## 4 percent water hike wins okay

A four percent hike in water rates was approved informally Tuesday by the Tonawanda Common Council.

The new rate would go into effect March 1 and be reflected in August billing, according to William Ball, superintendent of the Water Department.

Mr. Ball recommended an 8 percent hike, but the council rejected the proposal in favor of the smaller increase.

Mr. Ball said the increase would mean a hike of about \$1.20 a year to the average water-user.

The increase, the first in two years, would not affect sewer rates.

Alderperson Gayle Syposs, chairman of the council's Water Committee, said the increase was needed to offset one-time retirement and capital improvement costs.

Council President Timothy Murray said he would prefer no rate increase, but said there is no alternative

alternative.

Alderman Bruno Bieniek noted a

ronawanua migh School successfully defended its Niagara Frontier League high school wrestling title Tuesday with a thrilling 24-21 victory over visiting Niagara-Wheatfield at the George Miller Gymnasium.

A packed house saw the Red Warriors win their 10th league match of the season against no defeats. Niagara-Wheatfield, which lost earlier this season to Kenmore East, finishes at 8-2.

THS Coach Glenn Bateman, who in 10 years at the Warrior helm has won the NFL title five times and finished second behind N-W the five other seasons, said this was a team championship.

"It's been the same thing all year," Bateman said. "We don't have a star wrestler, but different guys carrying the load at different times. It is a team championship...that's for sure."

Tonawanda opened the match with gusto. Highly-regarded Rick Postula pinned Jody Johnson in just 50 seconds of the 177-pound match and the Red Warriors had a 6-0 lead.

Jim Hosie (215) and Jason Caprio (98) posted decisions for N-W and the Falcons deadlocked the score at six.

Rob Fire responded for THS as he pinned Fabian Rosati in just 1:59 in the 105-pound match to put the Red Warriors back in front by six.

Kevin Roe, Tonawanda's eighth-grader, picked up a key two points when he escaped with about a minute to go and deadlocked Steve Wolanyk 6-6 at 112. Roe also had a takedown as time was winding down, but the referee said no much to the dismay of the crowd.
