

The Wrestling Season

WITHOUT a doubt, this year's Wrestling team has done more to put Franklin and Marshall in the Athletic Hall of Fame than any other team that ever represented the school with the possible exception of the football team that defeated the University of Pennsylvania in 1914. The fact that makes the achievement border on the miraculous, is that wrestling is a comparatively new sport. While comparative scores may be indefinite, nevertheless the mat team has made a record that not only compares favorably with the best teams in the country, but undoubtedly is the best, for very few teams can boast of an undefeated team and have met teams of the calibre of the Blue and White opponents.

Beginning with a victory over the Army at West Point, the Blue and White men, a week later defeated the strong C. C. N. Y. team in the local gym, the opponents scoring but three points. Two weeks later the Blue and White mat-men shook the wrestling world by a decisive defeat of the Princeton mat-men at Princeton. Temple University team was practically annihilated in the next meet, being unable to score a single point against Ne-

vonia. One of the most difficult and strenuous meets was with Duke which team sometime before had given Navy a stiff fight. Nevertheless Franklin and Marshall continued its winning streak and came through with a decisive victory. The last meet of the season, and perhaps the most pessimistically awaited, was with the triumphant Syracuse mat-men who were going through a most successful season. This meet resulted in a one-sided victory for F. and M., the opponents scoring but three points.

Bishop in the 115 pound, scored the highest number of points, 22, with no scores against him; Krise, likewise, had no scores against him. The entire team scored more points individually than those scored against them.

Three men, Kunkel, Schenck and Snyder will be lost to the team by graduation. The remaining weights will, in all probability, be held by the same men.
