




At a time when some are questioning the value of athletics in our high school, I would like to explain the important role that Fulton wrestling played in my own education. Every Fulton wrestler gains a valuable insight into subjects not taught in the classroom. The lessons that I learned in this very gym have helped me in every area of my life.

As a Fulton wrestler, I learned about teamwork, discipline, dedication, and leadership. I discovered that hard work and goal-setting are the only means to success. Together, we set the ultimate goal--winning a team state championship. With every workout and every sacrifice, we kept this goal closely in mind. The hours I spent running the bridges, lifting weights, and drilling moves made me a better wrestler, but more important helped our team win the state title. Through this experience I realized that almost any goal can be achieved through hard work. I applied this lesson toward other aspects of my life, namely getting a good college education. Throughout high school I kept this goal in mind when writing every paper and studying for every Regents exam. I later set a higher goal--admission into an Ivy League University. During the application process to Cornell, my Fulton wrestling experience was an extraordinary asset. The college was not interested in hearing about my grades. Every applicant has good grades. They did not care that I took challenging classes. They expected this from everyone. Cornell wanted to know what separated me from the other applicants. The answer was Fulton wrestling. They wanted evidence of achievement, dedication, leadership, and hard work. So I told them about Fulton wrestling. During two separate admission interviews, my wrestling experiences dominated the conversation.

Without Fulton wrestling I would not be who I am today. I don't think I would have ever learned these lessons. I probably would not have achieved the same grades in high school. And I know I would never have gotten into Cornell University. Pee wees, in the coming months and years you will learn things that will help you for the rest of your life. These values cannot be taught in a classroom, in another sport, or in another city. You can only learn them on a mat of red and green. So tonight, when the gym turns dark and the strobes begin to flash, remember that you are part of something very special. You are a Fulton Wrestler.

Fulton coach welcomes tough competition to festival

Welcome to the 1995 Fulton Wrestling Festival. Eleven of the top teams from around that state have gathered for this event. As a coach and a fan of wrestling, I believe this tournament contains as much team and individual talent as any in the state. The competition should be fantastic.

The team title should be up for grabs. We have Suffern High School (ranked ninth in the state for large schools) from the New York City area that brings the defending New York State Champion at 91 pounds in P.J. Bory. Suffern also has state-place winner Griff Powell who hopes to lead the Mounties to a championship.

From the Adirondack region we have Saranac High School, which has five defending sectional champions and three state-place winners in Lance Eagle, Pat Clancy, and state finalist Seth Charles at heavyweight. Saranac is ranked as the No. 1 small school in the state and will be extremely tough to defeat.

Coming to the Fulton Festival from the Rochester area are three more tough teams in Wayne, East Rochester, and Canandaigua. Wayne is led by three Section Five champions in Bill Swedrock, Leo Urbinelli, and Chris Lambino in addition to a solid core of upper classmen. East Rochester has a great wrestling tradition and should add to the tournament.

Led by 145-pound Andy Gustaferro, Canandaigua has emerged as one of the top teams in the state. They are coming off an exciting 25-25 tie with wrestling power Spencerport High School. They are ranked fifth in the state.

Newark Valley will be representing the Southern Tier bringing a young team into the G. Ray Bodley High School gymnasium. The team is led by former Fulton assistant coach Eric D'Arcy. I would like to welcome Coach D'Arcy back and wish his team luck.

Finally, the host area of Section Three adds an abundance of talent to a tough field. South Jefferson (22nd in the state) is led by senior 119-pounder John Bliss. New Hartford brings defending New York State Champion David Caruso, who will compete in the tough 112-pound weight class. Caruso is headed to Syracuse University next season to continue his wrestling career.

Phoenix and Vernon-Verona-Sherrill bring young squads into the tournament. Phoenix is led by the Russell brothers--Clay at 91 pounds and Chad at 105 pounds. The Firebirds also have senior Jamie Richardson at 177 pounds. Vernon-Verona-Sherrill is led by 126-pounder Ben Oliver, and the Red Raiders are always one of the top wrestling powers in Section Three.

