




ON LEFT IS CAPTAIN MILLIGAN, OF PENN, AND ON RIGHT IS MIKE DORIZAS



CORNELL MATMEN ARE CHAMPIONS

For Fifth Consecutive Time They Capture Intercollegiate Wrestling Championship

Ithaca Wrestlers Completely Out-classed Rest of Competitors in Princeton Meet

PRINCETON, N. J., March 18.—For the fifth consecutive year Cornell University won the Intercollegiate wrestling championships held here this afternoon, scoring 24 points. Princeton University finished second, with 14 points; Lehigh third, with 12; Pennsylvania fourth, with 11, and Columbia fifth, with one point.

The champions in the seven classes are: 115-pound class, Wiss, Princeton; 125-pound class, Wigsten, Cornell; 135-pound class, Hiss, Lehigh; 145-pound class, Milligan, Pennsylvania; 158-pound class, Saeger, Cornell; 175-pound class, McKeage, Cornell; heavyweight class, Dorizas, Pennsylvania.

The Cornell representatives completely overshadowed the competitors of the other four colleges. Aided by the easy preliminary bouts on Friday night with the Columbia University grapplers, the Cornell team placed five men in the finals. The only two classes being without an Ithacan wrestler were the 145-pound and the heavyweight. With but one exception the big Red grapplers were pitted against the finalists of Princeton. In three of the five bouts the Ithacans came out ahead. In the other two bouts the men who had been defeated by the referee's decision were placed second. Cornell also secured a second place in the heavyweight class.

The University of Pennsylvania finished second in the number of champions produced, having Captain Milligan come out with flying colors in the 145-pound class and Mike Dorizas, the big Greek Intercollegiate heavyweight champion, retaining his title by pinning Jewett, of Princeton, the dark-horse entry in the heavyweight class, to the mat in 20 2-5 seconds. Hiss, of Lehigh, and Wiss, of Princeton, divided up the remaining honors, each winning his bout in the time limit of fifteen minutes on the referee's decision.

The meet produced four new champions, they being in the 115-pound class, the 125-pound class, the 135-pound class and the 145-pound class. The men who retained their titles were Saeger, of Cornell, in the 158-pound class; McKeage, of Cornell, in the 175-pound class, and Dorizas, of Pennsylvania, in the heavyweight class.

The opening bout of the afternoon was for the championship of the 115-pound class between "Buck" Wiss, of Princeton, and McKenzie, of Cornell. Wiss got the first fall by a head hold after four minutes of tussling. McKenzie won the preliminary bout for second place against Pascarella, of Columbia, in nine minutes. In the final bout for second place he wrestled a nine-minute draw with Servias, of Pennsylvania. The Red and Blue grappler was taken sick shortly after the termination of the bout and could not appear in the time limit of five minutes according to the rules, and therefore McKenzie secured second place and an extra point by default.

Kirkhuff, of Lehigh, after defeating Pascarella in nine minutes, won third place by winning from Servias, of Pennsylvania, who showed his gameness by again appearing and endeavoring to capture third place. He was in a weakened condition, but made the South Bethlehem man go two extra periods to win out.

Wegsten, of Cornell, and Jones, of Princeton, alternated in the championship bout in the 125-pound class in securing holds, with the Ithacan getting the decision in the regulation period. McCullough, of Lehigh, sprang a surprise by finishing second, as did Souder, of Penn, in securing third place.

Hiss, of Lehigh, and Reynolds, of Cornell, were evenly matched in the 135-pound class. Hiss got the first fall and worked just as hard while atop of his man as when on the defense. Reynolds came through for second place after a

hard battle with Ohler, of Princeton, the men wrestling for two extra periods of three minutes each. De Maria, of Columbia, by placing third in defeating Ohler, of Cornell, secured the only point for the New Yorkers.

Captain Milligan, of Pennsylvania, had little trouble in winning the 145-pound class from Beatty, of Princeton, who finished second, when he defeated Post, of Cornell, who won the championship last year. Shaffer, of Lehigh, placed third.

Saeger, of Cornell, had a tough proposition in Frantz, of Princeton, in the 158-pound class. Frantz won out for second place with Levin, of Lehigh, getting the decision for third position. McKeage, of Cornell, threw Turned, of Princeton, in the 175-pound class in 6 minutes 23 seconds with a half Nelson and body hold. Statler, of Pennsylvania, gave Turner a hard battle for fifteen minutes for second honors. The Red and Blue grappler competed in three bouts, but failed to place after 39 minutes of work.

Dorizas just lifted Jewett, of Princeton, off the mat in the heavyweight class and gave him the "Dorizas bear hug" for twenty seconds. Jewett was easy prey for Snyder, of Cornell, going to the mat in 35 seconds.
