NY State Championship Tournament Preview

An Extremely Talented Crop of Wrestlers from every Section will make this year's High School State Championship Tournament the Best Ever!


In an attempt to make fans more aware of some of the wrestling talent in New York State, the following is a run-down of some wrestlers you may be seeing at the State Championship Tournament on March 1st and 2nd. It is not all-inclusive, as there are several talented wresters out there we just don't know about.

91 Todd Rutecki, out of Fowler-3, is a senior in a weight class that features mostly underclassmen. In addition, Rutecki is a versatile, experienced wrestler who competes year-round. His combination of talent, skill, and maturity will make him hard to beat. Jeff Reese of Elmira Southside-4 is also talented, but is out with an injury. He has looked especially tough in scoring many pins and technical falls in winning several tournaments. He's only an eighth grader, so look for future greatness out of him. Even without him. Section Four looks loaded for bear, with the likes of Jason Goldman of Maine-Endwell, Dave Dubrava, Chenango Forks, Doug Riddell, Whitney Point, and Jeff Geller of Elmira Free Academy. Goldman beat Reese in January, Dubrava beat Goldman in the recent STAC Championships, and Riddell is right up there with all of them. David Hardwick of Valley Central-9 and Corey Bushey of North Adirondack-7 competed in the states last year and will also be tough to beat if they're at 91 again. Out of Long Island come two tough competitors, Brian Fischenich, a junior from Huntington, and Rason Phifer, an eighth grader from Longwood. Mike Steinbar of Salamanca, Ken Rowe of Ripley, and Dave Brewer of Niagara-Wheatfield are favored in Section Six. One of them may be taking home a state medal. Some of the top wrestlers from Section Five who may be in Syracuse include Dave Ritoli, Spencerport, Brian Roberts, Athena, Peter Cooper, Palmyra -Macedon, adn Rod Frey, East Rochester. Out of Section Two Mark Yanigihara, Ballston Spa, will be in Syracuse. He beat a tough but young Eric Terry of Whitehall in the Section Two finals. Section Eight may offer either Jason Gabel of Bethpage or D. Pellechia of Plainedge. Look for either Eric Pellerin of Saranac or Kevin Gregory of Northern Adirondack to wear the Section Seven singlet. Both are tough competitors who have spilt matches this year. Others who may be earning state medals include Roman Rodriguez, North Rockland-1, Barry McShaw, Mount Vernon-1, Kieven Mack, White Plains-1, Steve Duscharm, Reg Hook-9, Doug Hartwick, Valley Central-9, Bob Pavis, Monsignor Farrell-Cath. This weight class contains a lot of wrestlers who are not afraid to come out shooting from the opening whistle. Look for tons of action at 91!

98 James Douglas of Bethpage-8 took a strong third place at last year's state tournament. Now at the same weight, he should now be a contender for the title. He is only a junior now, and looks to win big in Section Eight. Last year he went unscored on in the Sectional tournament. He is currently 27-1, with most of his matches coming at 105 and 112. Right behind him is Mike Merry, from Union-Endicott-4. Merry lost 13-5 to Douglas in last year's state tournament and placed fourth. Two weeks ago he lost a squeeker to Shane Mack of Ithaca-4. From that same section Matt Downey of Norwich also looks great, as does Gary Horton of Vestal. Clarence Hunt of Niagara Falls-6 took fifth last year and is top-seeded in Section Six. He will be challenged by Mark Keller, Amherst and Joel Griffith of Niagara Wheatfield for the Section Six crown. The winner of this class could do well at the states. Lenny Fries, Lindenhurst is top-ranked in Section Eleven, but just recently dropped an overtime loss to sophomore Keith Matias of Centereach. Either one could take the Sectional title as well as a state medal. Jon Tyler of Canastota-3 is also looking very good. He placed sixth in last year's state tournament at 91 pounds. Section Five may be sending Jason Barbera, Spencerport, Jeff Bowman, Penfield, Dan Nier, Greece Athena, Mark Regoord, Eastridge, Bob D'Arduini,

Palmyra-Macedon, Kevin Schojan, Marion, or Don Henner, Red Creek. Section Seven will most likely be sending Corey Bushey, who's been winning big at 105 all year. Challenging him for the Sectional title will be Saranac's Ben LaPlante. Another challenger from Seven is David Rabidau of Beekmantown. Two years ago, he made it to the states as only a seventh grader. Now a freshmen, he owns a 2-2 draw with Bushey, last year's Section Seven champ. From Section One, Brett Adams is top seeded. One of his top challengers, Craig Rowe, Ossining, did not make weight and will not be competing for a state berth. Others who have a shot at making the states are David Overton, John Jay-East Fishkill-1, Joe Franek, Red Hook-9, Doug Hartwick, Valley Central-9, and Steve Conlon. Karl Ruud of Burnt Hills-2 was in last year's state tournament. He owns a win over Merry this year, and may well win a state medal this year. Karl Ruud of Burnt Hills qualified by earning the Section Two title with a 3-2 win over JOsh Goldberg of Niskayuna. Ruud competed in last year's state tournament, and with his experience, should be very tough to beat.

