County Tough In Section 5 Mat Tourney

Monroe County wrestlers dominated the first two rounds of the Section 5 Tournament of Champions yesterday at Fairport, led by Rush-Henrietta and Spencerport.

R-H placed five in today's semifinals and Spencerport four.

The Comets have Rick Terenzi at 115, Warren Stumpf at 141, Jim Weisenfluh at 170, Steve Wilson at 180 and Dave Hept at 215.

Stumpf, undefeated on the season, is seeking his second Sectional title, having placed fourth in the state last year at 132. He had two pins yesterday. Also in the running at 148 is Jim Hartwell of Canandaigua, the defending champion at that weight and like Stumpf, fourth in the state in 1971.

Hept had an easy day, winning a forfeit and a 15-1 decision. Also left at 215 are Madison's Terry Bruce and Steve Horrigan of Penn Yan.

Bruce scored a fall and default yesterday, the latter over Spencerport's Dave Baxter, who suffered possible torn ligaments in his left knee on the opening takedown.

Horrigan had a forfeit and the tournament's fastest fall when he decked Harold Flickner of Dansville in 19 seconds. He was scheduled to meet Bruce in the semifinals.

Spencerport's four semifinalists include Dave Travis at 108, Steve Silver at 115, Butch Teike at 132 and defending champion Al Velieri at 148.

Travis defeated East's Craig Dade 2-0 in overtime,

and was set to face Mike Chappelle of Canandaigua in the semis. Chappelle had two pins yesterday, one in 22 seconds. Also advancing was Scott Court of Churchville-Chili with a forfeit and fall.

Silver was to feet Terenzi in the semifinals, a renewal of their East-West Day bout in which Silver took a one-point decision.

Teike, a freshman, had a forfeit and a tough 2-0 victory and was to meet Denny Hall of Dansville in the third round. Also in the running at 132 is Dan Duffy of East Rochester, who advanced on 8-2 and 11-2 decisions.

After a forfeit and fall yesterday, Velieri was to meet tough Brad Gillespie of Haverling in the semifinals. Gillespie was runner-up to Hartwell in last year's tournament.

The City had only two wrestlers in the semifinals — Bruce and Art Killings of Edison, who placed fourth in the state last year.

Kendall 97, Lyndonville 55

LYNDONVILLE — Six-four center Aaron Bouie scored 24 points to lead Kendall to a 97-55 victory over Lyndonville in the final Genesee Region League basketball for both teams here last night.

Four other players reached double figures for Kendall. Dan Steffen scored 17 points, Dean Cole 13 and Ed Mack and Paul Hanneky each 10 in support of Bouie.

*He Beat the Clock and the Pin

Psyched so unbelievably, a mean Warren Stumpf goes into a little crouch, the Rush-Henrietta green tights hugging his skin, regrouping just enough energy for this final 16 seconds. Before moving he forces his magnetic-like eyes upon Jim Hartwell, moving them slowly up and down his body. Then zap, zap, zap they burst.

Down 6-5 in this Class A Section 5 wrestling final, Stumpf goes after Hartwell, literally chasing him. In the background, the clock ticks red-numbered seconds away and his Coach, Gordy Gilfilian, rockets from a corner chair, arms waving and mouth moving. For this it IT. Two unbeaten at 141 pounds, two champions staking reps in their ego-crazed worlds.

Finally, Stumpf on the attack, grabs hold of a Hartwell arm and pulls. Ten seconds left. Hartwell, the champ at this weight from Canandaigua, strains and fights and back-pedals. Holding on, Stumpf and the struggle move across the mat and somehow

he gets Hartwell down and slips on top of him. The referee raises two (points) fingers, signaling a takedown while Hartwell lunges for the mat's edge as the buzzer sounds.

In the mass confusion encircling the scorers table, all eyes in the massive Fairport gym leave the two alone, an exhausted smile on both although the scoreboard reads 7-6, Stumpf's favor.

Canandaigua coach Weldon Canough is exploding in the ref's ears. "That was no takedown. THAT was no takedown. There was no control. THERE was no control. He fell on him. He just FELL on him."

But frustration envelops Canough realizing his repitious pleads are for naught. Negative faces surround him and a huge grin right smack on Gordy Gilfilian.

"That was the greatest match I've ever seen," bellows Gordy, lifting Stumpf fifteen feet off the floor. "He (Stumpf) was tremendous. He hung in there. He never gave up and that's what I like about him most. And he did it

against a pinning animal."

In the second period, Hartwell locks a cradle on Stumpf but the ref doesn't buy the pin. "Stumpf was dead. It was the worst officiating I've ever seen," Canough complains.

All Hartwell gets for his efforts is three points for a near fall to grab his only lead as Stumpf is penalized for an illegal slam and stalling.

Afterwards, Stumpf leans against some hallway lockers receiving victory kisses and handshakes when Hartwell approaches. He forces a smile and extends a hand. "You were pinned though weren't you. Admit it."

Stumpf just looks away, shaking his head. He would be returning to the States (next week in Syracuse), not Hartwell.

This year's tourney belongs to the county schools led by Rush-Henrietta, which lands two other champions beside Stumpf, Gilfilian's first legitimate hope for a State Champion. Jim Weisenfluh, a Sectional trampoline champ and second in the state last year,

cradles an injured and surprising finalist Tim Kolb, of Penfield, in the A Finals and instant replays on Avoca's Phil Wilson in the A-B wrestle-offs. Dave Hept takes the other crown, the Biggees.

Big Red manhandles Penn Yan's brazen, pin-artist Steve Horrigan at 215, who ignores his coach's pleas and ties-up, ~~hoping to slip under~~ Hept's pancake. But Hept collars him twice and scores a lopsided 12-3 victory.

"He was the strongest guy I've ever faced," Hept says of Horrigan. "I couldn't keep

him down. I think he thought he could out-muscle my best moves."

One of the first to congratulate Hept is Madison's Terry Bruce who pinned everyone before being crushed by Horrigan in the semis. "These guys were just as strong as me. I couldn't muscle. And I was pooped after Horrigan put me on my back once," Bruce says.

East Rochester lands two champions, Keith Cotroneo at 129 and a superb Dan Duffey who upsets Denny Hall, the Wellsville monster who throws a tantrum racing to

the locker room.

Spencerport also gains two winners, Stevie Silver at 115 and Al Velieri, the super pinner who edges another tiger, Dwight Cartwright, Keshequa's 177-pounder, for the tourney's MVP award.

Irondequoit completes a dominating County array of power with champs Tim Borshoff at 122 and Rory Whipple at 158.

"It merely proves how tough the County really was this year," ER Coach Don Quinn says in proud understatement.
