Oswego State Matmen Second

Brockport Reigns In SUNYAC

OSWEGO — The Brockport State Eagles copped their fourth straight SUNYAC team championship this past weekend at Oswego State's Laker Hall.

Brockport, SUNYAC champions in 10 of the last 12 years, amassed 141 1/4 points to easily outdistance runnerup Oswego (100). Following were Albany (92), Binghamton (88 3/4), Buffalo (73 1/2), Cortland (66 1/4), Oneonta (63 1/4) and Potsdam (29 3/4).

Coach Murray of Brockport was named Coach of the Year, while Buffalo's Andy Komarek copped Most Valuable Wrestler honors.

In last year's SUNYAC Tournament at Oneonta, Brockport finished first (149) while Oswego was the runnerup (113 1/4).

Oswego's Doug Morse, grappling at 190, repeated as champion in his weight class. Morse pinned University of Buffalo's Guy Lucas in 3:25 for the title.

In first-round action, Morse drew a bye and then

went on to pin Oneonta's Paul McAdon in 2:18 to set up the final bout.

Lucas finished as runnerup in last year's 190 category.

At 118, Oswego's Mike Coddington finished fifth after copping a default victory over Brockport's Ed Morales. In consolation-round action, Coddington fell to Binghamton's John Leo.

In first-round activity, Coddington fell by decision to Oneonta's Jeff Grossfeld, 2-0.

Albany's Dave Averill captured the championship after decisioning Grossfeld, 7-5.

Oswego graduate Dave Parisi captured the 118 weight class last season.

At 126, Oswego's Pat Wittekind also placed fifth after decisioning Oneonta's Desmond Basnight, 11-2.

Wittekind had reached the semifinals after initially defeating Basnight, 8-4, but lost to Cortland's Bill Murphy in a 7-5 decision.

Defending SUNYAC champion Frank Famiano of Brockport repeated as the

126-pound champ by overpowering Murphy.

At 134, Oswego's Mark Howard lost to eventual champion Andy Komarek of the University of Buffalo 3-2 in overtime during preliminary-round activity.

Komarek defeated defending champion Spero Theofilatos of Albany 14-9 in the semis and then decisioned Bill McHugh of Oneonta in the final, 11-5.

Howard went on to post a 7-0 decision over Potsdam's Duane Averill in consolation action, and then advanced by decisioning Binghamton's John Egitto, 5-2.

In a bout for third place, Howard fell to Brockport's Mike Franklin by pin in 3:47.

At 142, Oswego's Mike Letcher copped third place after pancaking Potsdam's Gregg Bruno in the consolation round.

Letcher had pinned University of Buffalo's Jim Tyrell at 4:33 to set up his final match.

Letcher advanced to the

semis after pinning Binghamton's Gary Bochner in 1:56, but lost to eventual champion Andy Seras of Albany by decision, 21-6.

Seras successfully defended his SUNYAC title by pinning Brockport's Dave Reor in 4:12 during final action.

At 150, Oswego's John O'Gorman dropped a 4-3 overtime decision to Albany's Ed Gleason in preliminary-round action. O'Gorman then dropped to Potsdam's Bryon Gross 11-5 during consis.

Ron Winnie of Brockport successfully defended his title after decisioning Binghamton's Mike Truncala, 9-2.

On the 158 level, Oswego's Mark Bowman placed third after decisioning Brockport's Kevin Sistrunk, 5-4 in consolation-round action.

Bowman overpowered Oneonta's Kevin Delargy 12-3 prior to his third-place finish.

In first-round action, Bowman initially decisioned

Sistrunk 4-3 to advance to the semis.

Binghamton's Keith Cavayero, however, nipped Bowman 7-5 to go on to the finals. Cavayero then copped an 11-4 decision over Cortland's Howie Greenblatt in the finals.

At 167, Oswego's Tom Stanbro pinned Oneonta's Greg Kern at 3:55 to advance to semifinal action. Brockport's Jeff Cox, however, posted a 6-0 decision over Bowman to advance into final action. Cox then upended Binghamton's Tom Pillari 13-7 to notch the title.

Stanbro pinned Cortland's Don King in :30 in the consis, but was decisioned by University of Buffalo's Marty Pidel 7-6 in a bout for third place.

At 177, Oswego's Paul Newman reached the semifinals only to lose by decision to champion Anthony Connetta of Brockport, 18-6.

Connetta repeats as SUNYAC champ. He topped the Lakers' Stanbro last

season.

The second-seeded Newman pinned Oneonta's Harry Higgins in :15 during first-round activity, and then flattened University of Buffalo's Arthur Pittman in 3:55 during semis.

In the heavyweight class, fifth-seeded Mark Glickman for Oswego decisioned Binghamton's Chris Mackin 7-4 to reach the semis. Albany's Vic Herman, however, posted a 12-8 decision over Glickman to advance into final action.

Herman then pinned Brockport's Scott Nichols in 3:58 to cop the individual title.

Glickman recorded a 5-0 overtime victory over Cortland's Bob McMorris in consi action, but was toppled 7-4 in a rematch with Mackin for third place.

The six Lakers who placed will compete in NCAA Division III tourney action, while Stanbro and Howard will carry wild-card status. Glickman will compete as an alternative.