105 The clear favorite here is defending state champ Craig Vitagliano of Plainedge-8. As a junior last year, he took the title at 98. He is currently undefeated and should



weight, featuring Jeff Tufano, Port Jervis, Mike Wojohowski, Cornwall, and Josh Jones, Onteora. Tufano was fifth at 105 in last year's states, and Wojehowski has been a consistent winner all season. Jones took an impressive third place in the awesome Mid-Hudson tournament, beating former state place-finisher Ken Wojehowski (who is injured now), Mike Aquilar, and Kyle Sibley. According to Section Nine experts, Jones is a legitimate contender for the Sectional title. Brian Betancourt, a senior out of Smithtown East, is top-ranked in Section Eleven. Challenging him will be John Jaeger of Sachem, Tim Chapman of Riverhead, and Tom Smith of Huntington. Section Seven will most likely offer Chad Kennedy of Peru or Rob Donnelly of Beekmantown. Kennedy has been very successful at 119 for most of the year, and Donnelly is not far behind. The Catholic league will most likely send Hector Cruz, a senior out of Fordham Prep with a 26-2 record. From Section Four, look for either state bronze medalist Jason Chervak of Maine Endwell, Ted Secoolish of Johnson City, Kelly Patterson of Vestal, and Neil Peraza of Norwich. A talented four-some, with Chervak getting the top seed, as well as the top seed in the state overall. Jake Gardner of Hoosick Falls will represent Section Two in the state meet. Don Spaulding of Hilton was last year's Section Five rep, but he recently dropped a 2-1 thriller to Brian Pintagro of Irondequoit. To add to this, Section Five also has hopefuls in Shaft Harrell, Webster, Mike Kohl, Fairport, Tim Steingass, Newark, and Hector Dessis, Lyons.

119 If you thought Juan Carlos Garcia was good last year, wait till you see him this year. An off-season full of wrestling has served to sharpen Garcia's already immense talents. Recently, he became Section One's all-time winningest wrestlers by beating David Amuso by injury default. Ironically, Amuso's older brother, Joe, had the previous Section One record of 152 wins. Garcia has 160 and counting. Garcia is 31-0 this year. In five tournaments he's entered and won, he's won four Most Outstanding Wrestler awards to boot. Sources close to Garcia indicate he could have made 112 for the states, but wanted to move up to prove how good he really is. And he'll do it, too. His top challenger, Jeff Duque of Valley Central-9, looks to be up at 126. Duque came within a point of Garcia, 4-3, in the Mid-Hudson finals. That has been Garcia's only close match of the year. The entrant from Section Five can be either Felix Medero of McQuaid, Russ Davis of Brighton, Jeff Mohr of Spencerpot, John Pixley of Penfield, Jason Knisely of Waterloo, or Shannon Davis of Warsaw. Section Two will send Rich Barcomb of Hudson Falls, while Section Four will most likeley be sending Johnson City's Joe Toner. Toner has good experience, he's rough and tough, and he's fast. Challenging Toner will be Ron Vosburg of Elmira Free Academy, Ed Andres of Susquehanna Valley, adn David lacovelli of Ithaca, who's been coming on strong lately. A couple of favorites from Section 11 are Nick Mancuso of Kings Park and Cameron Jenkins of William Floyd, both seniors. The top threat to Garcia will most likely come from Section 3's Bryan Roggie of Beaver River, who took fourth in last year's state tournament. Campbell of Long Beach and Tarpey of Massapequa are favored in Section 8. Tough and experienced Rob Bashaw will probably be returning to Syracuse. From Section 7's Peru, Bashaw was fourth in last year's state tournament. He beat Mike Jamison there and has also beaten Chris Matteotti last year. Chappy Manzer of Peekskill is favored to make the states from Section 1, with Section 6 packed with talent here. Top seed is Marty Siminski of Lancas-





champ at this weight. He's got 143 career wins against just 13 losses, and he's won the past 60 matches in a row without a loss. On the mat, Porter is confident, highly skilled, powerful, and tireless. Off-seasons full of wrestling have honed his skills, and he looks ready for a return trip to the top step in Syracuse. It won't be exactly as easy task, as he'll have some good competition right within his own section from Fairport's Matt Logan (currently undefeated), Ron Sanger, Athena, Eric Kellenbeck, Spencerport, and Kurt Laird of Sodus. Should he make it to Syracuse, Porter's competiton will be familiar foes. John Spiegelman of Suffern-1 was runner-up to Porter last year. Over the summer, he first beat, then lost to Kenny in the Empire Games. He's currently undefeated at 29-0 and highly favored in Section 1. 



