

Ciolek and Lee into semis:

# Olean leads after two rounds of annual Invitational

Olean has 12 of its 14 wrestlers still in competition and they hold an 18 point lead after the first two rounds of the ninth annual Salamanca Invitational Wrestling Tournament last night.

A total of 166 bouts in the first two rounds were completed with Olean advancing 10 of its contingent while Athens, Pa., is next with eight in the semi-finals.

Action began at 11 a.m. today with the wrestlebacks followed by the semis, more wrestlebacks and the consolations (for third and fifth places) scheduled for 6:30 p.m. The finals will begin at 8 p.m.

Unofficial team scores show Olean on top with 67½ points followed by Athens with 49½, Sweet Home 42½, Churchville-Chili 39, Geneseo 32½, Salamanca 30½, Medina 29, Williamsville East 27, Wellsville 26½, Pioneer 25½, Maple Grove 24, Cassadaga Valley 23, Notre Dame of Elmira 19, Allegany 16½, Southwestern 15, Portville 12½, Warsaw 10, and Cattaraugus four.

Two Salamanca wrestlers went through the first two rounds unbeaten as Dan Ciolek at 169 pounds and Pete Lee at unlimited gained pins in both of

their bouts.

The 56 wrestlers heading into the semis today total 10 from Olean, eight from Athens, five each from Sweet Home and Churchville-Chili, four from Geneseo, three each from Notre Dame, Medina and Williamsville East, two each from Wellsville, Salamanca, Pioneer, Maple Grove, Cassadaga Valley, Portville and Allegany with one from Southwestern.

Of the top seeds, just Medina's Tim Menz fell victim as the 10-3 freshman was decisively, 7-1, by Sweet Home's Dennis Grady, an eighth grader with a 2-1 mark.

The other top seed out is Salamanca's Marty Redeye, 15-0 at heavyweight. The warrior junior broke his ankle Thursday in a freak accident in the gym and is expected to be out at least six weeks.

Salamanca's other two top seeds were Ciolek and Lee. Ciolek, second at 169 with a 14-1 mark, ran his pin mark to 13 as he took down Geneseo's Jeff Fenton in 1:36 of the first round and Allegany's Dan McGranahan in 3:01 of the second round.

Lee, a 9-0 junior, also gained two as he pinned Portville's Ricky Mott in 52 seconds of the first round and Medina's Scott Lempke in 1:40 of the second.

In today's semis, Ciolek goes against 14-3 Mark Wolcott of Athens while Lee tangles with Athens' Alan Ervin, carrying a 12-5 record.

Seven undefeated wrestlers remain so, with wins in both rounds, and they include Notre Dame's Pat Hughes (currently 11-0), at 107 pounds, Olean's Clair Anderson (17-0) at 114, Notre Dame's Scott Sheehan (9-0) at 121, Geneseo's Paul Richard (13-0) at 140, Southwestern's Steve Swan (12-0) at 157, Portville's Mark Jaekel (18-0) at 169 and Williamsville East's Mark Migulski (14-0) at 179.

One potential match-up that will not come off is at 114 pounds as Scott Webster of Athens did not make the trip. The 14-0 junior was injured in his team's match earlier this week and he was moved down from 121 pounds so he and Anderson could eventually wind up facing each other.

Aside from Anderson, the rest of Olean's double winners are John Hickey at 91 pounds, Bruce Taylor at 98, Andy Robbie Parks at 147, Rick Fie at 157, Kirk Stepph at 179, Mark Darrow at heavyweight and Jack Quigley at unlimited.

Athens' semi-finalists are Phil Schaefer at 91 pounds, Manley Firsbee at 98, Dave Gleason at 128, Shehan at 121, Jim Bender at 134, Eric Walter at 147, Wolcott at 169 and Ervin at unlimited.

Portville still has Dave Gleason at 128 pounds and Mark Jaekel at 169, Allegany has Eric Nannen at 140 and Tony Crisafulli at 147; Southwestern has Swan at 157; and Wellsville has Jeff Kling at 91 and Kevin Mott at 140.

The rest of the Salamanca squad saw just Chris LoPresto at 91 pounds, Randy Dry at 121, Mike LoPresto at 134, Jeff Earley at 140 and Todd Bullers at 157 make it to the second round.

