Opening the season with a new opponent on the wrestling schedule, the matmen won their first home match. Defeating Wilkes College was no easy matter, for it took pins by two Long Island freshmen to clinch the match 18-17. Don Gleason and Al Chase got the pins and Roy Kessenich and Vic Gerhard won decisions.

The next match, also a home encounter, resulted in a loss to a powerful Hofstra College team. Losing all their matches except for two draws, the match ended with Hofstra on top 28-4. Gene Palmer at 157 lbs, and Heavyweight Jerry Stiles showed much finesse in battling their experienced opponents to draws.

Just before the end of the semester, Cortland again played host to an elusive Rochester Tech team. With only Dick Klima, Vic Gerhard and Jerry Stiles winning decisions, Rochester won 17-9.

With the new semester, a few of the weights changed hands, by the loss of Gene Palmer to practice teaching, a few temporary injuries and the addition of a few new faces to the squad. During the between semester vacation the C.S.T.C. grapplers traveled to Plattsburg, New York, to face Champlain College. Though slightly hampered by a juggled line up, Cortland pulled the match out of the fire 15-13 through decisions by Hennessy, Klima, Kessenich, Chase, and Stiles.



Cortland State Red Dragons 1951-1952 Wrestling




