

Rockland has four in semis

STATE WRESTLING

SYRACUSE — Billy White of Suffern, Dave Avdoyan of Tappan Zee, Bill Brundage of Pearl River and Tod Giles of Ramapo advanced to the semifinals of the 17th annual New York State Intersectional Wrestling Tournament Friday night before 3,500 fans at Onondaga County War Memorial.

Those four joined Eric Savacool and Kevin Troche, both of Port Jervis, as Section 9's wrestlers in the semifinals, which resumed this morning at 11 a.m.

Their efforts put wrestlers from Rockland, Orange, Ulster and Sullivan counties in sixth place in the team standings with 56½ points. Section 11 (Suffolk) leads with 97 points.

White became the first Rocklander to make the semifinals when he overcame a chest cold and Dave Turco of Ithaca-4, 105, in the quarterfinals. White had decisioned Len Martin of Saranac-7, 17-6, in the preliminaries.

White took a 7-0 lead against Turco in the second period by almost pinning the Ithaca senior. But Turco came back to within two, 7-5, with a nearfall of his own as White became careless with the big lead. But another nearfall by White in the third period clinched the match and gave him a chance to rest.

"I'm in no shape at all," said the 126-pound White, who feels he is

wrestling at only 75-80 percent of peak efficiency. "In the second and third period, I'm dead."

Whether in shape or not, White has the needed experience of having been in this tournament last year. "I'm more relaxed than last year," said White. "It takes away a lot of the awe of wrestling before big crowds."

Avdoyan had a tough time—with the referees — as he decisioned Duane Berry of Lowville-3, 6-5, in the 157-pound quarterfinals after receiving a bye in the first round. Tappan Zee coach Bill Sweet felt the officials failed to give Avdoyan three deserved nearfall

points while giving Berry one undeserved point for an escape.

The combination of misfortunes made Avdoyan need a takedown early in the third period to come from behind for the win.

"The referees kept it close and he still won it," said Sweet. "Otherwise, it was a routine match."

Brundage had to rally from a 4-0 deficit in the second period to decision Larry Nichols of Saranac-7, 8-1 in overtime.

After overcoming the deficit Brundage led in regulation, 7-5, before being reversed in the last few seconds to tie the bout, 7-7, and send it into overtime. Afterwards, Brundage admitted the reverse which he attributed to a stupid mistake fired him up for the overtime.

"I was in better shape so I took advantage of it," said the 167-pound senior. "He started dying when his knee hurt (in the second regulation period.)"

Giles, who, like Brundage, had a first round bye, pinned Phil Lanzatella of McQuade-5, in 5:23 of the 177-pound bout. The Gryphon senior was trailing 7-6, at the time of the pin.

"I started to stand up but once I saw his head in front I just locked it up," said Giles of the pin. "I figured I would try the cradle (anyway) to try to get him on his back."

Though the cradle won it for Giles, it was a bear hug that brought him back into the match. He trailed in the second period, 6-2, but a reverse and nearfall off of the bear hug tied the match, 6-6, and renewed the confidence he had lost after falling behind, 4-0, in the first period.

Savacool was impressive in his only bout of the night as he pinned Don Maroney of Canton-10 in 3:19.

Troche, who was second last year at 138, advanced to the 145-pound quarterfinals with a 6-2 decision over Tim Walton of Gouverneur-10 in the prelims and an 8-7 squeaker over Mike McInerney of Bayport-11 in the quarterfinals.

Otherwise, things didn't go as smoothly as they could have for Rockland's wrestlers.

John Halligan, Tappan Zee's 98-pounder, was the first local wrestler to fall from championship contention when John Busiello of Hauppauge-11 dominated the Dutchie junior, 9-0, in the quarterfinals.

At 105 highly regarded Mike Parietti of Suffern lost a 3-1 decision to Chuck Kennedy of Kingston-1 in the quarterfinals. A third period nearfall was the margin of victory.

Rich Finnen also of Suffern, was eliminated in the quarterfinals of the 112-pound class. Finnen decided Scott Rock of Saranac-7, 4-0 in his first bout but was decided by Bob Bischer of Westlake-1, 5-1,

SYRACUSE — For the second consecutive year no Rockland wrestler finished in the top four Saturday night at the 17th annual New York State Intersectional Wrestling Tournament at Onondaga County War Memorial.

