

Diello Pinned, Manchester Wins

EFA Tramples SHS, 31-12

It was ten years in coming, but the sweet taste of victory will linger in the senses of Academy for the rest of the year.

Academy's Blue Devils, winning both when they were supposed to and when they weren't, manhandled Southside Saturday night in a stuffed Green Hornet gym, 31-12.

"It was our night," proclaimed an exuberant Bob Diehr, and Academy's night it was. Before the vociferous bipartisan audience of some 1,900 persons who were everywhere but on the mats in the Hornet nest, the Blue Devils won their 13th dual meet of the season, and very likely the Sullivan Trail Conference crown with the win.

Only a match with lightly-regarded Notre Dame remains in the path of Academy and the unbeaten season—a first for the school—and the STC trophy.

Diehr's strategy of moving Tony Greene from 183 to 145 paid off in blue chips with one exception — John Diello, previously undefeated at 145, moved up to 154 and was pinned by Bob Pronti, Southside's once-beaten ace in 5:45.

Greene took advantage of the switch by decking Gene Ottaviani in an even three minutes with a cradle, and then Southside was penalized one team point by Ottaviani's outburst directed at the official.

The Devils won the match in the early going, rolling up an 18-5 lead with six straight decisions after Tom Perkins pinned Dan Bunner at 98 with Bunner leading on points, 11-5.

From 105 through 145, the Devils rolled, with the closest match between Mike Collins of Academy and Southside's Dave Osgood at 112.

Collins scored a reversal with just two seconds to go in the bout to win 7-5 and with a point for riding time, emerged an 8-5 winner.

Southside's Danny Manchester, the only Hornet to travel through 12 dual meets and remain unbeaten, stretched his skein another notch with an 11-1 decision over Jim Carr at 183. Carr managed to go the full six minutes, although spending most of the second period on his back and nearly being pinned by Manchester with a cradle.

The heavyweight battle was one of the bouts the fans had come to see and they went home satisfied. Southside's Gary Robinson went into the match with a 7-4 record as compared to Academy's Earl Stermer's 11-1.

Robinson successfully blocked Stermer's every move for five minutes and then with 25 seconds left, the roof fell in on the Hornet.

Stermer scored a takedown and two seconds later, Robinson succumbed to the body press.

The Jayvee match was a battle of unbeaten, as both teams came into the match yet to lose.

The Little Blue Devils won, 29-18.

San Diego Tourney Has 3-Way Deadlock

SAN DIEGO, Calif. (AP) — Jack Nicklaus and Al Geiberger collared leading Tom Weiskopf Saturday and moved into a three-way tie for the top after 54 holes of the \$150,000 Andy Williams-San Diego Open Golf Tournament.

All three will take a 205, 11 strokes under par, into the final round Sunday.

Nicklaus, the bulky National Open champion, fired a three-under par 69 and the lanky Geiberger had a sparkling 68. Weiskopf, who opened the day's play with a one-stroke lead, came in with a 71.

They played in the same threesome, providing the gallery a compact picture of the action over the 6,792-yard, par 36-36—72 Torrey Pines Golf Club course.

As the firing began for the \$30,000 top prize, the 25-year-old Weiskopf, from Bedford, Ohio, had a stroke lead over Dave Hill and two shots over Nicklaus, with Geiberger three shots off the pace.

Bob Lunn of Sacramento, Calif., was alone at 206 after a 66.

Hill's 72 gave him 207, and tied at 208 were Ray Floyd and Marty Fleckman, each with a 69.

Arnold Palmer, who barely managed to qualify, had a 71 for 215.

Billy Casper, another favorite, also had a 71 for 211, and the defending champion, Bob Goalby, also with 71, was in the 210 group.

Nicklaus, after a so-so opening, hit a beautiful approach on the 527-yard ninth green, the ball stopping about two feet from the pin. He holed it for an eagle three.

Weiskopf, who took over the lead in the second round, shot 35-36 for his 71, while Geiberger made the trip in 33-35—68. The latter had four birdies and one bogey on the front nine.

A freshman pro, Bob E. Smith, from Sacramento, had a 72 for 209.

Also at 209 was Jimmy Powell of Riverside, Calif. The 33-year-old club pro led the first day with a 64, fell back with a 76 and came on again this time with 33-36—69.
