

Six Class B Teams Compete at Victor Saturday —

Victor Slight Pick Over Phelps in Wrestling Tourney

VICTOR — Host school Victor rates as favorite with Phelps a close second judging from the pairings for the annual Wayne - Finger Lakes Class B wrestling tournament to be held all day Saturday at Victor Central School.

Five Victor wrestlers are seeded first and four more are rated second for the tournament while Phelps has four number one seeds and three ranked second.

Victor is the defending champion, having won the title last year at Union Springs. Phelps was second and Union Springs, third ranking pre-tourney power, was third last year.

Union Springs is favored to win two classes and finish second in two others.

Marion has one first and one second rated wrestler while Dundee and Clifton Springs each have one wrestler figured to finish second.

The tournament begins with weigh-ins between 11 a.m. and 12:30 p.m. Quarterfinal action is set for 1 p.m. with the semi-finals at 3 p.m. and the consolation round at 6:30 p.m. The finals are listed for 8 p.m.

All rounds but the finals will be wrestled off on two mats. Four tournament champions last year are back seeking another title.

Two are from Phelps with Bill Nolder, who won at 103 last year, trying again at 112 and Danny Ottley, who won at 120, looking for a repeat at 138.

Craig Powers of Union Springs, winner at 95 pounds last year, has moved up to challenge Nolder at 112 pounds.

Dave Smith of Victor won the heavyweight title last year and is back to defend that crown this season.

Marty Brake of Victor, who will be at 127 pounds this year and ranked first, was runner-

up last year as was Alvis Humphries of Marion, runner-up at 138 pounds last year.

Jim Winkler of Victor was third at 145 pounds last season and is rated second at 165 pounds this year. Dundee's Bill Miller was third at 120 pounds last year and is second seeded at 127 pounds this year.

At 95 pounds, a pair of freshmen are rated pretty much even. Doug Wayne of Union Springs got the number one ranking on a draw with Frank Hendershot of Phelps listed as second. Both were unbeaten when the drawing was made.

Dundee's Tom Pollack probably would have been rated first at 103 pounds, but he has been hospitalized with an arm infection and may not be ready for the tournament. Thus, Merritt Powers of Union Springs won the top seeding with Ed Heaven of Victor being listed as number two. Powers is a veteran while Heaven is a freshman.

Nolder, top seeded at 112 pounds, was a runnerup in the Class B sectionals last season with a 17-2 record and has three straight pins so far this season. Craig Powers, ranked second, won at 95 pounds last year.

At 112 pounds, Terry Cotton of Victor is seeded first with Bob Howell of Phelps rated a slight choice for second over Bob Blodgett of Victor and Terry Christiansen of Clifton Springs. Howell, though a first year wrestler, is undefeated this season.

Marty Brake and two time Section 5 champion Penn Sheldon, are expected to give Victor a pair of championships in the tournament at 127 and 133 pounds respectively.

Brake's chief competition is expected to come from Dundee's Bill Miller, while Dave Wayne of Union Springs is ranked second to Sheldon at 133 pounds.

Section 5 Class B finalist Alvis Humphries is dropping to 138 pounds for the tournament and is expected to be a heavy favorite there while Dan Ottley, a winner in the tournament at 120 last year, is expected to offer the most competition.

Jim Kenny of Phelps, 20-1-1 two years ago, and injured last season, is expected to get the title at 145 pounds with Victor's Don Corbit listed as the number two choice.

A good battle is expected at 154 with Victor's Tom Bowerman listed a slim choice over second seeded Bob Brouwer of Clifton and Jim Heffron of Phelps.

Another good struggle is likely at 165 with Dick Beniamino of Phelps a slight favorite over Jim Winkler of Victor.

Doug Coston of Phelps, who was third in the heavyweight class in the tournament and runner-up in the Class B Section 5 tournament last year at 180, is the choice over Steve Sheldon of Victor at 180 this season.

