Clar Leads Section 6 Hopefuls

You start with Clar Anderson - Olean High School's superstar with a world of modesty — when the prospects for the Western New York team in the state wrestling championships are discussed.


Anderson, a New York State champion in the 112-pound class last March, bids for his fourth trip to the state action at Sweet Home Central School when the Section 6 (five WNY counties) tourney starts its two-day stand Friday. He takes a 30-0 log for the season into the 126-pound division and his five-year varsity record of 151-won, 7-lost; 1tied mark is an all-time New York State record.

ANDERSON IS a solid favorite and it's possible that teammates Robbie Parks and Ron Inzana could gain berths on the Section 6 team that will travel to the state championships. But, it's Salamanca Central that could come up with three Section 6 champions, and possibly a fourth.

In Dan Ciolek (177 pounds), Marty Redeye (heavyweight) and Pete Lee (unlimited) as well as 91-pounder, Chris LoPresto, Salamanca coach Larry Reynolds has four solid contenders for Section 6 berths. Redeye has a 27-3 record, the losses in the tough Baldwinsville Tournament, and this season marks the first that he is healthy enough to make it to the Sectional. The past two years, he failed to make it via injuries.

Lee made it to the states last year and he could go all the way, considering his mobility and experience.

Pioneer's Jeff Owens is another regarded as a solid dark horse choise and he is in the 119-pound division. That's the weight class that is considered the toughest of all and Alex Conti, of Fredonia, appears to be the favorite.

In the 98-pound division, Southwestern's Doug Baer and Falconer's Jeff Waddington are the second and third seeds, behind Newfane's Calvin Swanson, but Waddington is considered as the winner by most observers.

Finally, the Southern Tier (Cattaraugus and Chautauqua counties) could win nine of the 14 championships at Sweet