Gino Brown of Newburgh Free Academy and Ethan Thompkins of Saugerties are tops in Section 9. The top wresters in Section Five are Ohi Johnsen of Webster, Joe Pernaselli, McQuaid, Joel Sturgis, Rush Henrietta, Chris Francis, Palmyra-Macedon, Matt Smith, Addison, and Nate Van Dusen, Williamson.

177 Perhaps the top seed here is Farmington-8 senior Aaron Brown. As a sophomore, Brown placed fifth in the state tournament, behind Adam Mariano, John Penhollow, Mike Bucci, and Chris Knazik. Pretty impressive place-finish, especially considering that the top four that year accounted for a total of ten state medals, including three gold medals (Mariano and Bucci). Last year Brown was runner-up in the section, with that loss being the only blemish on the year. He's had a lot of experience, and he has the tools to return and take it all. Challenging him from Section 11 could be Jason Dove of Hauppauge or Kerry McCoy of Longwood. From Section 3 the top seed is John Vitullo of New Hartford (whose brother was a state champ) and Curt Sykes of Madison. Shawn Akey of AuSable Valley and Jeremy Collins of Saranac are tops in Section 7 and may be in Syracuse challenging as well. John Degl of Mahopac and Jeff Schneider of Ossining look good in Section 1, but Jeremy Szerlip may be the representative from that area. Section 4 has another log-jam here, with Kevin Elson, Joe Vredenburg, Chenango Forks, Dan Jenkins, Norwich, and Mike Ellerson, Whitney Point. All four have had long, super-successful careers. Overall, the favorite has to be Ellerson. He went to the states last year and was one match away from winning a medal. He has beaten Elston a few times this year, and will be gunning for a title should he return to Syracuse. One guy who's drawing a lot of attention is Hudson Falls' Todd McIntosh. He's already qualified for the states and most people who've seen him in action think he's going to crush everyone at the tournament. He's a senior, and according to one observer, looks like "a man in a boy's weight class. He's huge, tough, and mean." McIntosh is undefeated, and one of his most impressive wins was against Eldric Venne, now at 167. In their tournament finals match in December, McIntosh drilled Venne 18-5. Look for him to come out swinging! Ryan Hammersmith of Clarence and Chris Pery of Silver Creek are two experienced wrestlers who may qualify through Section 6. From Section 9, look for Greg



There is a lot of evenly-matched talent there, and the winner should have a good shot at a state medal in the big tournament.


215 What a weight class! It features two national and world champs, another national champ, and a host of other state participants and rugged wrestlers. Let's start with Kevin Brinkworth, a senior out of Williamsville South-6. He was second last year in the states by the closest of margins. The year before, he took a fifth. Over this past offseason, he won a state title, two Empire Gold medals, two Northeastern Regional titles, and to cap it off, an ASICS National Junior Greco Roman gold medal. That puts him right on target for an Olympic berth in the near future. He is undefeated this year. On the mat, he is a constant aggressor, using a wide variety of state-of-the-art techniques to score points by the bushel. Challenging him is equally impressive Nicky Hall of Longwood. He won the Section 11 title last year and has been a varsity wrestler since eighth grade. He's also won a Cadet national and world title and a state title in freestyle over the summer. He's been simply awesome this year, pinning the vast majority of his opponents in the first period. It's a shame that these guys will probably meet in the tournament before the finals. Add to this Bob Bucci, who has never been to the states, but who won a national Cadet Greco championship this summer - by decking every opponent and winning the Most Falls trophy. Bucci should be the entrant from Section 9, but Hall has already beaten him by technical fall. He was winning 15-0 when the match was stopped. Bucci is still capable of a state medal. Another rising superstar is the Section 2 representative, Jamie Huntington of Whitehall. He placed sixth in last year's tournament, but owned wins over the third and fourth place-finishers in the tournament. One of his wins was a 14-6 verdict over Todd Schaffer of Vestal, the guy who's going to probably win the 250 pound title in Syracuse. Huntington is undefeated. He's beaten top-ranked Otha Davidson of Brighton-5, 9-0. Davidson is now at 250 also, and should challenge for that title. In winning Section 2, Huntington scored four falls - 1:15, :45, :25, and 1:01. He is only a junior, and he's on the same side of the brackets as Brinkworth and Hall. This is going to be better than when Godzilla met King Kong! From Section 3 state bronze medalist Jamie Call is back. He won four impressive matches in Syracuse last year, and has to be favored to do well this year as well. Jason Gleesman of Adirondack and Bruce Thomas of Chittenango are also very tough from Section 3. Bonjiorno of MacArthur and Reese of Herricks are two solid heavies from Section 8. From Section 7, look for Scott Phillips of Peru or Scott Lucia of Northern Adirondack. The Section 1 entrant

