Randolph fourth in Division II

Matmen win three championships, but finish fifth

LAKEWOOD - Although they dropped down a place in the standings, from a first round fourth to a final fifth, the Salamanca Warriors made a strong showing in Division I of the Southern Tier Wrestling Conference Tournament here Saturday at Southwestern High School.

The Warriors claimed three championships, one runner-up spot, three third places and one fourth place. All three Warrior champions also come out winners in the wrestle-off with winners from Division II.

Division II standings saw the Randelph Cardinals move up a notch to fourth place in the final standings. Two Cardinal wrestlers won division championships, two finished second, three third and one fourth. Both division champions lost to Division I opponents in the inter-divisional championships.

In the final team standings, Maple Grove won the Division I title with 92 points. Southwestern finished second with 60, followed by Falconer, with 561/2, Olean, with 501/2, Salamanca, with 481/2, and Cassadaga Valley, with 451/2. Maple Grove had four champions, Salamanca and Olean three each, including winners in the 88 and unlimited weight classes, and Southwestern and Falconer two apiece. Cassadaga Valley did not have any titlists.

In Division II, Silver Creek won the team title with 83 points and two champions, Dunkirk was second with 72 points and three champions, followed by

Westfield, with 641/2 and one championship, Randolph, with 541/2 and two champions, Ripley, with 461/2 and one champ, Pine Valley, with 321/2 and two champs, Sherman, with 22 and one champion, and Fredonia, with 131/2 and no champs.

"I thought we did fairly well, considering that it was our first tournament," said Warrior coach George Whitcher, "I was pleased with the way our boy's wrestled. Except for Maple Grove, the final results were close. Only 15 points separated the second and last place teams, and we were only two points out of fourth and 12 out of second."

Warrior winners were John Fitzgerald, at 112, Mark Sartori, at heavyweight, and John Weir, who was unopposed at

For Randolph, Rod Green won the title at 145 while John Cowan claimed the championship at 177.

Other Salamanca finishers were Tom Ciolek, with second at 145 John Callan

third at 119, Mike Newark, third at 105, Jack Hager, third at 177, and Pete Newark, fourth at 126 after defaulting in the consolation round because of a shoulder injury.

In the inter-divisional competition, Sartori won a 9-1 decision over Roy Russell, Silver Creek, Fitzgerald, two time sectional champ, took a 3-1 decision over Darrell Stebbins, Westfield, and Weir' pinned Ripley's Rick Swoger in 1:45.

Randolph's two divisional champs both lost in the wrestle-off, with Green getting pinned by Olean's Kirk Anderson and Cowan losing to Maple Grove's Bill Spencer. On a default after dislocating his elbow. Cowan will be sidelined for an indefinate period with that injury.

Other Randolph place winners were Dave Fellows, second at 88 pounds, Ron Towers, second at 119, Ben Pierce, third at 112, Terry Schulz, third at 132, Jordan Aiken, third at 155, and Tim Linkous, fourth at 105.

"I was very happy with our per-formance," commented Randolph coach Boz Hubbard. "I thought everyone did a fine job. I think overall we made a lot better showing than some of the other teams there we thought we would."

Both Salamanca and Randolph will be returning to dual meet action on Tuesday. Randolph will host Maple Grove and the Warriors will host Jamestown.

In dual meet action on the season, the Cardinals are 1-2, with their win a 51-18 victory over Fredonia in their last dual competition. Probably lineup for the meet will be Fellows at 98, Linkous at 105, Pierce at 112, Towers at 119, Mark Holbert at 126, Schulz at 132, Dan Hill at 138, Green at 145, Aiken at 155, John Hoffman at 167, Scott Slater at 177, and Bob Nelson at Heavyweight.

Salamanca will head into their contest against Jamestown unbeaten in dual competition. The Warriors, after taking a close decision from Gowanda in their opener, picked up decisive victories over Allegany and Wellsville in subsequent outings.
