SALAMANCA - Believe this or not, folks, George Whitcher's miracle at Salamanca Central School came about Saturday and it had its touching moments

Such as the kid from Southwestern Central School who hitch-hiked in the sub-zero weather to make it to the wrestling site.

Such as the Portville Central kids, one of them Terry Miller, who had tears in their eyes when told, Friday, that Portville would be unable to make it to Salamanca.

The seventh annual Salamanca Wrestling tournament originally booked with 21 schools and assured of SRO turnouts on the Friday and Saturday dates - was a bruised and battered event, compliments of the arctic-like weather, but it did come through as a one-day stand.

And, that's where that "Miracle of George Whitcher's" comes about.

The persistence and tenacity of the Salamanca football coach who is also the tournament's guiding light was the ultimate payoff. The one-day stand starting at noon and ending up with the championship bouts at 10 p.m. - was trimmed down to seven schools and, in the end, it was the two schools - Olean High and Pioneer Central that were regarded as the cofavorites, who battled it out for the team title.

Olean emerged as the winner. making it two straight years as champ of the tournament but Pioneer ended up with six individual titlists to Olean's five.

THE KID who hitch-hiked was Southwestern Central's Jon Swan and he made it to the title bout of the 155 pound division, losing out to Portville's Terry Miller. It made Miller the tournament's Most Valuable Performer. It was the battle of unbeatens, as well.

Miller's selection as the MVP was razor-thin, winning by one vote over Pioneer's Kyle Grunwald, the 138 pound victor. Miller had a pin and decision victory before his 7-5 win ("what a battle, it was one that saw both of them going at it like hammer and tongs"- Whitcher) over Swan.

Grunwald.- last year's New York State champ and still unbeaten over a two-season span - had two pins and a decision.

In all, there were 128 bouts and the balance that Olean coach Mike Foster has at his command, was the story. Pioneer's strength is in the lighter classes — all six victors from the 138 class on down. Olean scored points in all but one weight class, the 165 pound class, while Pioneer failed to pick up points in the 145, the 155,

the 177 and heavyweight classes.

THE SALAMANCA gym was heated by an alternate plan, using an old, discarded boiler that had never been removed from the heating area. "Also," Whitcher added, "I had the complete backing of our administration. Here we called the tournament off, twice on Friday, and each time I came back to Bill (Valent, superintendent of schools) and Clair (Wescott, high school principal) and asked to have it back on. Here are two men who have a number of pressing problems to think about and they were 100 per cent in our corner.'

Portville almost never made it.

On Friday, coach Dutch

Sturdevant notified his squadmen that Portville would not make the trip. A number of the squadmen, had tears in their eyes, one of them being the unbeaten Miller. "Somehow," Whitcher added, "they prevailed on the coach and a mighty fine director of athletics (Mike O'Brien) how important this was to them." Swan was one of two
