Eastern Wrestling In Quarterfinals Tonight at Barton

The 16-team field in the Eastern Intercollegiate Wrestling Assn. tournament, off an early afternoon mark with preliminaries in all nine weight classes, was bound for the 8 p.m. quarterfinal gong at Barton Hall.

The action will continue with semifinals at 12:30 p.m. Saturday and the finals Saturday night at 8.

Tournament director Patrick Filley anticipated good attendance at all sessions, with 5,000 or more expected out for the finals.

By then the Brown and White squad from Lehigh is expected to be well on its way to a second successive title. Mat fans forecast that Gerry Leeman's group would have it much easier than last year when Pittsburgh was only one point behind in second place.

Pittsburgh is highly regarded once again and is lumped with Syracuse, Army, Navy and Penn State as possible threats to the Engineers.

The only change in the tournament makeup in this 61st creation is the substitution of Colgate for Brown. It is the first switch since Pittsburgh was included in the fold in 1954.

It isn't Colgate's EIWA tourney debut, however. It competed as a guest in 1956.

Six wrestlers were around to defend their crowns. Gerry Franzen, Navy's 177-pounder, and big Jim Nance, Syracuse heavyweight, are looking for thirds.

The others who won last year are Jay Windfelder, Penn State, 123; Mike Johnson, Pitt, 130; Wayne Hicks, Navy, 137; and Marty Strayer, Penn State, 167.

There were two late scratches. Karl Kuppinger, Syracuse sophomore at 167 pounds, was out with a back injury. Coach Ed

Carlin substituted Paul Crapsi in his spot. Temple was deprived of the services of Steve Speers, second last year at 191, because of blisters.

Several squads came a cropper at the morning weigh-ins in Teagle Hall gym and as a result there were some squads short competitors.

Navy's Hicks is hopeful of recouping in the big drill shed after his first dual meet loss as a midshipman last Saturday to Bill Stuart of Lehigh. During his Naval Academy career, including his plebe year, he is 19-1.

Two Lehigh University wrestlers defeated defending eastern champions this Winter. Rich Warnke decisioned John Windfelder of Penn State and Bill Stuart took Wayne Hicks of Navy.

John Illengwarth, Lehigh's heavyweight wrestling star, compiled a 3-year varsity record of 28 triumphs against only four losses in dual competition.

Gerry Leeman, highly-successful Lehigh wrestling coach, has two matmen of his own in the family. Sons Jay and Mark are scholastic grapplers.

Next year's tournament will be at Pittsburgh.
