Invitational is on with 13 schools ready to attend

The weather isn't too bad, seedings are set and all schools are 'Go' for today's scheduled start of the eighth annual Salamanca Invitational Wrestling Tournament.

Tournament Director George repeat. Whitcher was in contact with all schools yesterday and, by late afternoon, all said they were still coming despite their schools being closed early yesterday in anticipation of a heavy winter storm.

"The phone has just been ringing off the hook about the confusion," said Whitcher. "We will make a decision at 11 a.m. today (Friday) as to the status of the tournament so we will have enough time to contact all the schools.

"But as of yesterday (Thursday) afternoon," he added, "all the schools had contacted me and told me they were still planning to attend. The conditions in downtown Buffalo are not good but once you get out of the city, the roads pretty well are clear."

Predictions of the storm for this weekend have not come about, at least here in Cattaraugus County, and the snow has not materialized; or, if it has, the winds have been blowing it away so

Last year, the Blizzard of '77 hit the Thursday before the tourney, slated for 21 teams, and just seven were able to show up. Whitcher and others involved in the tournament hope there is no

The eighth annual Salamanca Invitational Wrestling Tournament will get underway today at 6:30 p.m. with 13 of the 18 schools. As of 11 a.m. today, five schools had informed Tournament Director George Whitcher that they would not be able to attend as the schools were closed. Scratches include Pioneer, Churchville-Chili. Williamsville East, Frontier and Medina. All other 13 schools will be at the tourney.

As things shape up, a total of 23 unbeaten wrestlers (at least six wins) are entered while there are 32 with just one loss, 35 with two losses and 18 with three losses, making for one of the most outstanding tournaments ever put on in Salamanca.

The 18 teams scheduled to compete total around 190 wrestlers and the competition will be hot, hard and heavy if things come off as expected.

Teams entered are Allegany, Cattaraugus, Churchville-Chili, Frontier, Geneseo, Maple Grove, Medina, Notre Dame of Elmira, Olean, Pioneer, Portville, Salamanca, Southwestern, Sweet Home, Warsaw, Wellsville, Williamsville East and Xaverian.

Xaverian, of Brooklyn, drove in yesterday as the 16-team members traveled in a van the approximate ninehour trip. They were here last year, arriving the day before the blizzard struck.

Whitcher set the seedings, using at least six bouts as a cut-off mark, and those with 3-0 or 5-1 marks were not included in the seedings.

Olean and Sweet Home each have three top seeded wrestlers while Salamanca and Pioneer each have two. Listed first for Olean are Kevin Forrest (13-0) at 126 pounds, Chris Leichtweis (12-0) at 155 and Kirk Stephen (11-2) at 167.

Sweet Home's top rated wrestlers are John McHugh (15-0) at 105 pounds, Paul Reed (14-1) at 132 and Cedric Hinton (14-1) at 177.

Salamanca's top seeds are Marty Redeye (10-1) at heavyweight and Pete Lee (6-2) at unlimited. There are just six wrestlers in the unlimited class.

Rated first for Pioneer are Lee Friend (11-1) at 91 pounds and Tom Bennett (11-1) at 119.

The rest of the top seeds are: Charley Morley (13-0) of Medina at 98 pounds, Kevin Richard (10-0) of Geneseo at 112, Tim Hitchcock (13-0) of Notre Dame at 138 and Jon Swan (9-0) of Southwesternat 145.

Action gets underway today at 5:30 p.m. at the high school with action continuing Saturday throughout the day and finals slated for Saturday night.
