

Five champions carry Warriors to title in tourney

FRANKLINVILLE—Five champions carried Salamanca to a first-place finish in the 12th annual Franklinville Invitational Wrestling Tournament Saturday.

Salamanca had six wrestlers in the finals and five Warriors came out with victories in leading the squad in the nine-team tourney.

Final team scores showed Salamanca with 134 points followed by Franklinville at 107, East Aurora 100, Cattaraugus 85½, Bolivar 73, Pine Valley 69, Allegany 49½, Olean Walsh 31 and Belmont 10.

Warriors winning in the finals were Dave Givens at 91 pounds, Chris LoPresto at 112, Ron Leder at 119, Jeff Zariczny at 132 and Dave Zariczny at 138. Dave Painter was bested in the 128 pound weight class.

"It was a good, overall tournament for us," said Salamanca coach Rich Morton, "because the competition is more at our level at the stage where our program is now."

"It is great to get our first tournament win," he added, "and it was a total team effort as all did a nice job with placement points. I have to give credit to all the kids who were in the finals, especially Jeff Zariczny who got a big boost in his confidence with his victory."

In addition to the five winners and a second place, the Warriors also got placement points from Marc Swiech (third at 98 pounds), Todd Titus (fourth at 145), Al Harris (fourth at 155) and Ed Eberle (fourth at heavyweight).

Jeff Zariczny, who pinned both his opponents on way to the finals, had a tough time in the 132-pound final against Peter Spinks of East Aurora.

Zariczny trailed by 5-4 after the first period and Spinks got two points in the

last seconds of the second period to tie the match at 10-all.

Jeff then got the only two points of the final two-minute period for the 12-10 win.

To get to the final, Jeff pinned Frungillo of Allegany in 1:04 and Ratzel of Bolivar in 4:48.

"Jeff had an outstanding day," said Morton. "He really wrestled up to his potential and came through in the final in a tight match."

LoPresto and Leder also won both of their first matches by pins to gain the final.

LoPresto took down DeMarte of Walsh in 5:16 in the first match and Schmidt of Belmont in 3:36 before besting Andy Fusia of East Aurora by 24-4 in the championship.

Leder, who won his final by default injury over Mike Sherlock of Walsh, pinned Zaproski of Allegany in 56 seconds of the first bout and Farley of Pine Valley in 4:20 of the semis.

Dave Zariczny took an 18-0 decision over Ullman of Allegany in his first bout, bested Raymond of East Aurora by 7-1 in the semis and then fought back to decision Steve Bielecki of Franklinville, 16-6, in the final.

Painter won over Kardes of East Aurora, 11-0, in his first bout and decided Klucik of Walsh, 7-2, in the semis before losing to Keith Harvey of Pine Valley, 6-2, in the final.

Givens won his only match as he pinned D.J. Bielecki of Franklinville in 4:35 of the final.

"It was nice for Dave Givens to get another win," said Morton, "especially since it was in the final of a tournament. Marc Swiech won his first varsity match and gained third place; Chris LoPresto used the tourney as more of a tune-up for next week's tourney at Sweet Home; Ron Leder pinned his way to the finals; Dave Painter did a nice job in his two wins as he beat first-seeded Klucik in the semis; and Dave Zariczny needs to sharpen up a little as he did not wrestle well after a spectacular win at St. Bonaventure last weekend."

Swiech won his first bout as he pinned Evans of Franklinville in 41 seconds for third place. The Warrior lost his first bout to Bryant of Cattaraugus.

Titus lost his first match to Booth of Cattaraugus and then pinned Ed Moricca of Walsh in 1:42 before losing to second-place finisher Tim Heddon of Franklinville in the semis.

Harris won his first bout by 6-0 over Bronneburg of Walsh and then was pinned by Paul Perfetto of East Aurora. In the consolations, Harris lost to Gross of Pine Valley by 2-1.

Eberle pinned Whitney of Belmont in 5:47 and then lost a 4-1 decision to Eric Everhart of Pine Valley and was pinned by Jack Peck of Allegany for fourth place.

Other winners were Mike Dunsmore of Bolivar at 98 pounds, Jeff McDonald of Bolivar at 105, Peter Crisafulli of Allegany at 145, Tony Wilber of Franklinville at 155, Rod Hill of Cattaraugus at 167, Todd Hill of Cattaraugus at 177, Eric Everhart of Pine Valley at heavyweight and Matt Martin of Allegany at unlimited.

Wilber, a three-time winner of the tourney, was named the outstanding wrestler as he won all three bouts by pins, including one in 2:52 over Perfetto in the final, while Dunsmore received a trophy for his three pins in the fastest time, totaling 6:03.

Salamanca is at home Wednesday against Falconer and travels to Portville Friday for 8 p.m. matches.

The Salamanca High Wrestling Booster Club will meet tonight at 8:30 at the Holy Cross Club. Anyone interested is invited to attend.

49ers arrive early for practices

PONTIAC, Mich. (AP)—The San Francisco 49ers, anxious to get started on the biggest week of their football lives, were in town early as the Super Bowl XVI countdown began in sub-zero temperatures.

The National Football Conference champion 49ers arrived Sunday night, nearly 24 hours ahead of the Cincinnati Bengals. The winners of the American Conference were due to arrive tonight.

The media blitz for the two teams begins in full force Tuesday with photo day in the Silverdome, where both clubs will practice for the Sunday showdown.

This will be the first Super Bowl not anchored to a warm-weather site, and early arrivals Sunday had an instant reminder of that when they were greeted by temperatures that hovered around minus-8 degrees with a wind chill of about minus-45.

The Bengals, of course, will feel right at home in that climate. They battled even more brutal cold and wind — the wind-chill factor was minus-59 — when they eliminated San Diego in the AFC title game eight days ago. The 49ers

joined them in the Super Bowl by staging a brilliant 89-yard march in the final minutes of the NFC championship game for the winning touchdown to eliminate Dallas.

The weather won't be a factor for either the Super Bowl practices or the game, though, because the Fibreglas-covered Silverdome is climate-controlled. It's always 72 degrees and dry inside.

Besides being the first Super Bowl to be played in the north, the Cincinnati-San Francisco match marks the first time that two teams came from losing records one year to challenge for the NFL championship the very next season. Both the Bengals and 49ers posted 6-10 records in 1980 but staged remarkable turnarounds this season, finishing with the best records in their respective conferences.

San Francisco's 13-3 regular-season record included a 21-3 decision over the Bengals, who finished the year at 12-4. That would seem to be a good omen for the 49ers, who also had regular-season victories over both the New York Giants and Dallas, the two teams they beat in playoff games en route to their Super Bowl date with the Bengals.

In their victory over the Bengals, the 49ers got a pair of touchdown passes
