Oklahoma University and Oklahoma Aggies Will Battle for Edge in Semi-final Bouts; Kansas

State and Aggies Tie for Points

STATE COLLEGE, Pa., March 28. Oklahoma University and Oklahoma Agricultural College, time-honored rivals in their own State, will battle It out for the edge in semi-finals of the third annual wrestling tournament of the National Collegiate Athletic Association being held at Penn State College as a result of today's prelimiparies and quarter finals. The University team qualified five, one more than its Aggie rival. The University of Illinois also qualified four,

The Aggies and Kansas State are leading in points, however, each with two as a result of falls scored in today's matches. Nine other teams scored one point each for a fall.

Penn State's entries were eliminated early in the grappling, three of them being put out in the preliminaries and one tonight in the quarter final. This last, Paul Long, 175-pounder, put up a valiant fight against Eubanks, of Oklahoma University, but lost by the narrow margin of 26 seconds in two extra periods,

The forty-six bouts on the day's card produced several fast matches in addition to the Long-Eubanks fracas, particularly that between Berry, of Oklahoma University, and McGuirk, of the Aggies, which had to go two extra periods to a decision.
