

'Strangers in the K-Night' Title Tune

Broome Losing Its Windsor Grip

WINDSOR — They can try as they will to keep the Windsor Holiday Wrestling Tournament in Broome County, but they're having a hard time keeping any of the individual titles here.

For a second straight year, the homefolk salvaged a championship in only one of the 12 standard weight classes last night, the much-decorated Tim Jenks of Chenango Forks averting a Broome shutout with his domination of the 155-pound class.

A far cry from a high of seven in 1961, a year that Forks alone plucked off four titles!

Canandaigua took four this time, though unable to overtake John F. Kennedy High of Bellmore for the team crown, with nobody else close to the pair. Lindenhurst, which had edged Long Island rival JFK the last two years, was 34 points back of the Canandaiguans in third place.

It was Canandaiguans who upset top-seeded Broome wrestlers at 98 and 126, freshman Bob Hadsall riding defending champion Mark Mysnyk of Vestal to a 3-2 defeat and sixth-seed Dennis Jones completing an impressive swath with an 11-7 verdict over Dale Schmidt of Chenango Forks. Jones had ousted third-seeded John Mazzarella of Sidney on Wednesday night and yesterday afternoon destroyed summer U.S. Junior third-placer Tim Borshoff, 9-0.

A THIRD NO. 1 seed from Broome went out when Vestal's 177-pounder Bill Selsmeyer was taken down in the third period by Rich McPhee of East Rochester.

Actually a second Broome athlete mounted the victor's stand, tiny Forks freshman Brad Farnham dominating the 92-pound class, but it is an experimental weight that does not count in the team scoring and at which only about half of the schools sent entries.

Steve Hunte of JFK was chosen by the 15 participating coaches as the meet's outstanding wrestler, and winner of the newly installed Bill Bush Memorial Award. Bush,

who died in a 1971 auto crash, won titles for Windsor the first four times the tourney was held (1957-60), a feat matched only by Randy Payne of Sidney in 1965-68.

Hunte, however, joined the exclusive list of three-time winners, which now includes eight. And the two-time state champion, whose father twice was an NCAA finalist for Syr-

acuse U., pinned his way through his four bouts, the windup the first time that Windsor's own Jim Goerman's shoulders ever have been down to stay.

THE CONFIDENT Jenks, beaten in the '70 and '71 Windsor finals though Section 4 titleholder both seasons, missed being the only other all-fall champ when Vic Kelly of

Lindenhurst, "held" him to a 9-2 final, a much wider spread, however, than their 4-2 dual of last winter.

A second 1972 state champ, Dan Hunt of West Genesee, won handily, as did '72 state runnerup Mike Chappelle of Canandaigua.

Jenks and little Farnham had two Section 4 companions, Ken Doi of Sidney moving up from a '71 runnerup role to join the six crowns won by his first-cousins, the Paynes, and unheralded Bill Hedges of Greene thoroughly justifying his high (No. 2) seeding at 167.

For a while in the afternoon, it looked as if Canandaigua's vermilion-clad tide would sweep JFK under. At one stage, the Chiefs had five finalists and no other school more than one. But Dan Lubell, who has swollen up from the 98-pound runnerup of two Decembers ago to 145, fought for his life to edge Canandaigua footballer Steve Schrader, and defending-champ heavyweight Dean Schoostberg of JFK dispatching another Canandaiguan to nourish the lead back to 14 points prior to the evening competition.

The two didn't go head-to-head at all therein, and actually Doi's late 2-point near-fall to nip Canandaigua's Ron Langdon in the 105 final clinched it for JFK.

BUT IT WAS Canandaigua which made the greatest impression on most spectators, host Windsor coach Mike Turco squarely in the Upstaters' corner if a dual could be arranged. Canandaigua coach Weldon "Walt" Canough saw his first Windsor tournament as a Vestal practice-teacher aide in 1960, when Turco won as an Ithaca soph.

Both JFK and Canandaigua had won tournaments last weekend, JFK besting Lindenhurst in a 12-team Central Islip field and Canandaigua trampling the pack at North Syracuse. Section 4 schools can't participate in such luxury: the state limit is two in-season tourneys and hereabouts each of the leagues operates its own.

What becomes of the tourney now is undecided, and Turco said it isn't a certainty that Windsor won't operate again for a 17th year though currently looking for a "foster home".

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
