

# Bristles on the Welcome Mat, Windsor's Getting Itchy

Windsor didn't let its wrestling tournament get away after 16 years. Now the Windsorites have another ambition: to keep a few more of the first-place trophies at home.

Last year's tournament found the annual 16-team holiday event dominated by the long-distance guests as never before, but the trend had become obvious from the start of the 1970s.

Up till then, four titles was the most Section 4 wrestlers ever had rendered up to The Rest of the World in any Windsor Tournament. Nine were

carried off in both '70 and '71, and last December, excepting for the experimental 92-pound class, the invaders accounted for 10 of the 13 individual titles, and eight more runnersup.

Again Bellmore (L.I.), John F. Kennedy High and Canandaigua look strong, but two late revisions in the JFK lineup make Windsor coach Mike Turco think positively about his own team's chances as prelims began this afternoon, with quarterfinals tonight, semis tomorrow afternoon and finals at night.

Steve Cavoyero, who had been seeded No. 1 at 98 pounds, has surrendered to a weight problem and moved up to 105, even though it means challenging Mark Mysnyk of Vestal, state intersectional 98 champ last season and U.S. Federation freestyle third-placer this summer. And Steve Grisifi, who's been No. 1 at 155, is out completely with a shoulder injury.

Canandaigua earlier had lost Mysnyk's Windsor conqueror of last December, Rob Hadsell, as a result of injuries when he chased his hat into the path of an auto.

JFK's team victory last year included the completion of the 3-time Windsor triumph by a wrestler other than Section 4's own — Steve Hunte. He was the first from anyplace since 1968 when Tom McCarthy of Ithaca achieved a "triple" and Sidney's Randy Payne became the only 4-timer since the late Bill Bush of Windsor, who'd done it in the tourney's first four years of existence (1957-60). Other 3-timers have been Payne's brother Mark in 1966, and be-

fore him John Soroichinsky of Vestal and later U-E, and Ithacans Jerry Beach and Claude Poole.

Hunte is now wrestling for Iowa State's defending NCAA champions but another strong third-time candidate is on the premises in Dan Hunt of West Genesee. He lost in a preliminary round here as a 1970 freshman, but since then has lost only once to a New York State schoolboy — in the '70 state finals. The stocky little strongman, also a standout in

lacrosse, won both the Windsor and intersectional titles as a soph and junior and is again unbeaten, as interested college coaches in every direction keep an eye on him.

At this time last year, Wind-

sor administrators expressed doubts that they could continue the demanding operation of the event until their new school is completed, but an "out" was found and it's back at the same old stand.

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
