
28-6-2 Combined Wrestling Log for 3 Schools

CORNING — With three crack wrestling teams and a combined won-lost-tied record of 28-6-2, this Crystal City has to be the Southern Tier's hot-

bed of wrestling.

Take Corning Community College. Gene Palmer's Barons have dropped just one match in three seasons, that in the opener this year at Morrisville. Since then the Barons have gone 8-0-1.

On the scholastic level, Corning - Painted Post East compiled a 12-1-1 record, with a final season upset loss offsetting the Trojans' thrilling, one-point upset of mighty Southside a week earlier.

George Scala's Corning-Painted Post West grapplers salvaged a so-so, 8-4 season by winning the West-Central Conference Tournament championship — which included East.

The collegiate Barons dropped their first match in the history of the school last Dec. 4 against Morrisville Tech, but since then have reeled off eight wins and a tie for a three year victory total of 18-1-3.

Don Levantovich can be thanked in part for this gaudy showing. The 177-pounder has put together a win skein of 16 regular season matches in his two - year college career. The Corning co-captain is the reigning Region 3 champion at his weight level and is expected to make a strong bid to repeat this year.

Pat O'Brien, who wrestles heavyweight or 191 when the occasion calls for it, completed the year with a 5-0 slate. The Letchport native has picked up the slack since Keith Clark was put on academic probation.

Corning - bred Mike Watson is basically a 115 pounder, but has wrestled twice in the 122-pound weight class and was defeated both times. If Watson had not suffered these two setbacks he would have finished the schedule 7-0.


