By winning three firsts, and two sec onds for a total of 24 points, in the twelfth annual intercollegiates held in the Princeton University gymnasium Princeton, N. J., Friday and Saturday the Varsity wrestling team brought the fifth consecutive championship to Cornell. It also marked the sixth time that a Cornell team has won the intercollegiates during the seven years

On the other hand Lehigh save Princeton a stiff race finishing only two points behind the Tigers. Lehigh scored one first, one second, and four third places. Penn came in third with eleven points, receiving two first places, and one third. Columbia received only one point in the meet, by taking a third place in the 135-pound Class.