could be another major surprise. Scott Rowe of Ossining competed in last year's states, but he's been bested three times by Josh Mastrangelo of Carmel. Mastrangelo, only a junior, won by the scores of 7-3, 6-5, and most recently, 9-1. If he makes it, he could be yet another darkhorse. Four seasoned veterans will vy for the Section 4 title -Joe Walker, Chenango Forks, Adam Robbs, Watkins Glen, Walyand "Buddy" Alexander, Johnson City, and Joe Morgan, Corning. This could be anybody's ball game - there is really no clear favorite here. Adding to the fray could be Gasper LaRosa of St Anthony's-Cath, who's been to the states before. And to top off this excellent weight class, Section 5 will definetely send someone very capable of taking a high medal. The favorite is East Rochester's DJ Williams. If his name sounds familiar, it's because he took fourth place in last year's states at 250 pounds. He dropped down to 215 just a week ago and established himself as the top man in Section 5. He will be challenged by a fine core of talent in Buddy Cabrera, Batavia, Brandon Thompson, Brockport, Curt Snyder, Spencerport, Mark Crawford, Irondequoit, and Jon Porschet, Midlakes, who was runner-up in the section last year. These guys are all big, strong, and very tough. Bar none, 215 will be the most talent-packed weight class by far this year.

250 The big name here is Vestal's Todd Schaffer. Schaffer took a strong third place in the states last year, avenging his firstround loss in the wrestlebacks. That was his only loss last year, and this year no one has been able to stay even close to him. Believe it or not, he is unscored upon this year. He was good last year, but something happened to him over the summer. He's big, fast, agile, and he knows how to wrestle. Over the summer, he placed fifth in the national junior Greco Roman tournament, coming very close to actually winning. He also won a host of other major tournaments and has to be as strong a favorite as Garcia, Vitagliano, Porter, or anyone else. According to our Section 4 scouts, his phone is ringing off the wall with offer after offer from all the big Division One colleges. He's got 106 career wins, and every one of his matches this year has ended in a pin - and he has not wrestled past the first period! Looking for upsets is a host of talented heavies. Two of them from Section 11 might be Bill Zack of Kings Park and Jim Pagusa of Newfield. Both are seniors with tons of experience. Brian Storace of Vernon-Verona-Sherrill-3 is another year-round wrestler with lots of experience and talent. Whittaker of Long Beach and Levy of Oceanside are two of the

top dogs in Section 8. From Section 7 Matt Imhelder of Beekmantown and Chad Robinson of Peru look very tough. From Section 1 a couple of darkhorses may be Aubrey Francous of Arlington and Ryan Thompkins of Carmel. Scott Bishop of Hudson Falls secured his state berth by recently defeating William Bourgeois of Salem 3-1. Meanwhile, Art Dispenza of Starpoint-6 took sixth place in the states last year. He'll be looking for upward mobility should he earn a return trip. But perhaps the biggest threat to Schaffer could be Minisink Valley's Joe Yanis. Yanis is also undefeated and has had tons of experience in all styles of wrestling. Another threat might come from Brighton-5's Otha Davidson. He made it to the states last year at 215 and has beaten Yanis over the summer. Davidson's only loss this year has been a 9-0 shutout at the hands of Jamie Huntington at 215. Most of his other matches have been one-sided impressive victories. Those that will seek to upend Davidson will be Matt Baldassare Athena, Alton Turner, McQuaid, Ron Schommer, Palmyra-Macedon, and Jack Fisher, Newark (only a sophomore). This will be another exciting weight class, and hardly anyone in Syracuse on March 2nd will be leaving early to beat the traffic!

New York State Championship Statistics

New York State has had two five-time state placefinishers, Marty King and Troy Bouzakis. King, of Canandaigua-5, placed in the states from 1980 to 1984. In weights from 91 to 126, he placed second, third, fourth, first, and first again. As a senior, he won the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" award as well.

The other five-timer was Troy Bouzakis of Pine Bush-9. He placed from 1986 to 1990, taking first, first, third, second, and first again as a senior. He won the "Most Outstanding Wrestler" award two times, the only wrestler in NYS history to do so. Bouzakis' overall record was 175-2, with an amazing 151 pins! His only two losses were in the states, one by overtime criteria, and the other by 5-4 overtime decision. His winning percentage was an astounding 98.8%.

There have been two four-time state finalists, Bouzakis and Dan Hunt of West Genesee-3. Bouzakis took three firsts and a second in his finals appearances. Hunt, wrestling at 112 and 119 pounds, took second as a freshman, then won his next three years. He competed from 1971 to 1974.

There have been 72 teams (schools) with three or more place-winners in the same year in the NYS State Tournament. There has been 19 schools with four or more place-winners in the same year. In 1984, Canandaigua-5 had five place-finishers, a first, two seconds, and two fifths. Huntington-11 in 1976 and Brentwood-11 in 1971 share the NYS record for the most placewinners (six) in the same year in the States. Huntington had a champ, a second, a third, a fourth, and two fifths. Brentwood had an amazing three champs, a second, a fourth, and a fifth.

There have been 18 teams with three or more finalists in the same year in the States. Mepham-8 in 1964 had three state champs. Sidney-4 in 1965 had two state champs. Brentwood-11 in 1971 had three. Huntington-11 in 1980 had one champ, and Long Beach-8 in 1982 had one champ.