More than 6,500 fans watched Mike Parietti, Rich Finnen and Billy White, all of Suffern, Dave Avdoyan of Tappan Zee and Bill Brundage of Pearl River all finish fifth. John Halligan, also of Tappan

history no wrestler from Orange, Ulster or Sullivan counties, besides Rockland, played in the top four. Kevin Troche of Port Jervis was fifth while Eric Savacool, also of Port Jervis, was sixth. Savacool was injured in the semifinals and defaulted his fifth place bout.

The poor showing gave Section 9 a sixth place finish with 76½ points. Section 11 (Suffolk) won the sectional team title with 235 points.

Locust Valley-8 won the individual school championship with 60½ points. Peru-7 was second with 54 points.

Pete Capone of Water-

town-3, the 145-pound champ, was named the Most Valuable Wrestler by sectional chairmen and members of the media.

Kregg Bruno became the first state champion from Section 7 (Champlain) when he decisioned 138 pound John Dolan, 7-3.

Al and Carl DeStefanis of Locust Valley-8 because the first brothers to win titles in the same year. Al DeStefanis won the 10 5-pound title while Carl DeStefanis won at 98.

Rockland's bad day began Saturday morning in the semifinals when White, Avdoyan, Brundage and Giles were all eliminated

from championship consideration.

White was the first to fall when he lost to 126-pound Joe Petrucci of Brentwood Ross-11, the eventual champion 9-3. Petrucci, who had decisioned White earlier in the season, was too strong for the Mountie junior. He built up a 6-1 lead at the end first period with the aid of a two-point nearfall and two takedowns and kept White under control the rest of the way.

White decisioned John Valvo of Berner-8, 7-0, for fifth place.

Avdoyan a 157-pounder, suffered a tough loss in the semifinals when Roy Lobdell of Deposit-4 won by

criteria in overtime because Avdoyan had received a warning for stalling. The two had finished the regulation six minutes tied, 9-9, and the overtime tied, 1-1.

The regulation part of the bout was a see-saw affair in which Avdoyan needed a reverse in the last second to tie it. He had led, 7-5, with 36 seconds remaining, but Lobdell took a 9-5 lead with seven seconds remaining on a reversal and nearfall.

Avdoyan nipped Dan Vando of Peru, 3-0 in overtime, to capture fifth places.

Brundage came close to advancing to the 167-pound finals against Ron Czarnetzky of Guiderland-2 but

missed a takedown at the buzzer that could have sent the bout into overtime and lost, 6-4.

Brundage, who was injured in the bout, was going to forfeit the consolation bout. But, when Jim Matuszewski of Sachse-11 was disqualified for flagrant misconduct, Brundage rushed to the War Memorial from his hotel room, got into his uniform, and had his hand raised as the fifth place winner.

Giles also fell victim to an injury, to his hips and dropped a 12-6 decision to Mike Purcelli of Bay Shore-11, in their 177-pound semifinal.

He later defaulted to Tony Conetta of Mophan-8 and was awarded sixth place.

Parietti and Finnen earned their fifth places through the wrestlebacks. Parietti, a 105-pound junior, won two of three bouts Saturday and defeated Chuck Kennedy of Kingston-1, 6-4, for fifth place. Kennedy had knocked Parietti out of championship contention Friday by winning, 3-1, in the quarterfinals.

Finnen also won two of

three bouts Saturday and earned fifth place in the 112-pound division by decisioning Bob Tiffany of Lowville-3, 12-6.

Weight certification rule would help wrestling

SYRACUSE — Two significant changes in high school wrestling, in the weight certification rule and the admission of New York City schools to the state tournament, may happen next year, according to Reed Hawke, the New York State wrestling chairman.

If they are implemented, both rules will improve the sport.

The change in the certification rule involves the elimination of the 50 percent rule, which says wrestlers must make the same weight in 50 percent of their bouts in order to be eligible to wrestle at that weight in post-season tournaments. If the proposal is accepted, a wrestler would only have to be certified at a given weight before the season begins in order to wrestle at that weight any time he can make the weight. He could then wrestle at a higher weight during the regular season before coming down for his sectional meets and the state tourney.

"Anything we could do not to have the kids pull all the weight all the time is a positive thing," Hawke said after the conclusion of the 17th annual New York State Inter-sectional Wrestling Tournament Saturday at Onondaga County War Memorial.