The host team, Fulton, is fresh off an exciting victory at the Union-Endicott Dual Meet Tournament. Seniors Matt Mahar, Jeremy Hutchinson, Harley Wakeman, Shawn Clark, Matt Wood, George O'Neil, and Jon Berghorn will lead the Red Raiders to a chance at the title.

In all there are 14 defending individual sectional champions in the tournament with nine state-place winners. Seven of the 11 teams competing are ranked in the top 25


in New York State. It should be a "war." As a coach, I'm proud to host an event of this magnitude.



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


must beat defending Section-V champion Seth Charles to win that division.

Matt Mahar, one of three Fulton wrestlers who is undefeated this season, will wrestle at 126 pounds. This division will be one of the more experienced groups with six seniors in the weight class. Mahar and New Hartford's Dan Perry (5-0) are the ione unbeatens in the division, but Gregg Neisch (16-4) of Phoenix and Jared Facteau (12-2) of Saranac are also having strong seasons.

Joining Wakeman in the upper weight divisions for the Red Raiders will be Mike Kitts at 167, Jason Turner at 177, and David Lasher at 250. Kitts has had a solid season so far going 10-1 while Turner has been a pleasant surprise for Coach Mike Conners with an 8-3 mark. When Lasher has taken the mat he has been perfect going 5-0.

Senior Jeremy Hutchinson brings a 10-3 record into the tournament and will compete at 132 or 138 pounds with Edgar Rodriguez (9-2) wrestling in which ever weight class Hutchinson doesn't.





Filling the Red Raider line-up will be eighth grader Randy Nichols (3-3) at 91 pounds, Rvan Jacobson (8-3) at 98 pounds, Nate Moore (10-1) at 105 pounds, Shawn Clark (5-6) at 119 pounds, J:R. Taormina (8-4) at 145 pounds, and Kyle Barbera (2-2) at 155 pounds.

Firebirds ready for the challenge festival has to offer


Needing a stiff test for some of his more experienced wrestlers, Phoenix varsity wrestling Coach Dick Brown entered his team into the Fulton Athletic Booster Club Wrestling Festival. The tournament will not only show him how the Firebirds stack up against Section III's best, but some of the top wrestlers from other sections in the state will also be present.

"It's going to be a real challenge for all of our kids," Coach Brown said. "It will tell how good our kids are. I needed to challenge the real good kids and that is why I got into (the tournament)," he continued. "It's a good chance to test those kids to see where they are and where they have to go."

One Firebird who already has plenty of tournament experience this season is Jamie Richardson. Richardson, who will wrestle at 177 pounds, placed first in the Central Square Tournament and added a secondplace finish at the Anderson Tournament. which was held at Cicero-North Syracuse

. Richardson, who is in his fourth year on the varsity team, entered the season 16 victories shy of tieing the school record for most career wins at 80. It didn't take the senior too long to reach that goal as he won his 16th match of the season, against one defeat, Thursday in Cortland to the the record. Richardson had a shot to break the record Tuesday when the Firebirds wrestled Marcellus.

Two other Firebirds who hope to have the opposition seeing double are freshmen Clay and Chad Russell. Clay won the title at



Coach Brown also noted that sophomore Gregg Neish has been wrestling well and could have a strong tournament. Neish will wrestle at either 119 or 126 pounds and is 16-4 this season.

Rounding out the Firebird line-up will be Dan Logee at 98 pounds, Scott Wilcox at 112, Brian Hart at 132, Matt Gabriele at 138, Mike Mogilewski at 145, Keith Strupp at 155, Ernie Mason at 167, and Chris Virginia at 215. In 18 matches this season

Virginia has posted 13 victories.

By already having participated in three individual tournaments prior to the Fulton Wrestling Festival, Coach Brown hopes that it will give his team that much more experience come Saturday.

"It does help that we have had a lot of matches and it does give us a little bit of an edge, although we haven't seen the competition we will see in the Fulton tournament. It will be a new experience for us," Coach Brown observed.


