As a Senior at Huntington High School, Giani placed third in the High School State Tournament and was appraached by several colleges interested in recruiting him. "Rhode Island offered me a scholarship but I decided B'port would be best because of the Phys. Ed. Dept., and especially because of the wrestling program that Coach (Don) Murray had put together here."

The choice seems to be a natural: Joe's father Lou Giani, a former Olympian, is the Head Coach at Huntington. Lou coached not only his son, but also Don Murray, Brockport's highly successful wrestling coach. Adds Joe, "My father also encouraged me to enroll at Brockport."

Joe Giani's college career record now stands at 85-6-1 including many tournament championships. Last weekend's SUNYAC tournament held at Brockport, yielded Giani his third SUNYAC title. "Getting the Most Valuable Wrestler award and winning it (the SUNYAC) in front of the home crowd was the biggest thrill of my wrestling career, "commented the three time champ. "It's been great watching the program improve and mature here at Brockport. I'm really glad to be a part of that growth."

In his spare time Giani chooses to relax by spending some time in the woods fishing or hunting. Joe also has worked in the Campus Rathskellar since his freshman year.

Graduation in May won't end Joe Giani participation in his favorite sport. I'll be working with my father at Huntington High school as the JV wrestling coach."

Giani and Giani should be quite a tandem, but there is a segment of the saga not yet finished: the countdown is still 3...2...and holding. Holding that is, until the National tournament begins this weekend at John Carroll University in Cleveland, Ohio.