One of the "kickers", as Hawke describes them, would be how local doctors certify the wrestlers before

the beginning of the season. But Hawke expects no problems in that New York State recommends doctors certify that a wrestler can only wrestle at a weight five percent lower than what he weighs on the first day of practice. But it isn't a required rule. Still, Hawke doesn't expect problems in this area if the 50 percent rule is eliminated.

"The big kicker to make it work is to make a good certification," said Hawke. I'd be foolish to say we couldn't trust (the doctors)."

Such a rule, if accepted, would probably help make wrestlers physically stronger during the season. Such wrestlers as Pat Damiani of Clarkstown North, who said he maintained a diet in which, "Sometimes you eat, sometimes you don't", wouldn't have to pull the 10 pounds he did during the season.

The rule change is currently being discussed by the New York State Wrestling Committee, which is composed

of sectional wrestling chairmen from each of the 11 sections in the state. Hawke feels the proposal has a good chance of passing.

"It looks like it's good," said Hawke. "If the committee does a good selling job it could be in next year."

The likelihood of New York City schools becoming part of the state tourney is also strong. Schools from the city have been eligible to become part of the tourney for the last two years but didn't because they never changed their wrestling season from spring to winter. But Hawke has been assured by John Gladding, the director of athletics for the City of New York, that the change will be made for next season.

Yet there are still two kickers. One is that New York City has yet to rule on the change in seasons for wres-

ting. The second is that the experimental two-year program allowing city schools to participate in state tourneys in track, swimming and wrestling has expired and city schools will have to make applications to the New York State Executive Committee to reapply for eligibility for the state wrestling meet.

Once again, Hawke does not foresee any problems.

"We certainly don't have a true state champion until New York City schools compete," said Al Doyle, the Executive Secretary of the New York State Public High School Association.

Even if city schools become part of the state tourney, it's doubtful their impact will be felt for 3-5 years, which is how long Hawke feels it will take them to catch up with the rest of the state.

Still, it'll be good to have a true state wrestling championship.

Tournament in retrospect

Thinking about Rockland's showing in the 17th annual New York State Intersectional Wrestling Tournament brought thoughts of Warner Wolf and his expression "Come on, get these guys out of here."

After all, not having any wrestlers (of 10) finish in the top four for the second consecutive year is nothing to celebrate.

But a closer look indicates otherwise. In some cases, the Rocklanders did not wrestle well or near their capabilities. In other cases, like Tom Pirnie's loss to Matt King in the first round of the 119-pound division, they were simply beaten by better wrestlers. And, in other instances, they were injured. Dave Avdoyan, Bill Brundage and Tod Giles either received injuries or aggravated ones that already existed.

"You have to look at the individuals we have," said Tappan Zee coach Bill Sweet. "None of them are super athletes. You have some that have potential.

"You never know," added Sweet. "There are tough kids all over."

"It's a matter of a given day," said Ramapo coach Tom Canty. "You can have an on day or an off day.

"I don't think you can find any one thing (as reason for Rockland's performance) in a tournament like this," he added.

Things were going so poorly for Rockland, and the rest of Section 9, which also failed to place a wrestler in the top four for the first time, that Port Jervis' rampant fans were virtually silent.

At the beginning the Port fans were rooting for any wrestler from Rockland, Orange, Ulster or Sullivan counties. When the silence came, the tournament lost one of its most prominent background features.

Port Jervis' wrestling fans are the best in the state. They are by far the noisiest and most supportive.

"The people made the wrestling program what it is," said Port Jervis captain Ron Simonson. "They give us a lot more drive. They're such good people you want to work extra hard for them and for yourself."

More than 500 people made the trip from Port Jervis, which is still less than the 2,000-3,000 that attend some of the Red Raiders' dual meets. One of the reasons they turn out in droves is that there's not much to do in Port Jervis. Another reason is that the school has a poor basketball team, according to wrestling coach Mark Faller.

Port Jervis' fans can have a positive and negative effect with all their support. Simonson feels they can give the team an extra pin per match. But Faller feels otherwise.

"All it really does is make the sport a little more intense. Most of the time it works for us but sometimes they can work against you," said Faller. "Sometimes your kids feel extra pressure."

Pressure or not, it's great for a team to have fans like Port Jervis'.