Huntington-11 has the most state champs of any school in New York State. They have 14 so far, with Mepham-8 at 10, Ithaca-4 at 9, Sidney-4 at 8, Locust Valley-8 at 8, Burnt Hills, Spencerport, and Union-Endicott all with 7 state champs.

Canandaigua-5 has the most number of State place-winners with 31. They are followed by Huntington-11 (30), Peru-7 (29), Baldwinsville-3 (26), Mepham-8 (25), Port Jervis-9 (23), Brentwood-11 (22), Fulton-3 (22), Spencerport-5 (21), Massapequa-8 (20), Lindenhurst-11 (20), Ithaca- (20), Sidney-4 (19), Long Beach-8 (18), Burnt Hills-2 (16), Waverly-4 (16), Olean-6 (16), Calhun-8 (15), Bellmore-8 (14), Queensbury-2 (14), Island Grees-8 (14), Locust Valley-8 (14), Berner-8 (12), Baldwin-8 (12), Bay Shore-11 (12), and Walt Whitman-11 (11).

Jeff Prescott of Olean-6 has the NYS record for the most consecutive victories by a wrestler. From 1894 to 1987, he won 120 straight matches! He is followed by Mark Iacovelli of Ithaca-4 sith 102 straight wins from 1974-77.

Section 11 has the record for the msot number of place-winners in the States (272), followed by Section 8 (241), Section 4 (226), and Section 5 with 195 place-winners.

Section 8 has the NYS record for the most number of state champions with a total of 78, followed by Section 11 with 67, Section 4 with 555, Section 3 with 45, and Section 5 with 37, Section 6 with 38, Section 2 with 27, Section 9 with 21, Section 1 with 17, Section 7 with 2, and the CHSAA (Catholic League) with 1. Section 10 and the PSAL (New York City area schools) have never had a state champion.

New York has had eight three-time state champs, 43 two-time state champs, and a total of 378 NYS Champs in the history of the State tournament.

Based on Neil Kerr's NYS Sportswriters Association Rankings, the top teams of the 1980's are listed below. A point system that awards 10 points for a first place ranking, 9 points for second, 8 points for third, etc. has been used:

Randy Payne of Sidney-4 has the best overall winning percentage in New York State. From 1967 to 1969, he went 107-1, taking third, first, and first in the State tournament. His only loss was in the 1967 semifinals. His winning percentage is over 99%.



Several State Place-finishers Eligible for Return Trip

If you've ever watched a New York State Championship Tournament, you'll agree to one assumption that makes every match hair-raising: Anything is possible. No matter who is out there, anyone can win, and anyone can lose. Nothing is predictable. This is proven in almost every tournament, where in most weight classes, the top-seeded wrestler fails to win the title. We won't attempt to predict state placefinishes in this year's state tournament, set for March 1st and 2nd in the War Memorial in downtown Syracuse. The purpose of this article is to make you more aware of some of the wrestlers you may see in that event.

Three defending state champions and many other placefinishers will be eligible to defend their titles and place-finishes. As happens every year, however, some of these wrestlers will not make it out of their sections, and other wrestlers who have never competed in the states will wind up winning titles. With this in mind, let's take a look at some of New York's top wrestlers.

Craig Vitagliano, Plainedge-8, Juan Carlos Garcia, Sleepy Hollow-1, and Kenny Porter, Alfred-Almond-5 all won state titles last year as juniors. So far this year, they are all undefeated and heavily favored to earn return trips to Syracuse. Should they defend their sectional titles, they will each bring diverse experiences and backgrounds to the state meet.

It will be Garcia's third trip to the states, having placed second as a sophomore. That year, he gave up a last-gasp takedown to lose to three-time state champ Frank Fronhofer of Salem-2. It was one of the most exciting finals matches that year, and thousands of shocked fans almost saw a young Garcia prevent Fronhofer from becoming NYS's seventh three-time state champion.

Adding a lot of off-season competition, Garcia came back the following year at 112 pounds and won the state title. Using speed, power, and about fifteen brilliant takedowns, he defeated Shane Lese, Bryant Ranger, and Keith Sequeira on his way to the top. Of all fourteen weight class champions, his technique looked most advanced.

Juan has won several tournaments this year already, including the rugged Mid-Hudson, held at Kingston High School. In the finals there, he edged a resurging Jeff Duque of Valley Central-9, 4-3. Duque was well on his way towards challenging Garcia for the title last year when a January car accident halted him. Over the offseason, he recuperated and now looks to be back in top form. Duque has placed in the state tournament twice, as a freshman, and as a sophomore. He and Garcia are probably the top wrestlers in the weight class this year.

Craig Vitagliano was also impressive in Syracuse last year. At 98 pounds, he rallied in the closing seconds in two straight matches to win 4-3 over Pat Borja and Terry Showalter. Borja was a senior last year, and Showalter only an eighth grader. In the finals last year, Vitagliano faced East Rochester-5's Roy Frey, an aggressive, confident wrestler. Frey looked awesome in winning three matches by the combined score of 28-3 in earning his berth in the finals.