Chris LoPresto won over Warsaw's Dan Tucker by 13-8 but then lost to Schaeffer 12-8; Dry topped Cassadaga Valley's Pacitti by 7-2 but then lost to Taylor of Olean by 10-4; Mike LoPresto

decided Barry Pfaff by 10-2 but then got pinned by Mott in 39 seconds; and Bullers decided Witney of Medina, 10-7, and then got pinned by Steve Bower of Cassadaga Valley, in 5:22.

Warriors losing their first bouts were Bernie Conlan at 98 pounds, George Metzler at 105, Jamie Reynolds at 114, George Bryant at 128 and Mike Budzinski at 147. Ned Watson, at 179, shut out Corbo of Notre Dame in a preliminary but then lost to Brian Bonis of Sweet Home by 5-0.

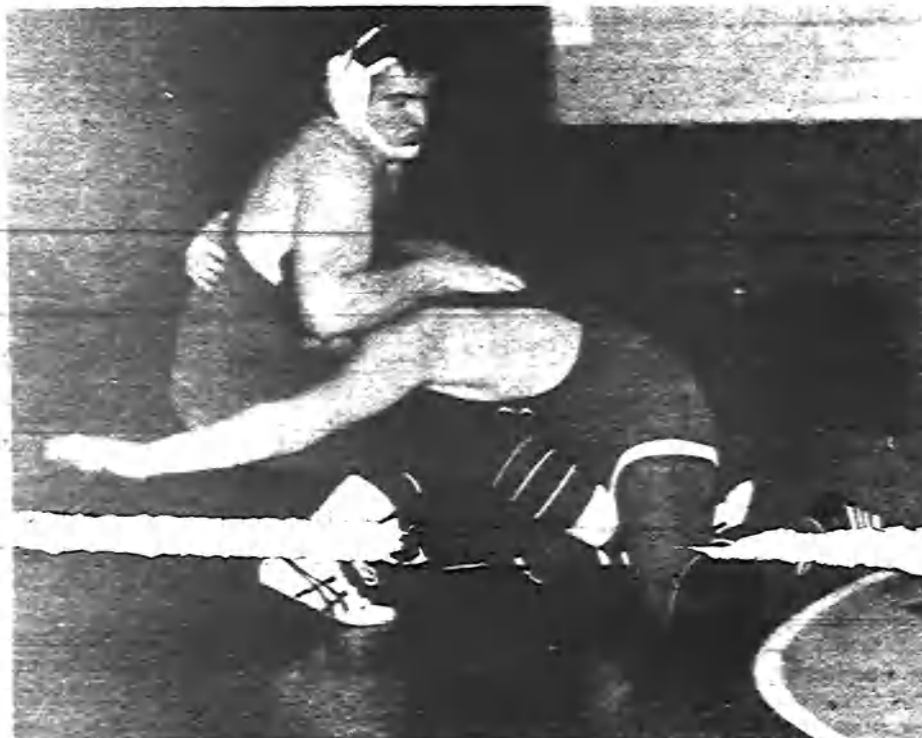

## Parker inks big contract; Pirates expect big things

PITTSBURGH (AP) — Dave Parker has entered the big money realm of Rice & Rose, and now the Pittsburgh Pirates await production to match his paychecks.

"I have big plans for the coming season. I'd like to win the Triple Crown and possibly play in the World Series," Parker said Friday after announcing he'd agreed on a five-year pact.

Terms weren't disclosed, but it's estimated that the total package is worth \$4 million to \$5 million.

"It's not a policy for us to let that be known, but I'm very content," said Parker, 27, winner of two straight National League batting titles and the NL Most Valuable Player last season.

The 6-foot-5, 230-pound right fielder had said he wanted a contract that ranked with the best.

That included the reported \$5.4-million seven-year pact the Boston Red

Pirates expect big things from Parker in their bid to regain the NL East title and revive attendance.

"I honestly believe he is the best all-around player in the game today," said Galbreath.

