Michigan State Wins Three National Titles As Jennings Twins and Maxwell Defeat Their Foes in Finals

Those agile, ambitious Aggies from Oklahoma have done it again.

Last night the powerful wrestling team from Oklahoma A. & M. college won their sixth successive national collegiate wrestling championship in the finals of the 15th annual tournament at Michigan State college.

The muscle boys from the Big Six successfully stood off the challenge of Michigan State for the second year. They scored 31 points to the Spartans' 26, State came home with three champions, winning in the first

three weight divisions. The Jennings twins, Merle, at 121 pounds and Burl at 128 pounds, successfully defended their titles in decision victories, and Bill Maxwell, a runner-up last year, climbed the 136-

pound throne with a pin triumph. State's hopes of unseating the Aggies suffered a fatal setback when Capt. Leland Merrill lost a decision to Theodore Seabrooke, the University of Illinois Big Ten champion, via a decision, in the semi-finals. Merrill returned to win third place in the eight during the consolation round. He scored three falls in his five bouts.

The Aggies returned their two de-Arndt, 145, and Virgil Smith, 165, to the championships. Dick DiBattista of the University of Pennsylvania kept his 175-pound title. Vernon Logan, another Aggie, won the 155year.

Merl (Cut) Jennings successfully defended his 12-pound title by outpointing Malcolm MacDonald of Purdue in an exceedingly close bout. The Spartan midget won by the margin of a single point. He made an escape and went behind MacDonald once. MacDonald made two escapes. They were on their feet most of the time. Jennings was the aggressor but found in MacDonald, a former high school teammate in Tulsa, Okla., an entirely capable opponent.

Jennings in the semi-finals won a decision over Dick Kpel of Michigan by a wide margin of points, 22-5, while MacDonald beat out Charles king, 8-3.

Burl (Bo) Jennings broke the Oklahoma Aggies' golden ring for the third time in the tournament when he conquered an old nemesis in the person of Captain Sid Marks of the champions. Marks had twice before defeated Jennings, in dual meets during the 1941 and the past season. Burl got an early lead by going behind from the stand, and later in the match escaped Marks and went behind with a lightningfast elbow roll. "Bo" also had a minute time advantage.

of Penn State, 3-0.

Maxwell put on a slashing performance in winning the 136-pound bout from Fred Bishop of Cornell college. Runner-up last year, the lithe Spartan quickly asserted his mastery and had Bishop on the defensive. He was well ahead in points when he put on a guillotine pinhold. Bishop was helpless in the hold for 15 seconds before Maxwell finally got his shoulders on the carpet. This came in the second period. Bishop then went behind Maxwell in the third period and Maxwell at once came out, scored a near fall and retained the advantage until the bell rang.

David Arndt gave the Aggies their fending champions, David (Buddy) first championship by scoring a decisive decision victory over Manley Johnson of Michigan. Arndt was too strong and capable for Johnson who made a spirited fight in the early minutes but gradually succumbed to pound class. Logan was a champion Arndt's mastery and barely escaped in 1940 but did not compete last being pinned in the last minute. Johnson was a Big Ten champion.

Vernon Logan followed in Arndt's footsteps in beating Theodore Seabrooke of Illinois, Big Ten champion. in the 145-pound class. Except for a couple of escapes, Seabrooke was at a loss to meet Logan's versatile wrestling. Seabrooke decisioned Captain Leland Merrill in the semi-finals.

Virgil Smith, another Oklahoma A. & M. product, became the fourth defending champion to score a victory when he out-pointed W. P. Carmichael of the navy, 3-2. The bout was close as the score indicated. Smith had a clear edge but it required the time advantage in his favore to decide the bout.

Closest bout of the night saw Dick DiBattista, of Pennsylvania university, defend his 175-pound title. Di-Battista earned a referee's decision over Leon Martin, of Iowa State Teachers college. The Penn strongman almost lost the bout, and the crowd, judging from the shouting and booing that greeted Referee Clyde Sharer's decision, thought so. too. The wrestlers stood at 4-4 at the end of the regular bout and it was 1-1 when the extension finished. He decisioned Mark Matovina, Big DiBattista made an escape just be-Ten champion, 9-5 in the semi-finals fore the regular bout ended to pull while Marks blinked Samuel Harry, even. Otherwise Martin would have won.