And while many fans expected Frey to also dominate in the finals, it was a series of perfectly-executed single leg takedowns that won it for Vitagliano. He started by surrendering a takedown to Frey, but soon established his offensive shot that was just too quick and too low be stopped.

Craig will most likely be at 105 pounds for the Section 8 tournament. Should he return to Syracuse, his weight appears to be one of the strongest of all. It has the potential to contain as many as ten or eleven wrestlers who have been to the states before, and many of whom have placed. If so, he will again need his takedown ability and tenacity to repeat. As it stands now, he is heavily favored to win.

The third state champion that looks to defend his title is Kenny Porter of Alfred-Almond-5. Rising from the ranks of Class D schools, Porter kept surprising himself and the rest of New York as he put together a series of impressive wins on his way to the title. Using a combination of strength, technique, and experience, Porter was unflappable on his climb to the top. He displayed college-level poise that never left him, even when John Spiegelman turned him over and nearly pinned him in period three of the state finals with Porter up 10-0. Of all returning champs, he was perhaps most active in off-season wrestling. Currently, he is also undefeated and heavily favored to leave Syracuse with another state title.

Five state second-place finishers are back this year with thoughts of moving up a notch. First off are the Groncki brothers, two durable wrestlers that go balls-out for six full minutes (or more) each match. From Burnt Hills-2, they were the highlight of Section 2, which managed only 89.5 points for a disappointing ninth place state finish.

Doug Groncki had the closest match of all finals matches last year. Facing a pumped-up Shawn Welch, who had just decked Brian Roggie, Doug managed to hold him scoreless for six full minutes. However, Welch was equally successful in his defense. After a 0-0 regulation tie, they loosened up, with Groncki opening up a 3-0 lead. Almost miraculously, Welch scored six points in the last period to take a 6-3 OT win. Welch is now at Syracuse University, close to where Groncki should be on March 1st and 2nd.

Twin brother Chad Groncki trashed Chris Tucci 9-1, then outlived Tom Di-Tore in a thrilling 10-9 semifinal shootout. In the finals, he was unable to mount an offensive in losing by 1:21 fall to Troy Bouzakis. From his first shot, Bouzakis snapped him down and spun around for a 2-0 lead. He then maintained a tight ride for over a minute before using at least a 145-pounder's half nelson to pin Groncki.

At this year's tournament, there doesn't appear to be anyone from Bouzakis' home planet, so Groncki has the potential to beat anyone. However, so do a lot of other people, as evidenced by the early season loss suffered by Groncki at the hands of Peru-7's Shawn Edwards.

At 138 pounds last year, Suffern-1's John Spiegelman lost a lop-sided 12-5 decision to Ken Porter. The only bright spot for John came when he scored a reversal and back points in nearly decking Porter in the third period. Aside from that, Porter handled him. Since then, though, these two guys have split matches. In addition, other wrestlers within the same weight class have done well and will seek to usurp these two finalists. Right now, Spiegelman has looked great in beating most opponents easily. He is undefeated and looking towards his third Section One title.

Another runner-up from 1990 is Niagara Falls-6 senior Kareem Johnson. He lost a very controversial 10-9 overtime decision to Steve Taylor in the state finals. In that match, he scored most of the technical points and looked superior to Taylor in his ability to score. However, he was penalized for stalling on several occasions and lost four points for stalling. Whether he really was stalling and deserved the four penalty points is a matter of opinion. The important thing to realize is that his technique was better than anyone else's in Syracuse, and he is favored to win the title this year.

Johnson is a very powerful wrestler whose forte is takedowns. He blends speed, strength, and a diversified technique in his matches. With his knowledge of Greco Roman and freestyle, he has the ability to score from any position. His ex-

plosiveness also enables him to escape from anyone, giving him access to his specialty - wrestling on his feet. In Syracuse last year, he beat Mark Dacosta, Chad MacNaughton, and Phil McCarty by the combined score of 26-10. He then scored several takedowns on the way to his 10-9 loss against Taylor. He has been to the States twice now, and as a senior, will be very tough to beat should he make a return trip.

The fifth and last silver medalist from last year is Williamsville-6's Kevin Brinkworth at 215 pounds. Brinkworth might have won the finals match if not for his super-aggressiveness. With time waning, and him leading by a 3-2 margin, both men were on their feet. Instead of protecting his lead, Brinkworth stormed ahead, shooting in for the takedown. As he was completing the move, his opponent, Mike Bucci, Red Hook-9, miraculously turned it into a Petersen roll and wound up with the takedown - right at the edge of the mat, and just before the buzzer sounded! Final score: 4-3 Bucci. It was one of the evening's most entertaining matches, and it was apparent that both men were very evenly matched.