On the dual meet side of things this season, the Firebirds are 7-2 overall and 1-0 in the Metro League. Coach Brown noted that his team's win against East Syracuse-Minoa, which is in the Onondaga High School League North American Division, was a boost for the team.

"ES-M was a good win for us," he said. "They are usually a pretty good team.


While Coach Brown considers this team better than some in the past few seasons, he thinks that his wrestlers fare better when they compete at individual tournaments.

"It's a better individual team than a dual-meet team," the coach admitted. "We have a couple of kids that are capable of winning tournaments."

The Firebirds will find out where they stand in the course of the next few weeks. After the Fulton Wrestling Festival, Phoenix may compete in the Section III Dual Meet Tournament before the Metro League Meet and the Class B Tournament.


Red Raiders own Section III Dual Meet Tournament

Since its inception six years ago, the Section III Dual Meet Tournament has been dominated by Fulton varsity wrestlers. The Red Raiders are a perfect 30-0 in the tournament and have claimed all six titles.

In two weeks the Red Raiders will look to make it seven consecutive crowns entering the tournament as the favorite. The 16-team tournament will take place Saturday, Feb. 4, at the Paul V. Moore High School in Central Square with Fulton taking on the best Section III has to offer.

Last year Fulton concluded another undefeated season by edging Canastota 24-23 in a showdown of top-ranked teams. Fulton entered the 1994 finals as the No. 1 ranked team in the state for large schools while Canastota was top among small schools. The Red Raiders won the final four matches of the contest to defend the team's crown. Bob Galini (155 pounds), Mike Kitts (167), Jason Willis (177), and Harley Wakeman (215) all recorded



Dual meet

Now in his junior season, Mike Kitts (top) has established himself as one of Fulton's top wrestlers competing at 167 pounds. Kitts played a major roll in last year's Section III Dual Meet Tournament winning a key match in the finals to help the Red Raiders to their sixth straight title. The Red Raiders are 8-0 in dual meets this season and have won 35 straight. In the Section Three tournament, Fulton has won all 30 of its matches and is the only team to claim the title. dramatic victories to keep Fulton's streak alive.

Entering the 1995 tournament, Fulton will have many familiar faces in its line-up when they take the mat as both Kitts and Wakeman return along with many other Red Raiders. Matt Mahar (126), Andy Hammond (112), Ryan Jacobson (98), Jeremy Hutchinson (132 or 138), Nate Moore (105), and J.R. Taormina (145) were also members of that team.

This year the road to the finals will include several tough teams. Although the final 16 teams haven't been chosen yet, Fulton Coach Mike Conners has a good idea of who will standing in the Red Raiders' way.

"There are some real goods teams," Coach Conners noted of the upcoming tournament. Among those that will be challenging Fulton will be Lowville, Beaver River, Carthage, South Jefferson, and Fowler. Of those schools, four are ranked in state polls for either small or large schools. Fowler is 21st in the large school poll followed by South Jefferson in the 22nd spot, while Lowville is fourth among small schools and Beaver River is sixth.

Each team has to apply to be entered into the tournament; a committee from Section 111 will make the final selection. Fulton is as close to a guaranteed participant as a team can be, as a six-time

The road to six straight titles

The following is a recap of each team the Red Raiders have defeated on their way to six straight Section III Dual Meet Tournament titles. From 1989 to 1991, 32 teams were entered into the tournament and from 1992 to the present only 16 teams are entered. Over the past six years Fulton has defending champion that is undefeated again this season.

While other teams work toward knocking Fulton from the top, the Red Raiders will use the week before to keep the winning tradition alive.

"It's one of our favorite tournaments," Coach Conners said. "We work hard in practice because of the success in previous years. Some years we didn't wrestle great as a team, but when someone didn't wrestle well someone picked up the slack," he added.

While Coach Conners can recall all of the team's wins in the tournament, there are a couple of specific matches that stand out in his mind.


"We had two blowout wins against VVS (Vernon-Verona-Sherrill) in previous years and that was exciting, but Canastota was probably the most nail-biting," Coach Conners remembered.

