That, after his brilliant semifinal comeback victory over Ron Geiser of Rutgers might well have persuaded the coaches in presenting him the Outstanding Wrestler award. Nance didn't depart empty-handed. He won the John Fletcher Memorial Trophy for most career points and contributing most to his team in the EIWA tourney competition. He also won the Sheridan Trophy for having the most pins in least aggregate time. He had three in 9:12.