Brinkworth is now a senior, and has medaled at the states twice (he was fifth as a sophomore). He is the clear favorite to come back and win the title this year. There does not seem to be any challengers except for Longwood-11's Nick Hall. Also a senior, Hall is currently undefeated and untested. He did the same last year at 177, in addition to winning the Section 11 title. He was not able to compete at the states, though. This year, people from Long Island are already conceding the state title to Hall.

If both men make it to Syracuse, they will be on the same side of the brackets with a possible semifinals match-up.

Over the summer, Brinkworth competed in many tournaments with great success. He won the Empire State Games in both styles with ease. He won the Northeast Regional Junior Olympics in both styles as well. But the climax of his off-season was in the ASICS Tiger National Junior Greco Roman Tournament, an event that is usually the largest tournament in the world each year. There, Kevin won the 220 pound title, defeating an opponent in the finals who had earlier beaten him in a controversial 4-3 match. Last summer, Brinkworth also won the Cadet World Championships. All this experience makes him very difficult to beat.

Hall is also a Cadet World Champ and hard to beat. This match-up could be the highlight of the state tournament, with future match-ups coming in perhaps the Division One NCAA finals someday.

Bronze medalists are sometimes second only to the state champ. Often, he will lose by a close margin to the eventual champ, who will score a blow-out in the finals. This year, there are five very tough thirdplace finishers from last year's state tournament that may be moving up on the victory stand.

At 91 pounds, James Douglas of Bethpage-8 looked great in Syracuse last year. He started with a 15-3 win over David Hardwick of Valley Central-9. Then he beat a tough Pietro Furguiele of East Rochester by a 6-3 margin. In the semifinals, though, he was pinned by the eventual and two-time champ, Anthony Alberti of Hendrik-Hudson-1. Douglas rebounded by decking Jon Tyler of Canastota--3 in just 28 seconds and by whipping Mike Merry of Union Endicott-4, 13-5. He looked awesome in taking a strong third place finish,

and has to be considered the favorite in this year's meet. It should be a great weight class, because everyone he beat is also returning this year.

Jason Chervak of Maine Endwell-4 also took third last year. He lost his very first match last year to David Hirsch, who won the tournament. Then he won by scores of 5-2, 15-0, 16-1, and 4-0. Four straight wins by the combined score of 40-3, plus a very impressive current season combine to make Jason Chervak the state favorite in this year's meet.

Matt Marciniak of Watkins Glen-4 placed fifth as a sophomore, but could have possibly placed third if not for an illegal slam call against him. His opponent was unable to continue. And with him ahead on points, Marciniak lost by default. Last year he dropped a hair-raiser, 3-2 against the eventual champ, Brian Gray of Wellsville-5. And he had beaten Gray twice that year and once the year before. Marciniak came back to take third. So for this year, he in undefeated. He's looked awesome, and is favored to make the finals this year should he return to Syracuse for his third trip.

Vestal-4's Todd Schaffer, 215 pounds, lost in round one last year to Jamie Huntington of Whitehall-2. The score was by a 14-6 margin. Following that, Schaffer warmed up and beat four guys straight to take third. Victim number three was Huntington in the re-match, won by Schaffer, 7-3. Todd added a ton of summer experience in all styles and should be the man to beat at 250 pounds.

Also at 250 is Jamie Call of Indian River-3. In last year's state tournament, he scored two pins and two decisions in taking third. His only loss was 10-5 against the champ, Bruce Manley. Call is now a senior. He did a good amount of off-season wrestling, and appears to be a favorite to make the finals at 250.

In addition to these gold, silver, and bronze state medalists, a number of other place-finishers and participants are back this year and may be in Syracuse. Last year's other place-finishers include Mike Merry, fourth; Clarence Hunt, fifth; Jon Tyler, sixth; Terry Showalter, fourth; Jeff Tufano, fifth; Bill Dixon, sixth; Rob Bashaw, fourth; Mike Jamison, fifth; Rob Donnino, fourth; Bryan Roggie, fourth; Phil Donnelly, sixth; Tom DiTore, fourth; Kareeb Howard, fifth; Marcus Hutchins, fourth; Jamie Huntington, sixth; DJ Williams, fourth, and Art Dispenza, fifth.

In addition to these place-finishers, a number of participants from last year are eligible for return trips this year. Some of them even placed in the states the year before, and have the potential to win titles in this year's event.

Add to this all the guys who have been to the states before, and may have even placed, but who did not make it back last year. We'll even see our share of wrestlers who have never, ever been to the states before. Some of them will win titles and other medals. All these variables make for thrilling state tournaments every year! And our next issue (March 1991) will capture all the excitement of this tournament. Heavyweight Class Looks Great!

The 215 pound class at this year's state tournament looks to be the finest gathering of big men in New York State History

In boxing, the most exciting weight class is undoubtedly heavyweight. Here, you never know what might happen when two big, powerful guys start exchanging punches. But in wrestling, it's the lower and middle weights that seem to attract the most attention. That's where you will typically see the most action, best techniques, fastest moves, and greatest endurance. In fact, at many dual meets and tournaments, half the crowd is beating the traffic home when the big guys step up.