The blowouts Coach Conners spoke of were when there were 32 teams entered in the tournament and the Red Raiders faced VVS twice in 1990 beating them 40-20 the first time and then 52-6 in the semifinals. Fulton also beat VVS in the semi-finals in 1993 and in the finals in 1989, the first year the tournament was held.

The first round of matches at the annual tournament will begin at 10 a.m. with the consolation match tentatively scheduled for 5 p.m. and the finals at 7 p.m.

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

Fulton to host Class A Tournament next month

The Fulton Wrestling Festival isn't the only major tournament the Red Raiders will host this season. The G. Ray Bodley High School gymnasium will also be the site of the Section III Class-A Tournament Saturday, Feb. 18.

The tournament will bring together all 15 Class-A schools in Section III. Teams from Auburn, Liverpool, Oswego, Rome Free Academy, West Genesee, Central Square, East Syracuse-Minoa, Cicero-North Syracuse, Baldwinsville, Watertown, Whitesboro, Fayetteville-Manlius, Fowler, and Utica Proctor as well as Fulton will participate in the tournament.

An individual tournament that also keeps track of team points, the Fulton Wrestling Festival will determine which wrestlers advance to the Section III Tournament. Wrestlers who finish in the top four places of each weight class will

earn the right to move to the next level.

The Red Raiders have won the tournament the past five seasons and could make it six straight in their home gym. Fulton has two wrestlers on the team who have been Class-A champions the last two years. Senior Matt Mahar has two titles to his credit and will be going for his third. A year ago Mahar wrestled at 119 pounds and this year will be moving up to the 126-pound division.

Another Fulton wrestler who is a two-time Class-A title holder is Andy Hammond. Hammond is only a junior and is a likely candidate to join the exclusive 100-win club in the near future. So far in his career Hammond has a 73-7 record. When he takes to the mat next month he will be competing at 112 pounds.

Heavyweight Harley Wakeman is the* final Red Raider wrestler to earn a ClassA crown last season. In order for Wakeman to repeat as champion he must get past two other top wrestlers. Standing in his way will be Fowler's Jarmon Howard and Central Square's Rob Eggerling.

Along with Howard at 215 pounds, the 21st ranked Falcons will bring several other solid athletes to the tournament. Antoine Smith was the fourth seed in the sectional tournament last winter and finished the season going 15-3 as a junior. Other Falcon standout wrestlers who will have a say on the outcome of certain weight classes are Jason Briare at 126 pounds and Dave Richardson at 112. Richardson placed fourth in the sectional meet while Briare also participated in the sectional tournament.

Besides Fulton and Fowler, several other teams have top-notch wrestlers who could earn titles. Whitesboro has Dave and Dan Marsch with Dave wrestling at 132 pounds and Dan at 167. The Warriors also have Brett Bernard at 138 pounds.

Rome Free brings Matt Soboloski (177) and Paul Delano (98) into the tournament while the Cyclones from Watertown will be looking to Larry Perie (132) and Shawn Ramsdell (250) to win titles. In addition to Eggerling, Central Square will bring Doug Tripp (112) and Ron Recquir (155) to the Class A meet.

Other wrestlers to watch during the tournament will be East Syracuse-Minoa's Dave Heigle at 145 pounds, Baldwinsville's Dave Boudreau at 138 pounds, Liverpool's Mark Rauli at 126 pounds, and Cicero-North Syracuse's Louie Chamoun at 167, along with Oswego's Jon Schladebeck at 112 and Jason Burns at 132.



Pee wee program provides fundamentals and fun

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In the past 20 years, the Fulton Wrestling Club has benefited from the extraordinary leadership of a few talented and committed individuals. Under the direction of then head coach Wayne Bleau, along with Gary Narewski, Dick Sorrell, and Mat-Pac founder Don Smith, the club has not only survived, but prospered.

These men established the goal that would separate the Fulton Wrestling Club from all others. The mission of this organization was not to produce the best pee-wee wrestlers in the state, or the best individual high school wrestler in the state. Instead, the Fulton Wrestling Club aims for the state team title. Some New York State wrestling programs produce outstanding pee-wee teams, but fail at the high school level. Others can brag about a few outstanding individuals, but at the same time cannot field a 12-man team for a dual meet. These programs leave little room for the less talented wrestlers to contribute.