In the heavyweight division, Dave Smith, returns to defend the title he won last year when he was undefeated and Section 5 champion. The Victor heavyweight's chief challenger is one of two candidates from Marion.

Though the wrestlers were seeded and placed in opposite brackets, all pairings for the first round were drawn so that seeded wrestlers in the tournament did not necessarily draw a bye into the semi-finals.

Scoring for the team title will be on a basis of two points for a quarterfinal win, five for winning in the semi-finals, two for winning in the consolation and three for winning a final bout, meaning a champion will add 10 points to his team's total.

In addition, the winner of any bout will receive an additional

point for any bout won by a fall, default, disqualification or forfeit.

Individual and team trophies will be presented at the close of the tournament.

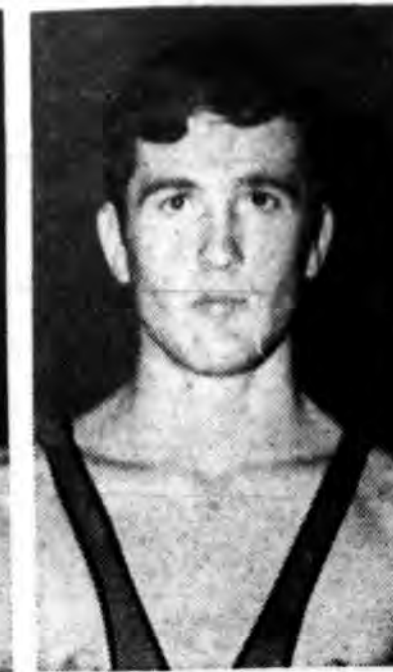

5 Others on Second Team — Four All-Americans Listed For South in Senior Bowl

MOBILE, Ala. (AP) — Four All-Americans head up the 27-man South squad named today for the 19th annual Senior Bowl football game at Mobile Jan. 6.

Alabama end Dennis Homan, the crack pass catcher, and rugged Tennessee center Bob Johnson are from the All-America first team on offense; linemen Dennis Byrd of North Carolina State and Greg Pipes of Baylor are from the first team defensive array.

Five other South squadsmen made the All-America second team.

They are Florida State's quarterback Kim Hammand, who ranked second in the nation in total offense; Clemson lineman Harry Olszewski; Tennessee lineman John Boynton; and linebackers Fred Carr of Texas-El Paso and D. D. Lewis of Mississippi State.

Carr, at 6-5 and 232 pounds, will be the biggest linebacker

Offensive linemen who will work with the 223-pound Boynton and 240-pound Olszewski are Maurice Moorman of Texas A&M, 241 pounds, and Ernie Ruple of Arkansas, 250 pounds. Auburn center Forrest Blue will share duties with Johnson.

Defensive linemen include Dan Sartin of Mississippi and Marvin Upshaw of Trinity University. Jimmy Keyes of Mississippi and Tommy Roussel of Southern Mississippi will help man the linebacking posts.

Defensive backs are Bobby Johnson of Alabama, Robert Atkins of Grambling, Andy Beath of Duke and James Hill of Texas A&I.

Hank Stram of Kansas City's Chiefs will coach the South squad and Mike Holovak of the Boston Patriots will direct the North. The North squad will be announced later this week.

Tigers Rap Rutgers — Former Coach Didn't Leave Princeton Defenseless

Bill van Breda Kolff no longer coaches basketball at Princeton but he didn't leave the Tigers defenseless.

"It was our second best defensive effort of the season," Coach Pennell said Monday night after the 10th-ranked Tigers ran their record to 4-0 by thrashing Rutgers 83-54.

You might have difficulty convincing Rutgers it was only Princeton's second-best defensive effort.

Trailing 40-29 at halftime, the Scarlet was held to one point in the first 7½ minutes of the second half by Princeton's swarming man-to-man defense, taught by Van Breda Kolff, while Tiger shooters poured in 18 for insurmountable 58-30 lead.