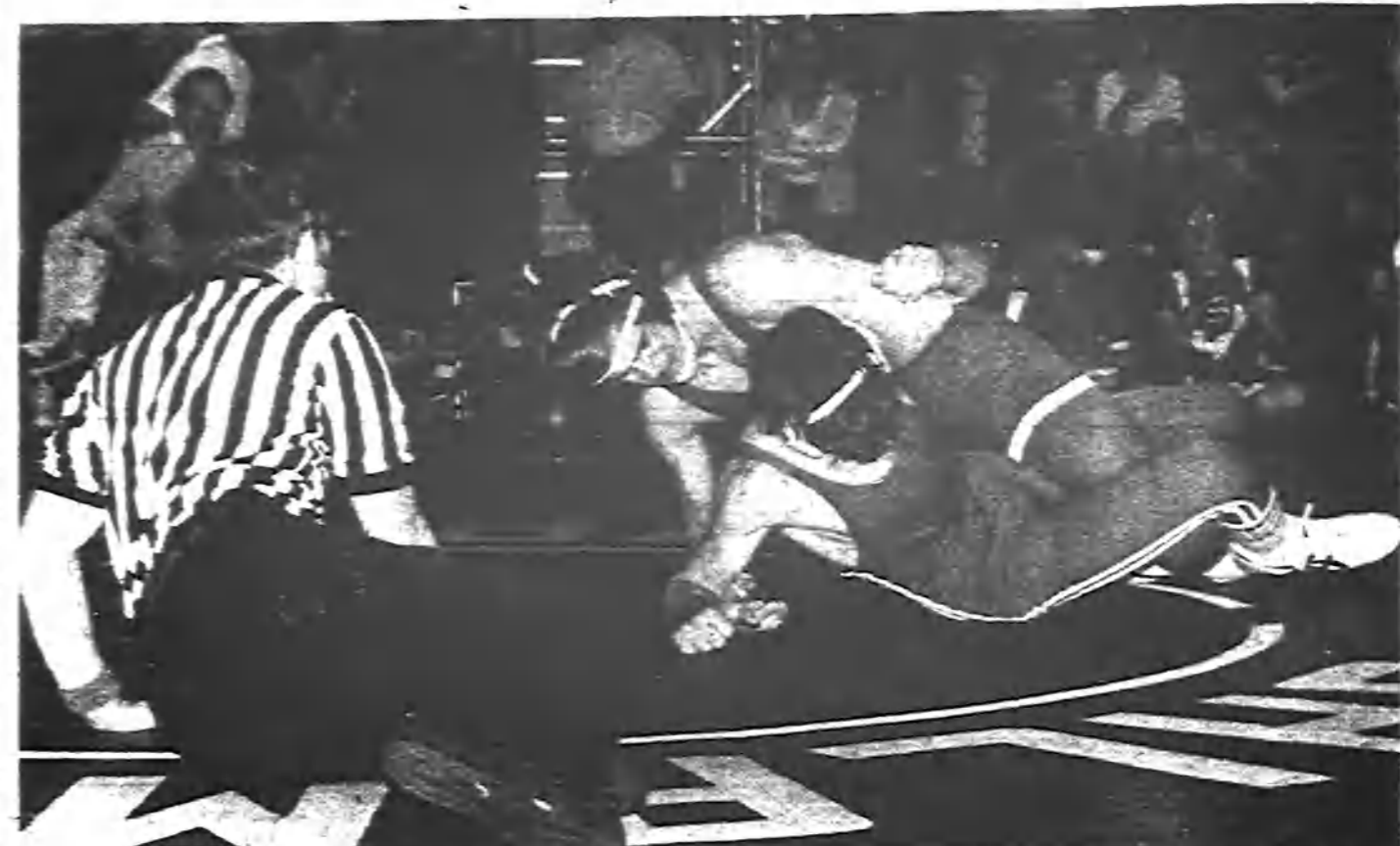
"And he hasn't even begun to play up to what his capabilities are," said Manager Chuck Tanner.

Parker had one year left on a contract that paid \$225,000 yearly. The new pact takes effect immediately.

Parker had said that if no agreement was reached by Feb. 1, he would play next season with Pittsburgh and enter the free-agent market.

At one time, General Manager Pete Peterson said he hoped to have agreement with Parker by Thanksgiving. "I didn't say what Thanksgiving," Peterson kidded.

Talks stalled after the Pirates made a hefty offer to Rose. Parker and his agent, Tom Reich, revised their de-

BOSTON — A federal appeals court refused to remove a legal roadblock to the signing of New England Patriots Coach Chuck Fairbanks by the University of Colorado.

Judges Levin Campbell and Bailey Aldrich denied a Colorado motion to lift a preliminary injunction ordered Jan. 15 that prohibits Fairbanks from jumping his Patriots' pact, to take the Colorado coaching job. A new hearing was set for Feb. 6 by the 1st Court of Appeals in Boston.

The injunction was issued by U.S. District Court Judge A. David Mazzone against the University of Colorado regents and officials and football booster Jack Vickers.