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The success of Fulton Wrestling seems assured under the current direction of head coach Mike Conners, the Wrestling Club's Joe Taormina, and the Mat-Pac's Don Smith. These men share the same talent, commitment, and vision that drove their predecessors. It is because of these men and their common goal that Fulton Wrestling has withstood the test of time to become a permanent state power. Fulton Wrestling Club President Dick Farfaglia wrestling skills, with a heavy emphasis on fun and games. Halfway through the season an intra-squad scrimmage is held so the young grapplers can evaluate their skills. Some pee wees with advanced skills take part in outside tournament competition. Currently the pee wee program is home to a N.Y. State Pee Wee Folkstyle and Greco-Roman Champion and has had as many as three title holders in a single year. Recently some pee wees have competed in local, regional, state, national, and regional junior olympic competitions with impressive results.

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On a weekly basis, one pee wee from each grade level is selected as Wrestler of



At the end of their season the pee wees present an award of their own. The Pee Wee's Choice Award goes to the varsity or junior varsity wrestler who has won the majority of the pee wees' vote based on six conditions; upholding the standards of Raider wrestling by always doing his best, exhibiting good sportsmanship, loving the sport of wrestling, dedication to the team of Fulton wrestlers at all levels, demonstrating his commitment to Fulton wrestling by willingly working with the pee wee program, following the Good Wrestler Creed. The Good Wrestler Creed states: 1. A good wrestler has the desire to win. 2. A good wrestler never quits. 3, A good wrestler never alibis when he loses. 4. A good wrestler participates in other sports. 5. A good wrestler is a good American. The 1994 Pee Wee's Choice by an overwhelming majority was Edgar Rodriguez.

The culmination of the pee wee season is the Fulton Tournament held every year in March. The Fulton Wrestling Club hosts an AAU sanctioned tournament where the young grapplers get to test their skills against some of the best wrestlers from other area clubs. This year's tournament will be held March 11, and the public is invited to come out and support the Fulton Pee Wees.



U-E Tournament stepping stone to state title

Since 1989 the Red Raiders have ended the season on top of the state rankings five times, including a year ago. A common piece to Fulton's state title puzzle has been winning the Union-Endicott Dual Meet Tournament in each of those years. Each year this tournament is one of the state's best dual meet tournaments.

Fulton has competed in the tournament every year since 1984, except for 1990. During that time the Red Raiders have won nine of the last 12 titles including the last five. Two weeks ago Fulton got that fifth straight title by beating three state-ranked

teams. Each time the Red Raiders have won a state crown, they were also the champions at U-E.

The 11 times Fulton has been in the tournament they have been nearly unbeatable posting a 35-2 record. The Red Raiders have won 16 straight matches since 1991 and overall they have a 23-match unbeaten streak. The following is a run down of Fulton's 11 trips to the Union-Endicott Dual Meet Tournament.

Comebacks part of Red Raider tradition

While the Red Raiders have enjoyed plenty of wrestling success over the past 15 years, they have had some close calls when the wrestlers were called upon to rally from behind to earn a victory.

There have been many close matches and rallies, but here are four of Fulton's best comebacks.

The first was in 1983 when the Red Raiders trailed Canandaigua 23-2. Fulton then won five of the last six matches to pull out a narrow 27-26 victory.

In that same year, Fulton overcame an 18-point deficit against Brentwood of Long Island. Fulton erased that 18-0 Brentwood lead by winning six of the last seven matches at the Gold Cup held at West Point.

The following year, Canandaigua again held a sizeable lead against Fulton, but the Red Raiders were able to overcome. Canandaigua led 18-0 before the Red Raiders won the final five matches of the contest, all by pins, to win 40-23.

The other top comeback came last

season as Fukon trailed Canastota, the top ranked team in the state among small schools, 23-12 in the finals of the Section III Dual Meet Tournament. The Red Raiders rallied for a 24-23 win, clinching the final four matches and capturing their sixth straight dual meet title.
