

SLU cagers to tour Poland next summer

The St. Lawrence University basketball team has been invited to participate in a tour of Poland this summer by the Polish Students' Organization.

Paul Evans' SLU basketball team, which will open its 1975-76 season Monday, will play several games in Poland as well as gain a valuable opportunity to meet the people and see the sights of that country.

Zbigniew Dembowski, the Polish Consul General in New York, said in a letter to Evans. "Enculturation's Friendship Program has opened new bridges of communication and understanding through sports between our two countries. I applaud this marvellous program and your participation in this unique experience.

"We concur with the judgment of the Athletic Committee that St. Lawrence University is an excellent representative of the American people. We eagerly anticipate your arrival and look forward to the enthusiastic reception that we know awaits you."

The trip will cost the team \$600 per man, which will be raised through donations from fans and friends of the team as well as through various fund-raising affairs instituted by the basketball team.

Evans greeted the announcement of the invitation with pleasure saying, "Not only will our players be able to see a foreign country, but they will also be able to experience good basketball on an international level. It is a great boost for our program and for the university as a whole."

Amato hopes to help the team achieve its maximum potential during a difficult 1975-76 schedule, through a regimen of hard work and discipline.

A basic philosophy that Johnson and Amato share is the concept that winning is important and stems from team unit. They also believe that a good coach gets to know his team members in a very personal way. It takes more than just supervising a practice. They agree that a good coach willingly help each team member in all phases of his college life.

A "tightly packed schedule and excellent opposition" are in store for this year's team, Johnson noted, adding that he is optimistic about Potsdam's chances to gain a top spot in the State University Conference and the State and to place among the top 10 college division teams in the country. Amato shares his outlook.

Although three All-Americans lost through graduation will be sorely missed, there still exists the nucleus of another typically strong Potsdam squad.

There are nine returning lettermen. led by All-American and national runner-up Tony Peraza, who lost the national championship on a disputed call last spring in Cleveland.

left off last season. But oddly, he might just wrestle his toughest matches in practice against teammate Keith Lyndaker who has been out of school for two vears.

An All State performer on the 1972-73 squad, Lyndaker returns after serving a two-year assignment as an orderly in a Syracuse hospital to fulfill terms of his conscientious objector status.

His best weight class is 150 pounds. which is the same as Peraza's, and the two will battle it out each week to determine who will get that class in the next match. The loser will probably move up to the next heavier weight, but the battle could go on for the entire season.

In addition to these two, Terry Atwater and Stephen Carr, both All-State performers last season at 126 pounds and 167 pounds respectively, are back along with a third All-Stater from last year's squad, Mike Niziol.

Johnson considers Niziol who wrestles in the same weight class as Atwater, as one of the most aggressive and probably the best "take-down" wrestler on the squad.

But what will determine the ultimate success of this team will be the performances that Amato will be able to get out of the freshmen and transfers-especially in the 118-pound, 190-pound and unlimited classes. There are no established veterans returning at these weights, so they will have to be filled by new men.

Johnson always had the knack of coming up with a few aces from the ranks of the unknown, and perhaps the youthful Dave Amato will have inherited the knack along with the job. Potsdam's wrestling season will begin with a home dual meet against Brockport State on Dcember 3.

On Saturday, December 6, Potsdam State will host the annual Northern New Invitational Tournament. This year the Bears will be pitted against the wrestling teams from Clarkson College. St. Lawrence University, Colgate University, Cortland State, Geneseo State, Oswego State and Mansfield
