Wrestling, unlike basketball or baseball, is an individual sport that demands teamwork as well as individual initiative in order to excel.




Steve Penhollow, Bob Johnson, and Terry Norris, all within the last ten years, have received such honors.

Wrestling is not a glory sport but an individual's commitment that will serve him not only on the mat but in later life.