In Syracuse on March 1st and 2nd, it will be different. The heavyweight classes at the state tournament will be packed up with national calibre wrestlers you will probably see on TV in coming years winning NCAA titles. The 250 pound class will be unusually exciting, as one super wrestler (Vestal-4's Todd Schaffer) and a whole bunch of great wrestlers mix it up to determine who's the baddest and biggest wrestler in New York State.

However, this year's toughest weight class will definetely be 215 pounds. This year's state champion may just turn out to be New York's finest heavyweight of all

time. That would be no small accomplishment, considering some of the heavyweight state champs in recent history - guys like Jeff Ellis, Tim Green, Andy Schwab, Jeff Blatnick, Jim Davis, and many others. Let's take a look at some of the potential participants.

Kevin Brinkworth, a senior, of Williamsville South-6 took second place last year by one point. The year before he was fifth. He is a year-round wrestler who has already won a Cadet World title and a Junior National tournament in Greco Roman. If you look at some of yesterday's Junior National champions, most of them are enjoying national prominence in college and several are at the top in Open International competition. Brinkworth has the heart of a 98-pound wrestler - nonstop flurries of action with an overabundance of stamina. His accomplishments in Greco and freestyle enable him to score from any position, while his mat experience arm him with a very powerful defense.

Nicky Hall, also a senior, is from Longwood-11. Since eighth grade he's been wrestling varsity at 145 pounds and up. Unlike a young lightweight who typically faces freshman and sophomores, Hall was matched up against three- and four-year veterans right from the start. And although he's never been to the states, we can explain that. As a freshman, he was probably second best to Adam Mariano in Suffolk County. So was the rest of the planet. As a sophomore, he was injured and lost to Dean Morrison, who wound up with a state bronze medal. Finally, last year, he did win the Sectional title, but a family situation prevented him from going. The big question on the Island was "Would he have won?" After you see him, judge for yourself. Hall is awesome in freestyle; in fact, he is a Cadet National and World Champ in that style. His techniques are college-level, he's big, strong, agile, super-aggressive, and very poised. He will be very tough to beat.

Another top heavyweight is Whitehall's Jamie Huntington, now a junior. He took sixth last year in the states. In the process, he beat the third place finisher (Schaffer) and the fourth place finisher (Bill Neuss). Huntington is undefeated, and he just won the Section 2 title by decking four guys in just 3:26. With a record of 29-0, he's got an amazing 24 pins. He is not a huge heavyweight. Mobility, quickness, technique, and a aggressiveness is his trademark.

Bob Bucci is also a junior. He is from Red Hook-9, where he replaces his brother Mike who was last year's state champ. Bucci's only loss this year has been by 15-0 technical fall to Hall. Aside from that, he has been hugely dominant in his quest for first a Section 9 title, and then a state place-finish. He emerged onto the scene in mid-summer when he won the Cadet National title by pin-

ning every single wrestler he faced. For his efforts, he also won the Most Falls title. Look him to add to the immense talent that appears to be heading towards Syracuse. Section One will be sending someone tough, that's for sure. **Scott Rowe** of Ossining won the sectional crown and made it to the states last year. This year, though, he's been beaten three times by the upstart **Josh Mastrangelo** of Carmel, the last match being 9-1. Only a junior, Mastrangelo looks like a solid favorite to win a medal in Syracuse.

Four workhorses from Section 4 also appear to be quite capable of pulling off a medal in the states. The problem is getting there, though. Only one can go, and it will be interesting to see who it is. In no specific order, they are **Joe Walker** of Chenango Forks, **Joe Morgan** of Corning, **Wayland Alexander** of Johnson City, and **Adam Robbs** of Watkins Glen.

In addition to these heavies, consider some of the other potential state participants: Jason Gleasman of Adirondack-3, Bruce Thomas of Chittenango-3, Dan Parshley of Gouveneur-10, and Gasper LaRosa of St Anthony's-Cath.

And if the War Memorial mats weren't crowded enough, consider this guy: DJ Williams of East Rochester-5, the weight

class's big guy. He placed fourth last year at 250 pounds. Currently undefeated, he's pinned most of the opponents he's faced this year. Dropping down to 215 adds another high-powered opponent to a jam-packed class of heavyweights. Challenging him for the Section Five title will be a core of also very tough wrestlers, including Jon Porschet of Midlakes, who was runner-up to go to the states last year; Buddy Cabrera, Batavia, Brandon Thompson, Brockport, and Curt Snyder, Spencerport.

It's too dangerous to make any predictions at this point. Upstaters are talking Brinkworth, downstaters are pointing to Hall, and the folks who haven't seen either are looking to their own worthy representatives to snag the state title. It's a shame only one can win - but that's the excitement of wrestling. One more thing - if you go to the states, pay the babysitter an extra five dollars - you won't be leaving Syracuse early!




