

Two Classes in W-FL —

Changes In Wrestling

Wrestling, a sport that has mushroomed in the area in recent years, has undergone several changes for the 1964-65 season, particularly in the Wayne-Finger Lakes conference.

At a recent meeting, it was noted that the conference will now be divided into two classes. In Class A are Canandaigua, Geneva, Mynderse, Newark, Penn Yan, Waterloo and Wayne. In Class B are Clifton Springs, Dundee, Phelps, Union Springs and Victor.

Dundee is a new team in the league after wrestling as an independent for several seasons and Victor is making its first appearance as a league member. Union Springs is a member of Section 4 while all other teams are members of Section 5.

Marion, a member last season, has withdrawn from the league for this season because the school cannot secure a coach.

Section 5 also has been reorganized with 39 schools included in Class A and 40 schools in Class B. Under this new reorganization, Penn Yan, Waterloo, Mynderse and Wayne step up from Class B to Class A.

An early highlight of the season will be an all-league tournament at Penn Yan, Dec. 18-19. This is not to be confused with the regular conference championships held at the end of the season.

League secretary, Lynn Tewksbury of Phelps reports that "we are more or less presenting our teams to the public before the battle for Class A and Class B league championships begin. We hope this adds to our season."

For the regular league season, trophies will be presented for the best winning percentage in both Class A and Class B.

For the Section 5 tournament, the same seven Class A schools will compete. In Class B, Union Springs drops out and Trumansburg and Odessa - Montour enter.

A new rule and a new weight classification have been added in wrestling this season.

The rule states that a boy may not wrestle more than one class above his actual body weight.

The new class is unlimited for boys weighing 235 pounds or more. This will provide 13 wrestling classes in the dual

meets if the unlimited class is used. This class is optional in dual meets.

The regular heavyweight class will still be used for boys over 180 pounds.

For the Dec. 18-19 tournament, which will be held at Penn Yan, all 12 teams will be entered. There will be a team championship trophy plus individual shields to winners and certificates to runnersup.

The season gets started on Dec. 12 for four Class A teams when Waterloo visits Canandaigua and Newark travels to Mynderse. The rest of the league will not see conference action until Jan. 8.

'Fine Tribute' —

Soanes Named to ECAC All-College First Team

"It's a fine tribute to a fine tackle," Coach Al Kelley remarked today on learning that Capt. Al Soanes of the Statesmen had become the second Hobart player this season named to an Eastern College Athletic Conference weekly football team.

Soanes, a 6-2, 200 pound senior from Batavia, was named for his play against Tufts, Saturday.

"It's a great way to go out and it's a fine tribute to a fine tackle and a great leader," Kelley said. "He's played great ball and I'm happy to see him go out this way."

Kelley noted that Soanes "went all the way in that game," playing both tackle spots. He moved from his own spot to the other tackle position when Jim Herendeen wasn't able to make the trip and then Jim McVey was hurt.

Soanes is the second Hobart player to win the honor. Eric Christenson was honored at guard several weeks ago.

SEATTLE (AP) — Fred Hutchinson, dead of cancer at 45, is at rest today on a green carpeted hill overlooking Lake Washington and the scenes of his childhood.

His friends by hundreds stood with heads bare and bowed in the warm autumn sun as last rites were said at Mount Olivet Cemetery for the man whose life was dedicated to baseball.

In those valleys below he had romped as a boy. Not far to the north is the Franklin High School field where he first gained notice as a promising young pitcher. There, too, is Sicks' Stadium, the Pacific Coast League park where Fred won his 19th professional game on his 19th birthday—a field to which he returned twice in later years as manager.
