NCAA DIVISION I WRESTLING CHAMPIONSHIPS

Surprises rule the day at CSU

 Iowa captures the championship, Minnesota sneaks into second place, and Ohio State's Clark goes out a winner

The NCAA Division I Wrestling Championships were dominated predictably - by the Big Ten and the Big 12.

Again, Iowa and Oklahoma State found themselves hooked up in a thrilling duel at Cleveland State University's Convocation Center. They went deep into last night's championship rounds before settling matters.

Iowa was supposed to be vulnerable this season, considering the Hawkeyes' legendary coach, former Olympic champion Dan Gable, had taken a sabbatical. Oklahoma State was ranked No. 1, and its regular-season win over the Hawkeyes gave the Cowboys momentum.

But lurking in the shadows were the Minnesota Gophers, who fared no better than third place in the Big Ten Tournament. The Gophers stunned the sellout crowd of 12,829, moving past Oklahoma State to claim the runner-up tro-

That, of course, left the Hawkeyes with their fourth consecutive title. Iowa scored 115 points to far outdistance Minnesota (102) and Oklahoma State (99½).

Yet, even with the superb performances of the top-three finishers, there were other compelling moments during these NCAA championships.

There, too, were even a few surprises.


No one expected Ohio State's 177-pounder, senior Mitch Clark, to overwhelm his competition. In doing so, he endeared himself to the crowd, which was the fourthlargest in championship history.

Clark, the division's No. 1 seed, hardly pushed himself in scoring an awe-inspiring 18-0 technical fall over No. 6 seed Vertus Jones of West Virginia. Clark captured the national championship a year after losing in the title match.

While Clark's win wasn't surprising, Dwight Gardner's victory in the 167-pound final was somewhat stunning. The Ohio University junior upset the No. 1 seed, Hardell Moore of Oklahoma State.

Gardner's win gave the Mid-American Conference reason to push out its collective chest. Gardner is the conference's first national champion since Buchtel High graduate Andy Daniels won the 118-pound title in 1978.

Gardner and Clark have waited

patiently to win their titles. But for Iowa's Joe Williams, standing atop the podium has become a familiar sight.

Williams, a four-time All-American and the tournament's Most Outstanding Wrestler, won his third consecutive title at 167 pounds. Williams fell behind 2-0 early, but he stormed back to score a 7-4 win over Penn's Brandon Slay.

But it was Clark who left a lasting impression. He methodically took apart Jones' defense, getting four nearfalls in outclassing Jones.

"I wasn't expecting it to go like that," said Clark, who finished with a 38-1 record.

Clark slammed Jones to the floor five times. He used his legs to tie up Jones, locking him up with a figure-four to take an 11-0 lead just 58 seconds into the first period.

"It was just a great feeling," Clark said. "I kept looking at the clock, trying to get it done in the first period.

"I've had guys fold like that before. I guess the foot sweep is what really set the tone. I've been working on that all year, and I don't think I hit that but once or twice."

Though, as expected, Clark marched out of the Convocation Center with a gold medal, the Hawkeyes were the unexpected winners. For the first time in nearly 10 years, they were legitimate underdogs.

Iowa, with its devoted followers

screaming endlessly, entered the championship matches with a slim five-point lead over the Gophers after the morning session.

The Gophers, who placed behind Iowa and Penn State in the Big Ten Tournament, couldn't generate enough points in the evening session to keep pace.

The Cowboys applied the pressure on Iowa immediately. Teague Moore, a 118 pounder, and 126pounder Eric Guerrero opened with impressive victories to overtake Minnesota.

Moore's win was unexpected. The tournament's third seed upset top-ranked and unbeaten David Moore of Michigan State, registering a pin at the 4:50 mark.

Guerrero was inspired by his No. 3 seeding. He figured he was better than top-seeded Eric Jetton of Wisconsin.


At least, he was last night. Guerrero, who twice survived pin attempts by Jetton, won a 5-4 deci-

Then, the nation's No. 1-ranked team set its sights on the Hawkeyes. The Hawkeyes had to counter quickly to maintain their lead.

The Hawkeyes' 134-pounder, No. 1 seed Mark Ironside, responded with a win over Shawn Enright of Ohio University. Then, 142-pounder Jeff McGinnis decisioned Casey Cunningham of Central Michigan.

"I knew it was important to score a lot of points in the morning and not depend on somebody else getting beat," said Iowa coach Jim Zalesky. "It's (national championship) in our hands, and that's what you want."

Michigan's Bill Lacure, a **North Canton** graduate, is on top of Penn State's Clint Musser, a Walsh Jesuit graduate. during their 150-pound consolation match. Lacure won this match and went on to take a fourthplace finish. Musser came back to win his final match and take fifth. Both earned All-America status.

Musser can't get past Lacure

North Canton standout wins 3-2, goes on to finish fourth at 150. Musser takes fifth

With their hometown friends sitting in the stands of Cleveland State's Convocation Center yesterday, Penn State's Clint Musser and Michigan's Bill Lacure could feel the butterflies sputtering inside their stomachs. In only their second meeting ever, all that was at stake was a place in the third-place match in the 150-pound division. They had hoped for much more during the NCAA Division I Wrestling Championship.

After battling toe-to-toe in the Big Ten title bout two weeks ago, Musser and Lacure envisioned themselves stepping onto the high platform of center court, challenging for the national title.

Musser was hoping to become

the second Walsh Jesuit graduate to win a national title (Mark Mollica won twice while at Arizona State). Lacure was hoping to place a first-place trophy in the showcase of North Canton High.

Still, at stake was their immense pride.

Lacure, competing in his third and final national tournament, survived a monumental struggle with his former Junior Nationals teammate. The North Canton graduate won 3-2 to gain a spot in the thirdplace match opposite West Virginia's Mike Mason.

"I knew it would be tough and emotional match," said Lacure, who became a three-time All-American. "Clint's a very tough wrestler.

"He came out strong and ag-

gressive. This match could have gone either way. I was fortunate to get the win."

Lacure earned a chance at gaining redemption. It was Mason who shattered his championship dreams, beating him 11-6 in the quarterfinals.

After beating Mason twice in the regular season, Lacure's 6-4 loss in the third-place match left them even at 2-2.

Yet, fourth place wasn't all that bad for Lacure. He placed fourth two years ago in the NCAA finals.

Musser secured his fifth-place finish with a convincing 12-3 major decision.

"No matter how bad I felt, I had to win that last match," Musser said. "I couldn't go out with another loss."
