 5-1 in the finals to finish in second place.

Dave Zimmerman finished fourth for CA in the unlimited division losing 9-0 to Cunnard in the semi-finals and then getting pinned by Dan Verni of R in the consolation round.

Ralph Burgess got eliminated in the quarter finals losing 9-0.

Tom West of Victor got pinned by Tom Buckley of Cal-Mum in the semi finals and then lost a 7-0 decision in the consolation round to finish fourth for Victor.

Scott Shoemaker, Victor's fine 167 pounder, was pinned by Ed Sunderland of Warsaw at 5:17 and then lost a 7-4 decision to Marion's Walt Scott 7-4 in the consolation round to take a fourth place.

Ken Faubel of Victor had the misfortune to draw John Hackamer of Warsaw in the

first round and, lost a 9-2 decision to the defending champ. Faubel then pinned Paul Harrison of Hammondspport.

Finishing in second place for the Finger Lakes was Hargarther of Wayne.

ROCHESTER — The Section 5 wrestling championships are history and three Finger Lakes lads are champions. Two of them will be going to the State Championships this weekend as they won crowns in the A-B intra-sectional tournament, the highlight and final event of a big wrestling weekend.

Brad Ahonen of Victor has to get the rave notice as he not only won the Section 5 B crown and the A-B crown but was awarded the John Ordiway Memorial Award for being the Outstanding Wrestler in Section 5 for this season. The Victor senior has capped a fine varsity career and is a sure candidate for state honors this coming weekend.

Then comes CA's Dennis Jones at 125 pounds. Dennis won the A crown, the A-B crown and was a close second to Ahonen for the Outstanding award. Jones will be going to Syracuse along with Ahonen and the other Section 5 wrestlers to compete against the other sections in the State Finals.

Next comes Mark Krug of Victor. Mark won his Section 5 shield in the B Division and lost in the A-B finals to Chuck Bour of Charlotte.

Team Title

Eastridge won this year's A team title with a 30 point total for the two day meet. Second

was Spencerport with 29, East Rochester 28½ and Canandaigua with 28. Churchville-Chili had 22 and Hilton 21.

This year's B championship was a turnaround from last year's finals. Warsaw came home first with 72 points, Cal-Mum was second with 62 and Victor 36. Last year it was Victor, Cal-Mum, Warsaw.

Dogwood 500 Classic

MARTINSVILLE, Va (UPI) — Defending champions Ray Hendrick of Richmond and Jerry Cook of Rome, N.Y. are among 150 drivers who will try to qualify this week for Sunday's \$54,390 Dogwood 500 Classic at Martinsville Speedway.

The Nascar National Championship double-header consists of a 225-lap late model sportsman race and a 225-lap event for fast modifieds.

Because of the gasoline shortages, each race has been reduced from last year's 250 laps and will cover 118.12 miles on the .525 mile track. Race cars will receive limited amounts of fuel and the starting field has been reduced from 40 to 36 fastest cars.

The winner of each race will earn \$3,725 and 591 Nascar National Championship points. The

ORLANDO, Fla. (UPI) — For whistling Jerry Heard the signs were right, his wife said, and a bogey on the first hole didn't shake his confidence one whit.

"I feel like I have a real good shot at the Masters now," said the 26-year-old Californian who won the \$150,000 Citrus Open Sunday for the second time in three years, his first PGA victory in 22 months. "That's my goal, to win a major championship."

The six-foot 200-pounder, who quit worrying about improving his swing and learned to relax finished three strokes ahead Jim Jamieson, 67-276, and Homero Blancas, 70-276.
