Eight Finger Lakes Wrestlers Gain Finals

Eight of 15 Finger Lakes wrestlers are still alive and awaiting the Section 5 tournament finals Saturday, after scoring victories in semi-finals last Saturday.

Six of the winner will compete in the Class A finals to be held at Geneva against Rochester City school champions. The other two, from Waterloo, go into the Class B finals slated for Wayne Central School.

The other seven Finger Lakes grapplers will compete in their respective consolation rounds. Matches are slated to begin at 7 p.m.

Penn Yan continues to lead the Finger Lakes in Class A, pushing three of its four entries into the final round. The Marchionda brothers, Dick and Larry, won in the 95 and 103 pound classes respectively, and Mel Brinson copped a decision in the 138 pound class.

Two of the four Geneva wrestlers also made it to the finals. Bill Brooks at 120 pounds and the underdog Dick Atkinson at 154

pounds scored victories.

Canandaigua got through one of its two entries when Bob Domm won.

In the Class B match at Dansville, Duane Goodman at 127 pounds and Leo Lemieux at 165 pounds, both of Waterloo, advanced to the finals with decisions Saturday.

One of two Odessa wrestlers also reached the finals when Larry Teeter decided Wnuk of Livonia, 4-3.

The Class A semi-finals went along pretty much according to expectations. One touch turn of events for Finger Lakes wrestlers was in the 112 pound class.

John Houck of Penn Yan was ahead, 7-2, when he was pinned by Bill Covell of Wellsville in 5:18.

Bill Brooks of Geneva, wrestling one of his best matches of the season, scored a 7-1 decision over Jerry Jackson of Wellsville.

Two of the least noted wrestlers on the team quietly chalked up victories. Penn Yan's Brinson, greatly underrated by everyone but Penn Yan fans, easily handled highly regarded Arland Hanning of Hornell, 5-0.

And Geneva's Atkinson, who seldom made the headlines, quietly went about the project of pinning Peter Frey of Corning Free Academy. The time was 4:58.

Canandaigua's Bob Domm, improving with every match, was leading 2-0 in a tight match when he pinned Jack Barry of Corning Free with just two seconds to go in the match at 5:58.

Jay Covert at 165 and Dick Post at 180, both of Geneva, and Bill Cole, unlimited, of Canandaigua, all had the misfortune of running into former sectional champs.

Covert was decided, 8-0, by Northside's Tom Brockway, who won last year, and Cole was pinned in 3:21 by Stan Gridley, also of Northside, another shield winner last year.

Ray Johnson, of Corning Free, who pinned Post, won the title two years ago but lost in the finals last year.

Both Mynderse entries lost tough matches. Ron Hooper was pinned with 14 seconds left in the 127 pound division, and Bill Jackson lost a 3-1 decision.

In the Class B meet, both Goodman and Lemieux avenged scrimmage losses earlier in the season. Goodman had lost to Huff and Lemieux had lost to Marsh, both of Honeoye Falls, by a single point in earlier meetings.

Lemieux, incidently, almost didn't wrestle Saturday. Bothered by an ear infection, he was advised not to wrestle until his doctor agreed that the ear guards used by some wrestlers, was sufficient protection to allow the 165 pounder to go on.

Joe Aquilano Wins —

Underhand Foul Slightly Prove OI

SENECA FALLS — Basketball coaches often tell their charges that the underhand method is by far the best way to shoot foul shots.

The results of the axiom were proved here Saturday in the first annual Wayne-Finger Lakes foul shooting tournament, but the margin of success over other styles was so narrow as to leave the issue in doubt.

Only seven of 21 participants' including champion Joe Aquilano of Geneva High School, used the highly touted underhand form. They made good on 147 of 175

tries for an 84 per cent average. The most popular method exhibited in the tournament, the one-hand push shot, was the second most successful. Eleven players using this style completed 222 of 275 shots, or 80.7 per cent.

The two-hand overhead method was used by three participants,

who tallied 60 of 75 shots for an 80 per cent average.

Aquilano won the tournament on the strength of completing 24 straight free throws after missing his first attempt.

Although the first-place winner followed the tried-and-true underhand method, three boys who tied for second place are one-hand push advocates.

They are Marv Ottod and Jim Boenheim of Lyons and Walt Jojnacki of Waterloo. All three netted 23 of 25 shots in regular competition.

Because of the tie, the trio were pitted against each other in special play-offs.

Ottod won the first with 15 straight successes to take second place, while Boenheim and Jojnacki were tying again with 11 of 15 each. Jojnacki then won third place with seven of 10 shots, while Boenheim completed
